Drowning at Indian Pond.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Death cometh to all alike—both old and young—but how it will come, or when, no one can foretell. Again it has come as a sorrowful calamity, this time to a little boy, Stephen Morgan, beloved son of George and Louisa Morgan, residents of Indian Pond, C.B. The circumstances connected with his death are briefly as follows:— On Sunday afternoon this little lad, aged 6 1/2 years, went out from his home, accompanied by his little brother and two other little children, to play on the ice. They wandered up to the railway track until they came to a deep hole in the pond, where there was no ice. Two of the other children, his little brother and another little girl, went home, leaving Stephen and another little boy aged 3 years playing together. Although there are houses all around the eastern and southern part of this pond no one saw the little boy, Stephen, falling into the water. At last the little boy, aged 3, ran towards home and with tears rolling down over his little rosy cheeks told "that Stephen jumped into the water and was kicking with his feet. Meanwhile the mother, alarmed at the absence of her son, went over to the place where she last saw them playing. Not thinking that her boy lay in that very spot she threw in a little stone at some object which she thought was a bough. Then leaving the place she hurried off to a friend's house to see if he was there. Finding no trace of him she went to a friend nearby and asked him to go and look in the hole. He went and saw the poor little body floating, but was unable to reach it. Others soon were on the scene and ere long the little body was recovered just as it was drifting under the ice. It was indeed a sad occurrence as the little boy, his face white with sea foam, was carried into the house from which about an hour ago he had left in buoyant spirits to play.

Household Notes.

All bottles and cruets are best cleaned with hot soapuds. Salt mixed with vinegar is excellent for cleaning copper. A pinch of salt added to cream will make it whip more easily. Clean greasy skillets while they are hot and use a little soda in the water. To scald tomatoes easily, place them in a thin bag and dip in boiling water. Turpentine mixed with black lead and brushed over a greasy stove is very effectual in cleaning it. To save grease when frying doughnuts put half a teaspoonful of ginger in the grease when hot. Chopped preserved ginger added to the sauce served with cottage pudding is a delicious accompaniment. To give a very delicate scent, place a large piece oforris root in the water in which lingerie is washed. To keep salt meat from moulding, rub every fortnight with white of egg in which has been mixed a little salt. To clean and tighten canvas seats, soak if it is needed. Then in the open air. If the cellar is dark, it is a good plan to have the bottom step painted white, so that it can be seen in the dim light. To wash fine lace, soak it in suds in the sun for two or three days. Change the water and rub gently every day. To render children's clothing fire-proof, dissolve a level tablespoonful of sal ammoniac in the last rinsing water. To get the best results from dried fruits, put to soak in warm water to which a generous pinch of salt has been added. A tasty dessert is made of squash or pumpkin prepared as for a pie. It is baked in a pudding dish like a baked custard. A palette knife is a great help in the kitchen for cleaning cake dough from the mixing bowl and for many other uses. A rag sponge can be bought at any paint shop, and is the best thing that can be used for keeping the bathtub and lavatory clean and dry. To remove iron rust, wet the spots with salt and lemon juice, hold the material over the steam of a tea-kettle and then put out in the sun. Never boil a silk handkerchief or rub soap on it. Wash in suds made of fine white soap, squeeze out, half dry in the sun and iron while damp. Mold can be kept from the top of preserves by putting a few drops of glycerine around the edge of the jar before screwing down the cover cap. Individual tarts are much served nowadays with fruit or pumpkin filling and with ice cream or whipped cream on top; with them serve coffee. Stephen was a general favorite, especially with his playmates, and as he was one of my pupils, I wish to convey my deepest sympathy to the sorrowing ones for their heart-felt loss; and when his fragile form is carried to that sacred hill-side to be laid in a lonely grave, there to await the final call, many, many hearts will overflow in sincere sorrow for this young life which on earth has passed away, but now where his little spirit is surely resting in a far happier home beyond, within the loving arms of a Saviour and a friend to the little children. Safely, safely gathered in. Far from sorrow, far from sin; No more childish griefs or fears. No more sadness, no more tears. ### Mr. A. B. Morine Attacked

IN CANADIAN COMMONS.

