**Here and There**

Nova Scotia has adopted the "drive to the right" rule of the road, the bill providing the change having received the assent of the administrator of the province.

The year 1922 was a banner year for Montreal in the number and tonnage of ships which came to the port, a total of 6,983 ships of 13,089,699 tons arriving, as compared with 5,541 ships of 9,735,450 tons in 1921.

Canada led the world in 1922 in the export of raw furs to the United States. The total fur catch for that year was over 4,000,000 pelts, valued at \$16,000,000. While the general price of furs shows a downward trend, the total catch shows a remarkable increase.

Four of the Canadian Pacific "Empress" liners, the Britain, the France, the Scotland and the India, are to load grain at Quebec during the 1923 season, and new berths have been provided for these vessels near the grain conveyors, at a cost of \$300,000.


When she was alighting from a street car in Vancouver, Mrs. Rose McLaren received injuries which prevented her from concentrating and temporarily did away with her earning power as a spiritualist or psychic reader. She was awarded \$1,250 against the railway company.

The addition of the 17,000-ton "Montclair" to the Canadian Pacific "Mono Class" fleet marks an important development. Not only is she the largest one-class-cabin ship sailing to and from Canadian ports, but she is the largest in her class on the Atlantic. Her length is 613 feet and breadth 68 feet. Because of her size she will sail to and from Quebec.

Approximately 8,000 tons of silver ore are waiting shipment from the Keno Hill, Yukon, mines. This quantity represents the winter haul. Another 2,000 tons may be moved this summer, making the total silver shipments ten thousand tons for 1923. Such an output is worth about \$2,000,000, high grade ore running from \$200 to \$300 per ton.

"The greatest feat of steam transportation to my knowledge," said C. E. Stockdill, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, recently, "was the movement of the grain crop of 1922." From Sept. 1 to Nov. 31, a period of 91 days, the Canadian Pacific Railway loaded and shipped an average of 1,265 cars per day. This requiring the dispatching of a train every 45 minutes during that entire period, carrying more than 1,000,000 bushels daily. This movement exceeded even that of the bumper crop year of 1915.

One of the many instances of the splendid work carried out at the Liverpool docks is afforded by the Canadian Pacific liner "Metagama." On a recent arrival at that port she started the discharge of her cargo and coaling at 6 o'clock in the morning. Allowing for the usual dinner break, she took on board in her side hold 1,000 tons of coal, which was stowed by 2.45 the same day. At the same time she discharged 700 tons of cargo, the discharge of which consisted of 1,000 cases of fruit, completing this work at 7.15 the same evening.

**Roguing Potatoes.**  
The average yield of potatoes per acre in the Province of Ontario for the past thirty-six years has been about one hundred and fifteen bushels. The yields vary greatly. In 1917 there were variations in Ontario from twenty-five or less up to seven hundred bushels per acre. People are realizing more and more that for high yields of potatoes conditions must be favorable. It is important to have good fertile soil well cultivated and to plant a liberal supply of seed of the best varieties at the proper time. Seed potatoes somewhat immature which have been produced in a cool climate, and which are comparatively free from disease, are apt to furnish seed of high quality. Even under these conditions it is well to carefully inspect the seed before planting and to thoroughly rogue the growing crop.

A potato field is rogued by removing the undesirable plants. A thorough roguing of the growing crop once or twice during the summer is one of the most effectual ways in ridding the field of a number of the potato diseases. This operation would also insure the immediate removal of the weak and unthrifty plants which are sure to produce undesirable seed. Potato growers sometimes go through their fields and remove all plants which are not true to type. When roguing is done with a double object of eradicating diseases and of purifying the variety decided advantages are sure to follow. Thorough roguing is one of the best methods of securing pure, healthy seed of high quality.—Dr. C. A. Zavitz, O. A. College, Guelph.

If troubled with mustard in grain crops, spray with a 20 per cent. solution of iron sulphate (two pounds of iron sulphate to each gallon of water.)

Every farm and country home should feed itself, and to do this it is necessary for each family to grow garden vegetables and small fruits. All corn cribs and grain bins should be carefully inspected to see that they are rat and mouse proof. A concrete foundation for storage buildings is advisable whenever it is practicable.






## BY AUTO ON THE GULF OF GEORGIA



An inspiring vista of the west coast Archipelago.


WHO has not heard of the thousand isles of the Gulf of Georgia? This Gulf is a ramification of the great strait of Juan de Fuca famed in legend and history, through which the Spanish navigators sailed hundreds of years ago, and which is now one of the important trade routes of the world. It separates Vancouver Island from the mainland of British Columbia and the State of Washington, and is one of the most beautiful waterways known to man.

The city of Victoria, at the extreme south end of Vancouver Island, has several ferry lines connecting it with the mainland, but as the steamship services in the past have proved inadequate for the large crowds of summer visitors and motor tourists, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has put into service a fast-going vessel which operates twice daily between Victoria and Bellingham, Washington. The ferry is an important addition to the Canadian Pacific fleet and its name, "Motor Princess," is appropriate in that it is the first vessel of the company, operating on the Pacific, to be equipped with internal combustion engines. These engines give the boat a speed of about fourteen knots. On the two main decks there is parking space for fifty automobiles, and there is well appointed accommodation for two hundred and fifty passengers, saloon, restaurant,

smoking room and deck spaces for promenading. The route travelled by the ferry is marked by islands, some of them many miles in extent, others gem-like little islets which make the waterway a succession of magnificent pictures. The traveller is further entranced by the magnificent view of Mount Baker standing garbed in its everlasting mantle of snow among its satellites the foothills. This lordly mountain is on the mainland near Bellingham, and, beautiful and inspiring, it is seen at its best when travelling to or from Victoria.


