

ALLIED AIRMEN DROP BOMBS ON **GERMAN TOWNS**

Heavy Casualties Inflicted in Night Raid Over Hunland.

Geneva, Aug. 15 .- An official dispatch received here from Frankfort, Germany, says that Monday morning at 9 o'clock that city was attacked by twelve enemy aviators, who dropped 26 bombs, killing aviators, who dropped 26 bombs, killing twelve persons, and injuring five others.

British and French Have Made Slight Gains Near Morlancourt and Roye — Canadians Capture Two Villages.

FALL OF ROYE INEVITABLE.

Paris, Aug. 16, 1 p.m.—Roye is being held in a vice-like grip by the French. Stubborn resistance by the Germans is being crushed by the French, who are slowly encircling the town.

The French advance at Villers-les-Roye make the fall of Roye inevitable, it is believed by military men. Possession of the town by French troops would make necessary a rectification of the German lines and an enemy retreat to the Vesle-Noyon line would

The Germans are clinging desperately to a range of hills east of Ribecourt. They are also stubbornly defending the Lassigny-Oise Canal, the loss of which would entail the evacuation

ENEMY ARTILLERY IS AGAIN ACTIVE ALONG THE SOMME

With the British Army in France, Aug. 16 .- (By the Associated Press, 10:30 a.m.).— The enemy artillery was active last night from one end of the British front to the other. The activity was especially marked along the new Somme battlefront, in the Essarats sector and in the region of La Bassee, on the northern front, where there was a heavy gas bombardment. There was no development of activity by the enemy infantry.

All along the Somme front the British are continuing various slight forward movements to gain advantages of position. It was n movements of this kind that Damery and Parvillers came yes-

terday into British hands. The situation north of the Ancre has not yet been clarified, the enemy's intentions being obscure. There are no further reports of widespread withdrawals in this region, although the enemy seems to have abandoned several of his forward positions. On the other hand, British patrols that crossed the Ancre last night were fired upon and forced to return.

GERMANS EVACUATE VIEUX BERQUIN

London, Thursday, Aug. 15 .- Further slight enemy withdrawals from the Lys salient were announced in London today. The enemy has evacuated the village of Vieux Berquin, south of Merris, and has retired between one and two miles on a front of

Paris, Aug. 16 .- The French troops made an important advance on a front of 21/2 miles west of Roye, according to the war office statement today. The French progress was in the region of Villers-les-Roye, about 21/2 miles west of Roye, Staurin and Arman-



It Is for People to Determine to What Extent Nation Can Afford to Contribute.

As you will easily understand, with every year of the war's continuance, this outgo will increase in a marked way.

In Twenty Classes

"Canada's pensions," said Mr. Cronyn,

"are divided into twenty classes, ranging from the totally disabled (or 100
per cent) man down to the man whose
disability is less than 10 per cent. The
totally disabled men of the rank and
file receive \$50 a month for themselves; if married they are paid \$8 per
month additional, as well as \$8 per
month for each child. The widow of a
deceased soldier receives \$40 per month
and \$8 per month each for her children."

Point to Consider.

Proceeding, Mr. Cronyn said the question, then, for the decision of the people of Canada is whether \$600 a year under all the circumstances is a fair amount to allow a totally disabled soldier, and whether \$400 a year is a satisfactory allowance to the widows of those of the rank and file who have been killed. You will not lose sight of the fact that a totally disabled man is entitled to a further allowance of \$96 a year if he be married and a similar sum for each child. In addition, if the soldier be entirely helpless he is entitled to a special allowance, not exceeding \$300 a year. Based on these figures, a man 100 per cent disabled, having a wife and three children, would draw a pension of \$984 per annum. If the father were helpless that amount might be increased by \$300.

A man whose disability is ranked from 50 to 55 per cent would receive

by \$300.

A man whose disability is ranked from 50 to 55 per cent would receive one-half of the maximum allowance. For each child he receives \$60 a year, or somewhat more than one-half of the full amount. full amount.

"The question of the maximum amount is," declared the speaker, "the key to the whole problem.

Three Rules Followed.

The speaker outlined three rules which are observed when granting pensions:

The pre-war earnings or station in life of the pensioner is not considered. The test of the extent of a man's disability is its effect upon his earning power in the untrained labor market. An accountant might lose one, or both legs, his left arm, or one eye, and yet be quite as capable of carrying on his pre-war occupation. To the ordinary laborer or mechanic the loss of a limb is a serious affair and his condition is taken as governing.

No deduction is made in a pension where a soldier finds profitable employment. He is encouraged by training and otherwise to render himself wholly independent.

