The role of the priest is not to take part directly in the struggle, but to advise the fairbful, and to remind them that they are called upon to come to an understanding with other Catholics and to vote as Catholics; that over and above parties there is in the Church, whose essential rights must be safeguarded, and Christian teaching for which complete liberty should be claimed. All the faithful withou distinction should offer up prayer in order that the electors may under stand and do their duty. Let us pray for France and pray for the
