



WHO THE SOLDIERS ARE

According to a return tabled in the ions last week by the minist of militia, there were 14,100 French Canadian soldiers in the total of 312,-000 men of the Canadian expeditionary forces sent overseas up to the end or April last. The number of nativehorn Canadians speaking the English language who had gone overseas, is given as 125,245 and the number of British subjects born outside of Canada, who have one overseas 155,095. The French-Canadians therefore, about twelve per cent. of the native-born Canadians in the

Canadian army now overseas. The British-born members of the C. E. F. outnumber the Canadian-born by approximately fifteen thousand. There are no figures available as to the number of naturalized British subiects in the Canadian army.

The return shows that 5,443 French Canadians are serving with units or ganized in Quebec and commanded by officers speaking the Frenc's language, while 1,536 French-Canadian soldiers are serving with Quebec bat talions commanded by officers speaking English. The number of French Canadian soldiers serving in units organized outside the province of Que bec is given as 5.904. These figures however, do not include the 1.217 French-Canadians in the first contingent. These were all re-attested at Valcartier and their original place of enlistment is not shown on the re-

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may home-lead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain

conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon Dutes—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where reside is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-enquarter-section alongside his

stead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning estead patent: also 50 acres e tra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead A settler who has exhausted his

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 aeres and erect a house worth \$300.