Mr. Cronyn said that during the probe into pensions by the parliamentary committee the committee was urged to declare in favor of equal pensions for all ranks, and had Canada been entering the war with the experience acquired after three years' trial, he ventured to say that our country might reach the same decision as did the United States of America. The committee felt that, as we had entered the war with a scale of pensions, which increased with the rank held by the pensioner, and as it was clear many officers enlisted upon the understanding that they and their families would receive the pensions then fixed, it was not now possible to reduce the pensions of officers, as that would be breaking faith with those in the field.

Officers Not Numerous.

It is worth noting that the pensions of officers have not been raised from the figures originally fixed, while those for the rank and file have received a substantial increase. It is also worth while recording that pensions paid to those below the rank of captain comprise about 37 per cent of the total amount disbursed.

"The committee were asked to con-

sider the possibility of adopting an insurance scheme such as is now in force in the United States. Here again Canada lacks the advantage which our friends across the border have gained from experience. Were we now to insure our forces, what would be the position of the families of those who have been already killed or of those who have returned from the front either wounded or stricken with illness. It was felt that it would be impossible at this stage of the war to devise a scheme which would fairly cover all those interested.

Mr. Cronyn said that it was pointed out to the committee that much hardship arose because of a provision in the pensions regulations that a man was only entitled to be pensioned in so far as a pre-existing disability had been aggravated by active service.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—A British force from Northwestern Persla has reached the Caspian Sea and taken over a part of the defence of Baku.

Whether the Allies will be able to hold Baku permanently, in view of the difficulties of transporting supplies, is too early to predict. However, if the British can hold their position a short time longer, which now seems likely, they probably will be able to cut off the enemy from an outlet to the sea, thus protecting the important oil fleids of the Baku district.

It appears from the meagre information at hand in London that the British detachment voyaged by steamer from Enzelli, Persia, to Baku, demonstrating that the Allied forces are fairly established.



They came to the worst-neglected orchards they had seen on their jaunting, and they immediately hunted up the owner to see if he would pay them to clean out the dead wood prune the trees, spray them, and generally doctor up the orchard.

The farmer flatly refused. Said the orchard was absolutely no good, had been no good for years, and it would be a dead loss for him to pay out anything for it. He was thinking of cutting down the trees for firewood.

"The boys made a proposition to him. Would he allow them all the profits for three years if they pruned and sprayed it and put it in good shape, and looked after it? He told them to go ahead, and welcome to it. He evidently thought them fools for their pains.

"They set to work on the orchard, bringing to bear all the knowledge they had gained in college. The first year they cleared expenses for all the equipment they required to get. The second year they did so well that the last I heard the farmer was worrying his head off over the amount they were going to make the third year. Any time a man tells me it does not pay to take care of his orchard, I have that practical illustration to place before him. I have seen it pay over and over gain. In fruit farming, as in every other kind of farming, there are always setbacks and bad years, but there is something the matter with the methods of the farmer who never can make anything pay."

DO YOU WANT TO LIVE LONG?

f you do, you should read carefully the common-sense rules laid down by Irving Fisher, professor of political economy of Yale University, and chairman of the Hygiene Reference Board of the Life Extension Institute. His little hooklet on the subject, "How to Live Long," is published by one of the leading life insurance companies of the continent, and has been distributed to thousands of policyholders all over Canada and the United States. In case you are not a policyholder of the company, herewith are given some excerpts. One bit of advice tallies most admirably with the regulations of the food controller, necessitated by present world conditions. It is this:

DO NOT EAT MUCH MEAT AND EGGS.

Probably you don't at the present prices. In any case, it is a comfort t know that by such self-denial you are helping to conserve your life and t lengthen it out. He tells you why you should go lightly on meat and eggs:
"Foods are of two kinds—REPAIR food and FUEL food. The repair foods are called 'proteins.' The fuel foods are called 'carbo-"We must eat a certain amount of 'protein' or repair food, each day, to replace those parts of the body which are being used up. If

we eat more of this 'protein' or repair food than we really need, the surplus food decays in the bowels and makes poisons. This works the liver and kidneys too hard, because they are the parts of the body which have to get rid of these poisons. There are two foods which we all use, and which have this 'proor repair food, in large amounts. These foods are MEAT and

EGGS. If we eat too much of meat and eggs we get more 'protein,' or repair food, than the body needs. This makes poisons, Eat little of meat and eggs." Isn't it comfort to know that you can conserve your money, your health,

and act patriotic, at one and the same time?

