DISEASED MEAT DISCOVERED CLEAR CASE OF TUBERCULOSIS

Animal Killed in London Township-Sold to London Retailer -- Board of Health On the Warpath ---Meat Inspector and Abattoir Strongly Urged for This City.

Tuberculosis cattle slaughtered for consumption in London is not a very comfortable thought, and it has often been impressed upon the citizens, but the discovery made yesterday by the board of health is very disquieting. A prominent member of the board obtained a piece of fat from the internal organs of a beast killed in London Township, and had it diag-

It proved to be one of the worst cases of tuberculosis that has come to the notice of veterinarians in this city

The chairman of the board of health, Dr. Niven, and Dr. Hutchinson, the medical health officer, were notified, and are now investigating. The diseased parts are in charge of Dr. Tamlin, V. S., inspector for

MEAT SOLD IN LONDON

The beast was slaughtered by a well-known wholesale butcher of Lzndon Township, and the carcass was sold to a local butcher.

The offal was sold, and out of curiosity was investigated by the man who bought it, with the result that the diseased condition was discovered. The identity of the butcher has not been made known, nor the butcher

The Advertiser was informed that the wholesaler had gone to the batcher to whom he sold the carcass, and had taken it back, but this could not be

GENERALIZED TUBERCULOSIS.

"The case is a very pronounced one," said Dr. Tamlin this morning, as he showed the diseased parts to The Advertiser reporter. "It is a case of what is termed generalized tuberculosis. No particular organ is affected more than the other, such as the lungs, kidneys or other parts

"The whole system is literally full of tuberculosis germs. See here," And he pointed out a myriad of small lumps of different sizes. "These are the tuberculin deposits. They are filled with a dry puss which in a later stage becomes a fluid substance. There are enough germs there to kill half the people in the city, if they had a chance. Something should be done and done quickly, to inspect the meat the people eat."

INVESTIGATING THE CASE.

"I am investigating the case," said Dr. Hutchinson. "I have some information, but not enough to satisfy me yet. I will look into this matter

"Meat-inspection is something that I have been agitating for for twentyone years. There should be an inspection of cattle before and after killing, and then it will be known definitely just what sort of meat we are eating, "It is just the same with milk,

"I have insisted on the tuberculin test being applied to all cows from which our milk supply is drawn. It must come to that, Other cities are doing it.

"They are doing it in the United States, and they are doing it in Engfand. It must be done here.

"A rigorous series of tests would soon remove the infection, and reduce tuberculosis to a small matter. It is a serious matter, and we must look well into it.

DR. NIVEN SPEAKS, "I was called in to see the stuff yesterday," said Dr. Niven, the chair-

man, "and it certainly is tubercular. "It is a very pronounced case. "It shows what kind of meat we have been getting for a long time. .

"An abattoir is absolutely necessary to protect our meat supply."

A deposit of pus was taken by Dr. J. D. Wilson for laboratory purposes, and he will make a report to the board also on his finding.

The case is creating a great deal of talk about the city. The report has caused not a little excitement in many localities, and it is a sensation

The butcher who killed the beast could not be found. He is said to be well-known in the city, and has done a large business here. ABATTOIR IS WANTED.

The majority of the citizens interviewed favor an abattoir, although there

were quite a few who advocate Government inspection.

"The Dominion Government has appointed inspectors to watch the export meats. That is the correct thing to do." said one man. "Now the Government should go one step farther, and protect the consumers at home. An abattoir for London would protect Londoners, but there is a large portion of the province outside of London, and it should be protected also. Government inspection is the only solution of the problem."

FOR A TRAITOR

Why Deputy Gustavus Schmidt Was Expelled From the Russian Duma.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 25.-The Russian Duma has taken the extreme step of expelling from its feld Deputy Gustavus Schmidt, not for Socialism or bomb-throwing-for Mr. Schmidt is more imperalistic than the Emperor himself-but because when a naval captain at Kronstadt in the eighties he sold naval secrets to England and to Germany, was degraded and imprisoned for this offense, and has consequently no right to sit in the Duma. Schmidt originally got into the Duma from Minsk, owing to the support of those pure patriots, the Extreme Right, and also owing to the fact that he told the peasantry of Minsk, who are mostly Russian, that if they returned him as their member he would get the Duma to expropriate for their benefit the estates of the local Polish landlords. After his election the outery against Schmidt became so great, however, that the "Union of Russian Men" decided to drop him, whereupon he tried to join the Octobrists, but they would not ac

Forms Own Party.

Then he formed in the Duma what called "The Frontier Union," of which the programme was: unity and integrity of Russia, war against the Polish Kolo, (i. e., the Polish group in the Duma), and its aspirations for home rule," Schmidt induced 40 members from the frontier districts of Russia to join his party. His anger against the Poles was only simulated, of course, for he himself is of German origin, and his experiences as a naval officer had long efore made him a very tolerant cosmopolitan. He simply wanted to create in the Duma such a conflagration of racial feeling that his own little affair would be forgotten. In an adverse report.

Wanted to Fight. Then he became pugnacious and challenged to a duel Baron Meyendroff, the vice-president of the Duma, who had in a speech made some uncomplimentary remarks about Schmidt. But the baron refused to fight with the convicted traitor.