It will be noticed in the despatch from Ottawa that Mr. Carvell made certain charges against Mr. A. B. Morine. He told the story of Mr. Morine's dismissal by Governor Murray because he was solicitor to Mr. R. G. Reid at the time of the '98 contract. According to this message he stated that after Mr. Morine's reinstatement by Governor McCallum he was again dismissed because he continued as solicitor to Mr. Reid. As we have stated in our note, everyone here knows that the second charge is without foundation, that the cause of Mr. Morine's retirement from the Winter Ministry were because of internal disagreements in the Executive, that the late Sir James Winter found it impossible to work with him and called upon him to retire. As to the reasons Mr. Morine left Newfoundland there have been many suspicions here, but it has never been definitely ascertained why Mr. Morine left, beyond the fact that he disagreed with Mr. W. D. Reid. But a law suit was instituted which we reported at great length at the time. It was generally known as the Daily News Mortgage Case, Mr. Mott being the editor at the time. Some six months later the Daily News changed hands, and Mr. Morine left the country. One feature of the charges is that they have all to do with some transactions which took place in Newfoundland and not with anything that he has done in Canada; but in spite of all this Mr. Borden states that standing where he always did in regard to the character of public servants, that he considers the charges grave, that he will give Mr. Morine an opportunity of answering the charges, and then will announce to Parliament the course he intends to pursue in reference to Mr. Morine, who occupies the office of Chairman of the Public Service Commission.

**FIVE NEW CHURCH.**—A fine new Anglican Church was finished the past week at North River. It is 72 by 35 feet, can seat about 600 and is interiorly as well as exteriorly a very handsome edifice. The plans were drawn and the church built by Mr. Edward Doran for the pastor, Rev. E. C. Clench, who is most energetic and zealous. A new school will also be started shortly.

### To-Day's News. The Police Court.

Special to Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, To-day. In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Carvell, Liberal, attacked Mr. A. B. Morine, chairman of the Public Service Commission. The charge was that during his career in Newfoundland politics Mr. Morine had been Reid's Solicitor, while a member of the Government which treated with regard to the famous Reid contract, but he had later quarrelled with Reid and had by him been practically exiled from Newfoundland. That Reid continued to pay him ten thousand a year, his salary as Solicitor to the end of 1911 on condition he left the Colony. Part of the charge was that in 1898 Mr. Morine had been dismissed from his post of Finance Minister by Governor Murray, on the ground he was Reid's Solicitor, and that in 1899 being reinstated by Governor McCallum, he gave an undertaking not to act as Reid's Solicitor. Notwithstanding which he continued to do so and was dismissed, a second time. Premier Borden said he regarded the charges made by Mr. Carvell as grave. He stood where he stood in former years as to the character of persons appointed to office, and would place the charges before Mr. Morine and give him an opportunity to make an answer. Then he would announce to the House and country what his action would be. Mr. Morine made a statement to the Press in reply to Mr. Carvell, giving his version of the matter and quoting Governor McCallum's letter in reinstating him as an Executive Councilor. [It will be in the memory of most people here that the retirement of Mr. Morine from the Winter Government on the second occasion was not based on the charge alleged by Mr. Carvell, but on the ground that the late Premier Winter could not work with him.—Ed.]

ALLAN'S LICENSE SURRENDERED. Two drunks were discharged. Sgt. Byrne vs. T. J. Allan for a breach of the 33rd section of the License Act. Defendant pleaded guilty and surrendered his license. The judge intimated to counsel that he would like them to agree as to the time to be allowed for the disposal of the stock, and thereupon the matter was postponed till counsel have so agreed and judgment was deferred. Higgins for defendant. Squires for prosecution.



### A Hornet's Nest

DISCOVERED BY MR. McGRATH.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—I see the Editor of the Chronicle is coming to life again, as evidenced by the mud and filthy slime which appears on the pages of that champion mud-slinging paper to-night. The idea of the Editor of the Chronicle venturing into the realm of political economy science is about as incongruous a proceeding as one can well imagine. As well expect a lesson on the solar system from an Esquimo as to expect light from the Editor of the Chronicle on the subject of political economy. The writer of "Newfoundland in 1911" to have the consummate cheek to deride the reasoning of Mr. Keitt shows an amount of gall on his part which is truly amazing. He must have been reading some since he wrote the travesty, "Newfoundland in 1911," for I notice some high-sounding terms copied from some work on political economy. The Editor of the Chronicle, in the world of words, is like an infant in the world of sounds. The one producing a tempo of sound laughs with glee at his booter mousie, the other getting up a din of the words, thinks he is giving out reason.

