

#### Ella Wheeler Wilcox

In 1883 Ella Wheeler, a girl from Wisconsin then in her 28th year, published a small volume of poems that she daringly titled 'Poems of Passion." Better known to the latter-day world by her married name Ella Wheeler Wilcox was propably the most widely known writer in the United

Her own story of her life, published last year as "The World and I," is a very human document and reveals her as in evey way a womanly woman. Such education as she gained was largely self-won, and she learned in the hard school of experience what she later voiced in song.

But when the hand of death touched the poetess and the husband with whom she had spent 32 years of happy wedded life was taken from her side, Mrs. Wilcox proved herself capable of a more exalted strain and her poetic genius rose to greater heights in "Sor.nets of Sorrow and Triumph,

The life of Ella Wheeler Wilcox was a happy one, and happy even in the days of her great berevement. Both she and her husband were attracted to the study of psychic phenomena and later became convinced believers in the possibility of communication with the spirits of the departed. In prospect of death they had agreed that whichever was taken first should strive most urgently to deliver a message from the other world, After a period of anxious waiting Mrs. Wilcox believed that it had been through the medium of the Ouija board and that it required her to go into war service. She went first to England and then to France, joining the Red Cross work, nursing in hospita's and, what was her most memorable service, talking to the soldiers at the rest camps and even at the front, and counselling them to maintain moral purity and to keep devotedly to high ideals of life and conduct. In that service ed her brave life, but doubtless she welcomed the dread messenger that summoned her to the reunion that was the one craving of her heart.



The vocational act passed by the New Brunswick Legislature in 1918, which will widen the scope of the educational system of the province, will become effective in the school work of the present year. The act is administered by a vocational education board composed of nine members. Five of these will represent labor, farming, manufacturing and commerce. The other four will be the superintendent of education, the principal of the Normal School, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and the director of Agricultural education.

Members of the House of Commons, who were opposed to the passage of the "Conditional Prohibition" law, declare that the Act will be attacked in the courts the first time it is invoked. These point out that the Act was passed on Sunday, and declare that the Lord's Day Act, until that statute is repealed, is binding on Parliament, as on other eiements of the community. They point to the rules of the House to show that Sunday sittings are irregular and further, falling hack on precedent, claim that such a course was neva er followed before by the Canadian Parliament. Even during the famous naval debate, a Sabbath truce was called. The bill in question was put through the House of Commons shortly before 1 e'clock on Sunday morning.

The employment of airships as sanatoria for the treatment of tuberculosis and other diseases is advocated by a doctor who was attached to the British air force during the war. The patients, it is pointed out, would be able to Hve for several days or even weeks at a height of about five thousand feet, enjoying complete rest and breathing air as pure and invigorating as that of any of the famous mountain resorts which only the rich can afford to visit, The big airships built by England for war purposes, the doctor says, can be fitted up as sanatoria for patients suffering from consumption, anaemia, neurasthenia and other ills, and except in very bad weather, can cruise about for weeks at a time.

Farmers Can Handle the Job.

As predicted the now government of Ontario is formed from Farmers' Liberal and Labor parties. The Farmers, as the strongest party, take the largest number of portfolios, but they allow the Liberals and Labor some representation in the Cabinet so as to get their support in the Legislature. Up to the time of the announcement that the Farmers would form a government in cooperation with the Liberals and Labor, it was amusing to read in the press expressions of doubt as to whether the Farmers would be able to form a government, or whether they could carry on if they did. #### Fire Waste

According to the Insurance Companies carelesness is the principal cause of fires. That is a broad statement. All fires, not kindled with incendiary intent, are supposed to be controlled for a definite purpose; there is no doubt carelessness somewhere if the fire passes from control. The high proportion of fires in Canada may be partly due to careless handling of fire or potential fire; partly to careless construction of houses, and partly to the fact that carelessness with fire in wooden houses is much more dangerous than in buildings of brick or stone. Canadian losses by fire are enormous, if figures supplied from insurance sources are reliable. In 1918 Canada's per capita fire loss was reported at \$4.00; the United
