> The monument question has been settled. The principal terms of the settlement briefly stated are as fol-

That the Municipal Chapter of London, of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, stands dissolved, and the cancelled charter shall be forthwith returned to The National executive committee" at Toronto.

That the choice and erection of a monument shall be placed in the hands of a committee of five men to be called "The Citizens' Monument Committee," consisting of the following five citizens of London, namely, His Honor Judge Macbeth, Mayor Beattie, Col. J. W. Little, Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore and Thomas H. Smallman. That such committee may choose and erect such a monument as

the majority may decide upon.

The present monument fund shall be forthwith transferred to the committee in trust to be dealt with as follows: All moneys raised and contributed to the monument fund by any primary chapter shall, if requested, within six weeks from the date hereof, be refunded to such primary chapter.

That the donors of specific subscriptions to the monument fund shall, upon request, receive back the sums subscribed by them respectively. if they do not wish the moneys applied towards the erection of such monument as The Citizens' Monument Committee may decide upon. The balance of the monument fund shall be applied in payment for the erection of any monument which the Citizens' ment Committee may decide to erect.





ITALIAN DESTITUTION

More Money for Charity Than Anywhere Else, Also Yet More Poverty. London, March 29. - Efforts are

being made to diminish destitution in Italy, and thus prevent begging on the streets, and with this object in view Prof. Trevisonno is giving a series of lectures in which he explains causes of pauperism in Ialy, and suggests the remedies to combat it.

It is a noteworthy fact, he says, that a sum amounting to about \$441,200,000 is invested in charitable institutions workhouses, hospitals, free kitchens and other benevolent works for the relief of the poor in Italy, and yet this country is afflicted by destitution to a far greater extent than any other in Europe. The reason, according to Prof. Trevissonno, is to be found in the fact that charitable institutions are badly organized and mismanaged in Italy, and that the money invested yields only a yearly income of \$10.-600,000, of which fully \$8,000,000 is absorbed by administrative expenses.

Misappropriations are very common.

The municipal administrations in Italy are supposed to spend \$15,000,000 for charitable purposes, but as a matter of fact the poor get very little of this

They are adopted by the mind with-out any of that reflection to which

we subject our ideas in after life. We

are, in short, hypnotized, for the es-

sence of hypnotism consists in suggestibility, the capacity, namely, for being imposed on by suggestion.

FERRERO IN NEW ROLE

Becomes Champion of Christopher

Columbus as Discoverer. Paris, March 28. - Christopher Columbus is again haled before the court of public opinion to show cause why he should be styled discoverer of America, instead of confessing that an unknown and almost forgotten adventurous pilot made the first voyage across the Atlantic, confiding his story to Columbus and then dying.


The indictment charges that, acting on the theory that dead men tell no tales, Columbus kept this confidence to himself, and then repeated the trip. and gathered to himself alone the taurels that he has worn for four centuries. Guglielmo Ferrero, an eminent Italian historian, has brought the issue of discovery again to the front in the Figaro by springing to the defence of the Genoese explorer, as against the researches of Henry Vignaud, until recently and for many years first secretary of the American embassy in Paris. Credit Due to Sanchez.

His researches lend plausibility to the story often vaguely hinted that a sailor friend of Columbus, probably a pilot named Alonzo Sanchez, was the original discoverer of America. In his opinion this story is more likely to be true than historians are commonly willing to admit.

According to the version which h credits, Sanchez was blown westward by heavy gales for four weeks while on a voyage to England. These persist ent mishaps carried him at last, Vignaud thinks, to the islands now known as the Antilles. The trip back, according to Vignaud, was long and disastrous, all but four of the crew of seventeen dying of disease or starva

When Sanchez at last found a home port, the story runs, he went to the house of his friend, Columbus, thoroughly broken in health. He did not leave there alive, but before dying he gave Columbus the details of his dis-Ferrero says that Vignaud is the

only serious historian who credits the Sanchez story. The Italian advances no contrary proof or new proof other-wise, but asserts that even if Vignaud may be correct, the story of Columbus



Twelve Thousand on the Way From the Old World. Montreal, March 28.-Advices received

by railway companies in Montreal show that the present week will be a recordbreaker for this year in the immigration business, and one of the busiest during many years. 


