Who Runs the Bering Sea? PARIS, June 1 .- In his argument before the Bering Sea tribunal of arbitration today Sir Richard Webster renewed his day Sir Richard Wobster renewed his analysis of the different treaties respecting seals. Great Britain, he said, had never recognized that Russia possessed exclusive jurisdiction over Bering Sea, and Russia did not cede Bering Sea to the United States. If Russia had ceded Bering Sea, the cession would not bind other nations nor justify the pretensions of the United States to inske Bering Sea mare clausum.

A Millionaire Bull-Fighter.

MADRID, June 1 .- La Gartijo, the king bull-fighters, made his last public appearance to-day. Besides the fee of 50,000 france he received half the gate receipts, which were approximately 150,000. More which were approximately 150,000. More than 14,000 persons were present. All the bulls were from the herd of the Duke of Veragua, who breeds the fiercest fighters in Spain. After La Gartijo had killed six of them he retired amid wild cheering and waving of handkerchiefs, hats and mantles. La Gartijo will pass the rest of his life on his estate at Cordova. He is a millionaire and made all his money in buildighting. bull-fighting.

ROME, June 1 .- In the Senate yesterday Signor Saracco, the reporter of the Pensions Bill, made a scathing speech, setting forth the financial fallacies of the measure. He gave figures intended to show that the adoption of the bill would make it necessary either to disarm the military forces of the either to disarm the military forces of the country or to impose additional taxation to the amount of 80,000,000 lire upon the people. The Musister of the Treasury denied that the finances of the Government were in the desperate condition described, but it is the general opinior that as a result of Signor Saracco's attack the rejection of the Pensions Bill is assured.

The Morie Rule Bill.

LONDON, June 1.-In the House of Com-mons to-day Mr. Libouchere addressed a series of questions of the Government with the view of obtaining definite information as to whether the Foreign Office had authorized Sir Gerid Portal to proclaim a British protectorate in Uganda.

Sir Edward Grey in reply, referred Mr. Labouchere to the published instructions given to Sir Gerald Fortal when he went on his mission.

Sir Arnold Forsier (Liberal Unionist) made a motion to account in order to obtain an opportunity for debate on the growth of crime in the counties of Kerry and Limerick, Ireland. The division resulted in the defeat of the motion by a vote of 241 to 203. The House then went into committee on the Hume Rule Bill.

Mr. Gladsone adopted the proposed amendment that the right to interfere in hostilities between foreign countries be excepted from the powers of the Irish Legislature. Sir Arnold Forster (Liberal Unionist)

Nevertheless, if the prohibitions already proposed appeared to be insufficient he was willing to insert words in the bill to meet the case beyond all doubt. (Hear, hear.)

PARIS, June 4.—The Nihilist Sawcki, alias Lieturski, who killed himself some time ago, left a bundle of papers marked "to be destroyed." Both the Russian "to be destroyed." Both the Russian Consul-General and the Nihilist's family claimed the papers, and the officers who seized them were allowed to keep them only under protest while the courts were hearing the complaints. The Consul-General based his claim to the papers on the ground that they undoubtedly contained valuable information of Nihilists' plots and organization in Russia. The family wished merely to destrey the papers as Sawcki had directed. The Court of Appeal has decided that the papers must go to the Coul-General, and they will be delivered to him to-day.



THE polics magistrate of London, Ont., has decided that there is no legal standard of time. There is an immense opportunity for the technical judicial luminaries of Osgoode Hall to quest all convictions for breaches of the liquor law. How can a fine be imposed on a liquor dealer for seiling after a certain hour, say 7 o'clock, when legally no such hour as 7 o'clock exists!—[Toronto News.]

The decision of the London magistrate is simply that solar time is the only stand ard until the Ottawa Parliament decrees otherwise. Wherever standard time is the rule, legal difficulties can be success fully raised both in regard to opening and ng of liquor bars and in reference to banking and other arrangements that are conducted "by the clock."

AT ORANGEVILLE Mr. J. F. Wood, one of the new subordinate Ministers appointed at Ottawa, caused some astonishment by sserting that the tax burdens upon Canadians were very light. SHALL CITY MONEY BE SPENT FOR DOMINION PURPOSES?

If there is any hitch in the holding o the militia camp in this city, the respon sibility must lie jointly between the London City Council and the Government at Ottawa.

Certain expenditures are necessary on the camp grounds, which are the property and entirely under the control of the Administration at Ottawa. These will cost \$1.500, and the Ottawa Government desires the taxpayers of London to pay the

Meanwhile the Minister of Militia is on a tour through British Columbia and no one in authority at Ottawa pays any a to the appeal of the council, and the aldermen refuse to accept Mr. Carling's assurances that a letter will be forthcoming if the council will only vote the money.

