Sales were draggy in the early part of the market, but later on in the day business was lively; on the whole the market could be considered a fairly brisk one.

Grain—Oats were in brisk demand at 97c to \$1 per cwt for new oats, and cots sold at \$1.05 per cwt. Wheat

Fruits—Apples were dull at 35c to 50c a bag or 25c to 35c per bushel. Pears were plentiful at 50c to \$1 per bushel, most of the sales being made at 70c to 75c. Peaches sold well at \$1 per basket for choice stock, for seconds 65c to 75c was asked; plums were scarce at 40c to 50c for the common blue plums and 60c to 75c for choice stock. Musk Melons were dull at \$1 per dozen for fairly large sized.





These amount to two generals, 256 officers and 21,800 soldiers. In addition 133 guns were lost. The material losses include fortifications costing \$30,000,000.





MUSIC HALLS OF OLD LONDON

TAKEN VERY SERIOUSLY IN LONDON-BLSEWHERE THEY ARE DEEMED TRIFLES AND LIGHT AS AIR."

Nowhere else in the world do they take music halls as serously as they do in England. Nowhere else, indeed, do they take them seriously at all. Here their affairs are of wide and grave interest. Every autumn, when they are re-licensed, county councils debate their v'rtues and shortcomings as solemnly and minutely as they would a new system of street railways. In the courts eminent counsel argue and learned judges decide where their rights end, and those of "regular" theaters begin. Editorial writers comment portentously on the consequences of these decisions. The "halls" are the bugbear of "regular" managers, because they have a larger and more faithful public than the theaters, and because the law now permits them to give morsels of drama, usually in the form of comic or sentimental sketches. 

A pyrethrum smudge or smoke may be started by covering a live coal, taken from the kitchen stove, with the powder, first placing the coal upon a small shovel, so that it may be moved about conveniently without danger of setting anything on fire. The pyrethrum will quickly begin to smolder and give off a dense smoke. All that now necessary is to add from time to time a pinch of the powder, as occasion requires, merely keeping the smoldering ashes covered so that the





New Rifle for Army Next Year The ordnance experts of the army, after months of hard work, have succeeded in perfecting a five-shot magazine rifle, which is believed to be superior to any in use in foreign armies. Forty thousand of the new rifles have already been completed, but it is not proposed to being their distribution to the regular army until 100,000-sufficient to supply the regular establishment on a war footing -have been completed

The new rifle is of .20 calibre, and its most interesting teature is the covered barrel, the steel plate protected by a wooden covering to within two inches of the trule. This is considered a great imprive. During the Spanish-American war and the campaign in the Philippines, many complaints against the rifle now in use reached the War Department. 