And here are some more words of wisdom from the pen or typewriter of Professor Irving Fisher, or whatever he sees fit to use for getting his ideas on paper:

Chew your food until you can swallow it very easily. If you have to force the food down, you have not chewed it enough. If you swallow your food half-chewed it will make your stomach work too hard. EAT SLOWLY. Sip all liquids slowly. Do not gulp them down. Do not take a drink of water while your mouth is full of food.
Some of the best foods are fruits, boiled milk, sour milk, potatoes, bread, vegetables and nuts, if they are well chewed.

It is best not to use pepper, mustard, catsup or other "hot" relishes STAND, SIT, AND WALK ERECT. Lift your chest up, arch it forward, and throw your shoulders back, stomach in. Do not slouch.

If you stand straight and breathe deeply, it will help you to keep

your chest up. It will also help to keep your bowels in good condition.

If it is hard for you to sit up straight in your chair, put a small pillow behind you, low down—that is, in the small of the back. One of the common causes of constipation and nervousness is a slouching position. Walk and stand with heels apart and toes straight forward. "Toeing out" leads to weak feet and flat-foot. Breathe deeply, slowly, regularly, through the nose. Do not breathe through the mouth. If we do not occasionally breathe deeply, part of

our lungs may become useless. About one-fifth of the air is "oxygen." This is needed by the blood Do not force yourself to breathe rapidly. This is harmful. Breathe

No gardener liveth unto him or herself where a bug-infested potato patch is

concerned. Being of an investigating turn of mind, the potato bugs will not fail to call upon neighboring patches. They will exercise neither decency nor discrimination. They will show no more respect for the gardener who toils faithfully than for the one who is a slacker. Letting one's own bit of the line go in farming a potato patch means bringing hardship and perhaps disaster upon other people. Serve your neighbor by minding



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

THE WAR SITUATION

[By the Associated Press.] Allied pressure has been renewed against the German line in the neighborhood of Roye, on the Picardy battlefront. The enemy is clinging determinedly to this town as a bulwark of the positions he took up after being driven back from the Amiens region. Both the French and the British are pushing closer, however, and making his prolonged ten-

ancy of the place doubtful. London last night reported the British line advanced northwest of the town in the neighborhood of Damery and Parvillers, while today Paris reports a forward movement on the part of the French west and southwest of Roye on a front of about two and a half miles.

Crushing Allied Stroke. Roye is fast becoming the virtual apex of a salient, which will soon invite a crushing allied stroke if the Franco-British pressure can be effectively maintained as it has been recently

Fighting activity in Picardy of more than a local character has been resumed. French troops making an important advance on a front of 21/2 miles west of Roye, while south of Albert the British have advanced their line slightly in the region northeast of Moriancourt, according to the official announcements from Paris and London today. On the line between Chaulnes and Roye, where the Germans are said to have a large number of men, Canadian troops have completed the occupation of the villages of Harvillers and Damery. These points are about two miles west of the highway and railroad running north and south

through Chauines and Roye. Apparently the enemy has completed his withdrawal movement in the Hebuterne sector, north of Albert. Berlin announces officially that German troops were withdrawn from small salients. However, it is not yet clear how far the Germans have retired. The enemy still holds Albert, but the British are in the western outskirts.

French Continue Pressure. Between the Oise and the Metz the French continue their steady pressure and have gained additional high ground west of the Oise and northwest of Ribecourt. The Germans fought hard to hold Monotithe Farm, but were finally driven out. The farm is east of Thiescourt Wood and is on the high ground dominating the River Divette, a small tributary of the Oise.

Appointment of Gen. von Boehm, who led the retirement from the Marne, to the command of the German group in Plcardy, is confirmed officially from Berlin. It is believed in London that because of the scarcity of German reserves the Germans will fight on the defensive on their present line. Fifteen reserv divisions already have been thrown in between the Ancre and the Oise and the enemy is said to have only 16 fresh divisions on the entire front from the North Sea to Switzerland. Unofficial estimates in London place the allied captures since August 8 at 34,000 men and 670 guns. It is declared the proportion of Ger-

man to allied losses has been greater in the recent fighting than at any time since 1914. The total allied casualties may not be as large as the number of German prisoners captured. Allies Bomb Railways. All other sectors of the western front appear to be affected by a fighting full. The German artillery

fire and aerial activity has de-creased along the Vesle, where the French and Americans maintain their pressure. Aerial operations still are intense. On the British front 28 German machines were put out of action Wednesday, while the British lost 15. Bombs have been dropped on railway junctions within the German lines, and the British aviators have flown into Germany to attack Thionville and Offenburg. American aviators have brought down two more enemy machines and have bombed railway junctions in the Metz-Verdun area with good effect.