Where were the aldermen while Parlia-

ent was sitting a month or two ago? Then Hon. Mr. Patterson pledged the Government that the camps would be permanently lo-cated at the most convenient points in future, London being the site chosen for the camp for the western district. That public pledge surely holds good. The camp must be held here, no matter who provides the necessary buildings. That was pointed out by the ADVERTISER months ago. The pledge of the Administration is recorded in Hansard. It cannot be broken without breaking faith not only with London but with the whole country. The camp is secured for London not as a matter of favor but because of the excellence of the situation and the abundance of instances which, by the way, the city camp must be held here, no matter who provides the necessary buildings. That cood water—which, by the way, the city vineyard of MM. So-and-so, at So-and-so supplies free of cost. Why, then, the over-burdened taxpayers of London may well ask, is it necessary to offer a bribe of municipal money offer a bribe of municipal money to the Geverament at Ottawa to secure that which has already been provided for? As Ald. Taylor says, there is no reason why the Government should not put up the buildings at the general expense. They are needed for the common good, not for the welfare of the taxpayers of London, who find it hard enough to pay their own taxes. There is an additional reason why the money for these works should come from Ottawa: The Government there is constantly boasting of the large surplus of public money that it has collected ever and above the needs of the public service. Why should it not pay its debts as well as other governments? The improvements required for its property here are legitimate expenditions. where it is at."

Soon it will be the duty of the Ontario Opposition to arise and tell the Province its property here are legitimate expenditures which should certainly be borne by the Ottawa Government and not by the city, and aldermen should once and for all withdraw their offers to undertake the work.

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE WORLD'S

A good deal has been written, naturally pro and con, regarding the great World's Fair now in progress at Chicago. It has been stated that the exhibition is not as yet complete, and there have been wild outerles respecting alleged extertionate rates for boarding accommodation.

As to alleged incompleteness, any such fair requires finishing touches for weeks after it is formally opened, but there is enough in this exhibition, as it at present stands, to occupy the attention of an in-telligent observer for a year, if he undertakes to inspect everything that is on view. In fact, it is simply a world in itself that is presented to the gaze of the visitor, and as no person would expect to take in the whole earth within a few days, neither is it possible for anyone to see one tithe of what is shown in the great city of the west. But even though one may have a great deal of time at his disposal, nothing would yield a greater harvest of interest, pleasure and informa tion than a visit to this exhibition.

Never before in the history of the world has there been any such display, and in all human probability there will not again be another exhibition to equal it. As compared with the Chicago exhibition, that at Philadelphia, some years ago, great though it was, was as a shild's toy house compared to a large wholesale store. Every nation is represented by its own people, as well as by its own buildings. The German or Irish village, for example, is so reproduced that one might easily imagine that he had been translated into scenes of 1,000 years

Now, with regard to the charges of extortion. There were naturally some attempts at exhorbitant exactions and lodging at the beginning of the fair, but the outcries which have been re-echoed far and wide were simply protests from people who were being vigorously jumped upon by the Chicago press and by the authorities of the World's Exposition. The average cost of living in Chicago is really no greater than at Toronto or Montreal. One can live as expensively or as moderately as he chooses. It is true that the visitor pays a little more for a cup of coffee or a sandwich inside the grounds than outside, but that is only reasonable, seeing that the restaurants within the grounds pay the management a substantial sum for the franchise. But the visitor need not buy anything within the grounds except ome small refreshment in the middle of the day, as the prudent plan is to have break fast and supper before and after sightseeing.

Every facility for supplying all needed information is at hand. The police officers are numerous and the guards and officials within the grounds are ready to give every aid to visitors. In fact, no person need be exposed to either extortion or danger of any kind who conducts himself with such ordinary prudence as is necessary to visit even a large Canadian city. It is always wise to go into a large city for the first time by daylight. It greatly facilitates the making of the necessary arrangements, and adds to the comfort of the visitor.

As to the fair, it is beyond the power of language to portray the beauty of the buildings, the vastness and variety of the exhibits from every clime, or the extraordinary human interest that surrounds the people who have come from the uttermost parts of the earth to represent the ethno-logical and industrial conditions in every part of the globe. No ordinary university could teach a person as much in a year as can be learned at Chicago within a fortnight. To have witnessed the Columbian Exposition of 1893 will be looked back to by every visitor as the event of a lifetime,



The lake was then empty, and it was a great sight. Ten men will commence work this weak to clean out the wood and fallen timbers and cut off all standing stumps, which will be taken out and burned or put into cordwood. The lake will then be fixed up with spring water. The large trout, with thousands of others, will be deposited, and the Gun Club's trout lake will be in shape.

BRICGS' BELIEF.

Peculiar Views Held by the Noted Preacher,

And Wherein the Assembly Consider Him to Be Heterodox.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Dr. Briggs' argument before the General Assembly was largely a review of that given on the original trial before the New York Presbytery. Then he dashed the slight hope of the few who believed that his explanations of his teachings would pave the way to a retraction of the alleged heresies. He reiterated the statements in his inaugural to which exception had been taken and reaffirmed his belief in them. But he challenged the commissioners, as unprejudiced jurors, in the name of God and the Presbyterian Church to show that they were contrary to the teachings of the Bible or confession of faith.

ERRORS IN THE BIBLE.

THE had, he said, taught that the Bible was in error—but only in matters "beyond the scope of faith and practice." In those he believed, as the confession says that the Bible was the only infallible rule. The Scriptures were inspired by God, but they were penned and arranged by imperfect men. These were written, edited and recedited, arranged and rearranged by imperfect men. They could not produce or keep a series of writings infallible in every respect.

