Patti has no present intention of quitting the English concert platform, and that they have arranged for a series of concerts to be given by her in various parts of the United Kingdom as far ahead as the autumn of 1894.

Madrin, Sept. 29.—Father Martin, Vicar-General of the Jesuits, is believed to be the probable successor of the late Father Anderledy as general of the order. Took a Letter Containing \$4,500 in Checks

Took a Letter Containing \$4.500 in Checks and Used Them as Playthings.

Philadelihia, Sept. 20.—A little girl, innocent of any thought of wrong, slipped hör hand through the big slot in the village postoffice door at Darby, Pa., and took out a letter containing checks for \$4,500. This was why the valuable letter from the First National Bank of Darby to the Independence Bank of Philadelphia went aetray. Mary Andrews, 7 years of age, was the culprit. She and other children, among whom was her sister Lizzie, 11 years of age, when playing around the postoffice door on the way home from school, and while Lizzie was looking in at the window little Mary put her hand in the slot of the letter box and withdrew it with a long envelope in her grasp. Soon nearly all the children of Darby were playing bankers around the lots with the stolen checks. The bank did notfdiscover its loss for two or three days, when its officers received a letter from the Independence Bank of Philadelphia, stating that they had failed to receive the expected checks. Investigation was begun, and the checks were found scattered broadcast throughout Darby. Payment on them was stopped, and most of them, amounting to over \$3,000, were recovered. As the child was too young to realize what she had done, no legal proceedings were begun against her.



A FREE LIBRARY FOR LONDON.

London has now two public libraries One, the Workingmen's Free Library, established with commendable spirit by the workingmen after the last attempt to establish a city free library was made; the other, the Mechanics' Institute, which also other, the Mechanics' Institute, which also has a reading room attached to it. The Workingmen's Library is as its name implies, free, and though necessarily circumscribed in its operations, it has worthily 'ulfilled the intentions of its promoters. The Mechanics' Institute is sustained partly by a grant from the Ontario Government, and partly by annual fees from its members.

It is doubtless in response to this feeling that the directors of the Mechanics' Institute have now taken action. The arrangement made is provisional, but it will afford the citizens some insight into the assets of the Mechanics' Institute, and enable them to indeed the provisional of the benefits to be derived from the Mechanics' Institute, and enable them to judge of the benefits to be derived from taking over the Mechanics' Institute building, books, etc. We understand that the directors of the institute are agreeable to hand over this fine property, provided the city assumes the mortgage on the structure, which is \$18,000. The Act provides that under no condition shall more than half a mill on the dollar of taxation be levied for free library purposes. After the adoption of the Free Libraries Act, the Mechanics' Institute is empowered by law to transfer to the corporation, for the purposes of the Act, all their property, except such as must be disposed of under the provision of the Act respecting Mechanics' Institutes and Art Schools. The agreement entered into, assumption of liability, or the payment of money, will not be binding unless the City Council ratify it by by law.

unless the City Council ratify it by by law. If the Mechanies' Institute transfers its library or board to the Free Library Board, the library will receive the Government grant accruing.

We are hopeful, now that negotiations have been so amicably begun, that before many months have clapsed London will have a free library second to none possessed by any city of its size in America. In any agreement reached as to the future of the Mechanics' Hall it will be well to respect the views of the directors of the Art School—that ample room shall be prorespect the views of the directors of the Art School—that ample room shall be proort ownool—that ample room shall be provided for this most useful public institu-tion. The Advertiser recently contended that for the protection of the citizens of Canada there should be an appeal from the decision of a county judge on all matters affecting the electoral rights of the people We adduced the London election outrage, in which Judge Elliot, editorial defender of his political friends in the columns of the Free Press, seated the candidate who had the minority of the legal votes cast. This was only possible because Judge Elliot was rendered by the infamous Franchise Act sole judge of who should or should not be left on the finally revised voters' list. Instead of joining us in calling for a reform, the Free Press undertakes the defense not only of its editorial writer, the udge, but of the entire outrage, from

beginning to end.

The weakness of the defense can be line weakness of the defense can be gleaned from the fact that in one sentence our contemporary asserts that there were four ways of averting the outrage, and in another concedes that the decree of Judge Eliot was "final under the Election Act." Under these circumstances no good can



FREE LIBRARY FOR LONDON.

Grant of \$250 Recommended for the Purpose.

The Mechanics' Institute to be Opened Until Christmar—The Electors to Decide it the Change Shell be Permanent.

A proposition was read at a meeting of the finance committee yesterday after, moon from the directors of the Mechanics' Institute. They ofered to throw eyen the reading room to the public on consideration of an annual grant of \$500 from the council, or to throw eyen both reading room and library provided that the grant be increased to \$1,000 a year. A deputation of the directors was present and explained that all the income they had was the Government grant and subscriptions from the members. The reading room was well provided with all the current mag. zines and library no doubt the public would use it to a great extent. The deputation asked that in case the committee would not give either of the grants that were mentioned they give such grant as they might consider a reasonable one. Their prime object was the interest of the general public. What they wanted was to get for the city better libraries than they had. All the encumbrance on the Mechanies, Institute building was a mortgage of \$18,000. The library was not what it should be and even if it should be amalgamented with the Workingmen's Library it would not then be satisfactory.

Mr. Essery said that the old hall at present rented by the Salvation Army could be turned into a first-class reading-room and library at a cost of \$700 or \$800, and this would suffice for seven or eight years.

Col. Lewis said that \$2,000 would suffice

Mr. Essery also assured the committee that the Free Libraries Act would be voted on at the next municipal elections.

Col. Lewis argued that the art school should not pay any rent as it was in the interest of the public also.

This matter and that of exemption of manufactories were again considered at a special meeting of the committee held in the evening.

The city clerk wrote as follows:

"The council may pass a bylaw to grant aid to a Mechanics' Institute or free library; established under the Free Libraries Act. A free library can be established under the Free Libraries Act upon a petition signed by at least 100 electors that a bylaw be submitted to the electors qualified to vote at municipal elections. If the electors decide by their votes that a free library be established, the council must appoint certain representatives to the board of management and raise annually by taxation the meneys required by the board for the management of the library."

"The rate of taxation for this purpose cannot exceed ½ mill except in cities over 100,000 population," added Mr. Kingston at the evening session of the committee.
