French Repulse Powerful Foe Offensive Hun Air Raid on Harwich This Morning

BRITISH FLYERS BOMB BRUGES DOCKS; HEAVY FIGHTING ON RUSSIAN FRONT

Germans Suffered Terrible Losses in all Night Offensive Action on French Front--Good Results From British Air Raid--Eight Killed and Twenty-two Civilians Wounded in Hun Raid on Essex This Morning--Twelve or Fourteen Aeroplanes in Foe Fleet--Ammunition Depot at Lichtervelde Attacked With Bombs.

GERMAN AIR RAID ON ESSEX COAST

LONDON, July 4.—An official statement says that early this morning a fleet of twelve to fourteen German aeroplanes attacked Harwich on the Essex coast, dropping a number of bombs. Eight persons were killed and 22 others injured. Only slight material damage was caused.

SUCCESSFUL BRITISH AIR RAID AT BRUGES

LONDON, July 4.—An official statement says that yesterday the Royal Flying Corps carried out bombing raids on the Bruges docks and the ammunition depots at Lichtervelde. Several tons of bombs were dropped and good results were observed.

FIGHTING CONTINUES ON RUSSIAN FRONT

LONDON, July 4.—Petrograd despatches report that the fighting southwest of Brzezany continues heavy.

COMPLETE REPULSE OF FOE DRIVE

PARIS, July 4.—A French war office statement says that late yesterday the Germans undertook a powerful offensive action, which was prolonged all night, against all the French positions north of Jouy and as far east as the California plateau. The repulse of the enemy was complete and his losses on this long front were very heavy especially in the region of Cerny.

ENEMY EVACUATES BRZEZANY AS RUSSIANS ATTACK

LONDON, July 3.—The Austro-German forces are evacuating Brzezany, 50 miles southeast of Lemberg, the capital of Ga-

licia, says a Reuter's despatch from Petrograd. The Russians have invested Brzezany from the northeast, southeast and southwest. Units of four Russian armies, the despatch adds, are co-operating in the Galician advance, covering a front of about 20 miles. These units with the approval of the commander-in-chief are resolving to do or die in the supreme test of Russia's manhood. They are called respectively, regiments, battalions, companies, batteries and squadrons of "death." They wear black and red stripes on their cuffs with a death's head on crossed swords. The Russians have widened the gap made by their first attacks near Zlochoff, according to Berlin. They have driven the Germans across the Little Stripa River.

U-BOATS TWICE ATTACK AMERICAN TRANSPORTS

WASHINGTON, July 3.—That two vicious attacks were made by U-Boats on the American transports and convoys carrying the American expeditionary force to Europe was made known today in an official statement issued by Secretary of the Navy, Daniels, on the occasion of the arrival, today, of the last contingent of General Pershing's forces at a French port. After felicitating the American people on the safe arrival of every fighting man and every ship the secretary says, in part:

"The transports bearing our troops were twice attacked by German submarines on the way across. On both occasions the U-Boats were beaten off with every appearance of loss. One was certainly sunk, and there is reason to believe that the accurate fire of our gunners sent others to the bottom.

"For purposes of convenience, the expeditions was divided into contingents, each contingent including troopships and a naval escort designed to keep off such German raiders as might be met.

THE TRAGEDY IN MARMORA

Inquest Into Death of James Gallagher Resumes Tomorrow

Interest centers in Marmora village and township around the killing of James Gallagher on the township road on the eighth concession of Marmora on Saturday afternoon. Feeling is intense in the matter.

Medical testimony at the hearing at the village yesterday before Magistrate Hubbell and William Bonter was given to show how Gallagher met death. Dr. Thompson who saw the remains, found a small black and blue mark above the temple of the dead man; the neck was fractured and the nose broken. To Crown Attorney Carnew, Dr. Thompson expressed the view that death resulted from a blow on the temple, but to Mr. W. D. M. Shorey of this city he expressed the opinion that likely the fracture of the neck and the blow on the skull combined to cause death.

Samuel Rogers whose home is

near Marmora and who is charged with having caused Gallagher's death, was, according to the evidence given yesterday by Edward Story, of the belief that Gallagher who was a man of 34 years, was trying to run on Story who had been left with them, the overseer having left. While working on the road doing statute labor, Gallagher and Rogers, so said Story, were wrangling all Saturday afternoon. He stated that Gallagher seemed to be the instigator, teasing and taunting. During the wordy combat, Gallagher invited Rogers to settle the matter by a fight but Rogers did not accept the challenge. Finally Gallagher took Story away to dig some gravel. Story seemed of the opinion that Rogers believed Gallagher was "licking on" him (Story) and overworking him. After some interference on the part of Rogers with Gallagher's orders to Story, Gallagher is said to have launched a phrase at Rogers about him being a "Protestant." Rogers retorted with the accusation that Gallagher was "a papist" the same disgusting word being used in each case. Rogers who had got down from the gravel wagon on which he had been working, had his shovel with the spade end before him, as if to defend himself or ward off any possible attack. Story testified that Gallagher rushed at Rog-

CITIZENS RUN FOUL LAW

Subpened by Board of Health, Agree to Build Proper Boxes for Manure

The Belleville Board of Health this morning successfully prosecuted two cases against citizens who had failed to comply with the bylaw regarding the placing of stable manure in a properly covered receptacle. Col. Ponton, K.C. for the first defendant urged that there was no manure. The intention was not to

apply rigidly the bylaw. Magistrate Masson said the bylaw was a provincial bylaw. The whole question was whether there was any manure bylaw within the meaning of the law.

Dr. H. A. Yeomans, medical officer of health, stated that there was no attempt at persecution, but the defendant refused to construct a box for the manure so as to prevent the breeding of flies. The premises were otherwise clean.

Col. Ponton "Has not the bylaw been broken by the dumping of manure by the city on a lot with the approval of the Board of Health?"

Dr. Yeomans "The city has promised that there will be no more manure placed there."

The defendant undertook to prepare a proper receptacle. The magistrate said nothing would be done if the defendant provided a box and flies were the spreaders of disease.

The defendants in both cases paid the costs and will arrange proper boxes.

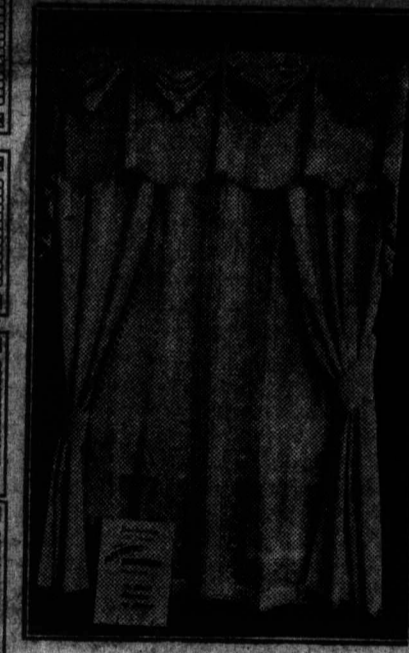
