ITALIAN PREMIER THREATENS TO QUIT PEACE CONFERENCE TODAY

STATIONARY HOSPITAL UNIT **ARRIVES**

Woman Is Killed by Her Sweetheart, Who Is Found Beside Her Today in an Unconscious Condition, With Throat Cut-Letters Found in Room in Montreal Hotel Reveal Suicide Pact.

Montreal, April 23.—The body of a woman who had been stabled to death, and an unconscious man, were found in a room in the Windsor Hotel this morning. The man was registered under the name of P. Carl Sawick of Toronto.

The man is believed to be an Austrian, and the woman, who appears to be about 19 years old, an Italian or Syrian. She had been shot once and stabbed several times. Sawick cut his throat, and at the Royal Hospital, to which he was removed, it was said he had a poor chance to live.

On the table in the room was a pile of letters addressed to Toronto and St. Catharines people. On the top of the pile was a note and a dollar bill. The note read: "We are dying for love and sickness. Please use dollar bill for postage on letters.

Paris, April 23.—The Socialist congress, at its session yesterday, passed resolutions demanding the return to the state of excess war profits and the levying of special taxes on wealthy establishments, financial monopolies, concerns dealing in luxuries, railways and large enterprises, such as mines and banks. Another resolution adopted called for the transfer to the Pantheon of the ashes of Jean Leon Jaures, the Socialist leader, who was assassinated in July, 1914.

London, April 23.—Another Antarctic expeditions is being prepared for, according to a statement printed in this morning's newspapers. John Cope, biologist with the British Antarctic expeditions of 1914-1917, will be leader, and expects the expedition to start in June, 1920. He proposes, besides carrying scientific investigations to ascertain the extent of mineral and other valuable deposits on the Antarctic continent. He has secured the famous exploration ship Terranova, and intends to take an airplane for surveying the interior of the continent. He hopes also to make a flight to the South Fole.
