



RUSSIANS HAVE TAKEN GATEWAY TO HUNGARY

PETROGRAD, via London, Aug. 15.—10:30 p.m.—The Russians have captured Jablonitza, one of the most important gateways through the Carpathians to the Hungarian plains, and have taken nearly 1,500 additional prisoners, according to an official statement issued by the war office tonight. The text of the statement follows:

"Gur troops continue the crossing of the Zlota Lipa under enemy fire, which at many points hampers the construction of bridges. Heavy artillery and machine gun fire is being directed against our works. In this sector we captured seven officers, 413 men and three machine guns.

"In the Carpathian woods at the mouth of the Pruth, the enemy evacuated Jablonitza, which we occupied. In the region of Ardjeliuf on the Pruth, we have made progress, taking 32 officers and over a thousand men prisoner. Our offensive continues."
