He says the ledge is between 45 and 50 feet wide and assays of samples taken from five different points gave average returns wide and assays of samples taken from five different points gave average returns of \$16 per ton. There is no sign of this ledge on the surface. The ledge is in the northern portion of the mine. On the south side there is another large ledge, which was recently uncovered on the surface by the railway graders. A crosscut is being driven toward this. Besides these two ledges there is the one on which a great deal of work has been done and which is opened to the 300-foot level.