The Scriptures, he said, did not say that Moses wrote the Pentateuch, or Isalah the whole of the book bearing his name. On the contrary, Scripture makes it evident that they did not.

As to the charge that he had taught that sanctification is not complete at death, Dr. Briggs said that his doctrine was clearly stated in his inaugural: "There is no authority in the Scriptures or in the creeds of Christendom for the doctrines of immediate sanctification at death. The only sanctification known to experience, to Christian orthodoxy and to the Bible is progressive sanctification. Progressive sanctification. Progressive sanctification at death. The only sanctification after death is the doctrine of the Bible and the church."

He said the larger catechism taught that the process of redemption was completed at the day of judgment. The doctrine of immediate sanctification at death was against the Holy Scriptures. Nowhere in Scripture was death the crisis for which men were to prepare themselves.

"It was always the day of judgment, the resurrection day. The invariable statement of the New Testament was that the second advent of Christ was the goal of sanctification. There was not a passage that taught, either directly or indirectly, complete sanctification, in a moment, by a magical transformation in the dying hour.

THE SOCIAL FARMER.

One of the requirements of civilization is that man shall be sociable. If no one lived up to this, which is equivalent to an injunction, what is to prevent us from lapsing into barbarism? Man was not made for himself alone, but for other men or for mankind in general. It is man's duty to be social with his fellow-men, with his neighbor.

Circumstances often make men unsoe

social with his fellow-likel, with his bosal bor.

Circumstances often make men unsociable when they would like to be otherwise, and a man once fixed or settled into unsociability may remain so in spite of himself, his unsociability becoming a habit rather than a trait of character.

In the country, sociability is often neglected—the very place where it ought to be oultivated—sometimes from choice and often from necessity. A man may let his hair grow two feet long, and have it cut any time, and thus return to the condition of civil zed man; but if he let his unsociability grow, he cannot clip it so easily. The longer he neglects the art of being social, the less social he will be even when it is his nature and inclination to be social.

Here are two families in similar circumstances. Perhaps a mortgage overhangs the farmer, and he does not get on as he ought. He worries and chaies under the load of debt and discouragement. His wife, of course, sympathizes and is weary with hard work and the monotony of life. When the choree are done and the evening lamp is lighted, they sit in silence—read, dose, sew and brood over misfortunes, looking on the dark side of things; their faces grow long and deep lines appear around the mouth and crow's feet begin to get a foothold; and thus they live on, alone, seeing none, going nowhere and having little "company."

Let us look at the other family. Every member of it may be apprehensive of the

Every member of it may be apprehensive of the future, bearing as heavy burdens, one kind and another, as the other family, yet are determined not to be wholly cast down, and doing their duty as well as they know it, take the future as it comes, not trying to look too far into it.

They attend all the meetings of their loige and enter into the spirit of all as deviations, and thus live on.

After a year let us compare these two families. What a difference there is! The family that has been social is not only better morally, physically, mentally, but also they, or the members of it, are better looking; the social family appears five years younger than the other, supposing the two families to be about the same age.

It was not intended that man should hibernate—shut himself up—whatever his condition. He owes something to his neighbor—a cheerful voice greeting, a cheerful countenance and a social call. A social farmer lived between a social farmer

cheerful countenance and a social cail. A social farmer lived between a social farmer and one of the other kind. He said, "I aiways expect something when I go by A's farm, and look for it. He'll shout 'hello' or wave his hand wherever he sees me. I let the horse walk, for his cherry voice and way does me good—makes me think I am somebody. But when I go by B's place, I don't let the horse walk; I get by as quick as I can. He never has a word for any. as I can. He never has a word for any-body. I used to say 'howd'y,' but it's no use barking at a coon that'll never come

down."
There is a good deal in a cheery 'hello," and every farmer ought to be on 'helloing' terms with his neighbor. A philosopher has said, 'Be social and cheerful and you may continue to be young and handsome all your days."

John Law, a brass founder, was arraigned on a breach of the police commissioners' bylaw. A small boy named Willie Smith, it seems, had sold the defendant a piece of lead pipe for 79 conts. He was asked to call the following day for the money," why did Mr. Law not pay you at once?" asked Mr. Weekes, who appeared for that gentleman. "Guess he hand" tany money," answered the youthful witness. Mr. Weekes, in his address, represented that the act provided for the regulating by the Board of Police Commissioners of second-hand shops and junk establishments exclusively. This being the case, the bylaw could not go behind the meaning of the act. Mr. Law was purely a manufacturer and dealer in new commodities, and could not, necessarily, be subject to the provisions of the bylaw. Chief Williams pointed out that, if such a contention were allowed, the bylaw in question was absolutely useless, as it had been passed expressly for the purpose of preventing the purchase of materials—probably, in many instances, stelen—from small boys. Magistrate Parke decided that Mr. Law's business was not subject to the bylaw. The chief thinks that some modification will now—consequent upon this decision—have to be made in the present regulations.
