# Laurier Will Finish His Work

# LIBERALS GO BACK TO POWER WITH MAJORITY OF FORTY-EIGHT BUT ONE MINSTER DEFEATED

The Government Ahead in Quebec, Nova Scotia New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan and Alberta---Liberals Make Remarkable Run In O

After one of the hardest-fought political campaigns Canada has ever witnessed, the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been sustained by a majority which, when all the returns are in, will be nearly 50.

In the face of a campaign which ensisted almost wholly of misrepresentation and scandal cries, the Government fought hard and strong, coming out of the conflict with flying colors. The abnormal majority of 1904 is reduced somewhat, but not sufficiently to damage the Government's prestige.

In Ontario.

Ontario was the great battle-ground of the campaign. The Conservative leaders fondly hoped that with the backing of the Whitney administration, and the prestige of the victory in June last, they would sweep Ontario, and this means offset Quebec. It was thought that British Columbia would send a delegation of Conservatives, and that Roblin would deliver Manitoba intact to Mr. oBrden. It hoped that Mr. Bor would hold the east to an even break at least.

As a result Ontario was treated to as bitter and venomous a campaign as could possibly be contrived. The Province was thoroughly soaked with scandal, it was thought by the Conservative speakers, and they looked with confidence to polling day. The expected slump failed to come off, and instead of a sweep for the Conservatives, the Liberals more than held

In Quebec.

In Quebec the result was a foregone conclusion. The Conservatives made little or no headway. The parties stand practically as they did in 1904. In the east the Government lost a Ch little, and they lost also in the west. Co. Manitoba gave a majority for the Op- Dr position, and so did British Columbia. Alberta and Saskatchewan remained Ho with the Government. Not a single minister is among the

missing, except Mr. Templeman, of Ka Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King, who will be minister of labor in the Government, had a notable triumph in North Waterloo, Sir Wilfrid himself was elected for two constituencies, Ottawa and Quebec. A number of Conservative leaders

Austria's sudden change from the most conservative power in Europe to a policy of absolute lawlessness is still a mystery which no one has succeeded in solving. She repeated her recalcitrant utterances today in Berlin. No conference, of course, is possible without her consent, and to hold one on her terms would be merely to stultify the participating powers.

Paris persists in believing that if Turkey allows herself to be forced into war it will mean that Germany desires a general European conflict. It is only fair to say that there is no sign of such a purpose thus far in any of Germany's actions. Her real desires continue completely hidden, but the absence of any reasonable motive for war at the present moment is the best guarantee of her peaceful inten-