I think he is very dense indeed who cannot grasp the fact that when a country is importing vastly more than she is exporting she is at a great disadvantage. A citing of figures showing how the imports of Canada exceed her exports is no argument, and does not apply to our case at all. The fact of Canada being in that position is no argument against the position advanced. That a country to be truly and substantially prosperous must at least balance imports with exports. To be in a position to purchase we must have produced something that can exchange for what we require. If our requirements exceed our ability to provide, these requirements we are in poverty. I think any person of any reason can see the truth of that. Now internal trade has nothing whatever to do with the question in the light in which the Minister of Finance and the Chronicle would use it. That internal trade cannot be separated from our external trade, but is dependent upon it. The factors that produce that internal trade are not all sufficing but must rely on our imports and exports, just as though they were directly engaged in creating the external trade. We will take the lumber trade, because the Chronicle selects that trade as an instance in support of his illogical position. The men who produce lumber cannot directly clothe themselves in lumber, neither can they feed on boards or sawdust. They exchange their lumber for groceries and food. The grocer and the tailor give them clothes and food for their lumber; the grocer and the tailor build houses of the lumber. Another kind of exchange now takes place and the lumber is changed into money. The carpenter who builds the houses receives money in exchange for his time. The lumber, as lumber, no longer exists. The carpenter sends his money out of the country for commodities, he becomes an importer. Now you see how internal and external trade are but one trade manifesting themselves in different directions. The lumber man gives his lumber to the tailor and grocer in exchange for imported articles; the tailor and grocer hire the carpenter who converts the lumber of the tailor and grocer into time and receives money for his time or labor. The money which he receives again goes out for articles that are imported, and thus the articles of trade are made to pulsate, through all the different phases of our activity.

A newspaper article is scarcely the medium through which such tyros as the Editor of the Chronicle and our Finance Minister can be educated in the principles of political economy. However even the most stupid may learn a little even though it be to respect those who have acquired knowledge. He laughs best who laughs last, ha, ha, Go way back and sit down Messrs. Cashin and McGrath.



### The Miners' Wages' Act.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.  
The Government Minimum Wage Bill became law yesterday and received the Royal Assent, simultaneously. Balloting by coal miners throughout British Isles is proceeding to settle the question whether strikers should return to work or let the mines lie idle, pending the decision by the District Boards provided for in the Bill, as to what the rate of wages shall be in various coal mine districts. While the result of the balloting will not be known officially until next Thursday, there was prevalent everywhere, a feeling of optimism that the vote would favor a resumption of work and that in the meantime thousands of miners would return to work in anticipation of such a decision. The only stumbling block in the way of a speedy termination of the strike seems to be the attitude of the surface men who still have some grievances unsatisfied. Their National Federation has issued a manifesto in all its branches to the effect that there must be no resumption of work by any section of the Federation, until the owners have conceded their demands. It is believed, however, that this dispute will be settled before the result of the general balloting is announced.

### Anthracite Miners Strike.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
CLEVELAND, To-day.  
Formal orders for suspension of all operations in the Anthracite Mines, beginning April 1st, were issued by the United Mine Workers yesterday. President White said the suspension would be equal to a strike except that men at the pumps and others necessary for the protection of mine property would be kept at work.

### An Important Petition.

An important petition forwarded to Mr. Clapp, M. H. A., for St. Barbe, by the Rev. J. S. Richards representing some 1,500 constituents from Pistolet Bay to St. John's Bay. Mr. Clapp asked that the petition be read by the Clerk of the Assembly. The petition sets forth that the law respecting the netting of herring be altered and that they be allowed the use of seines on that part of the coast, giving for this reason that the swiftness of the currents in the Straits and the shallow water makes the sea so rough that it is impossible to set out the nets without running the risk of their being destroyed.

The second prayer of the petition asked for the right to take seals after the 31st of May. There is no law preventing the taking of seals except in steamers or vessels; and the 3rd, to extend the law for killing deer from the 31st January to the 10th March. The introducer of the petition dwelt very strongly upon the request of the petitioners re shooting of caribou and pointed out that that of the District of St. Barbe was differently situated from any other parts of the Island for the reason that the main herd of caribou begins to move south about the early part of October, therefore there could be no wholesale destruction of the animals even if the people desired it, but there need be no fear of that as the fishermen merely kill for their own consumption. It isn't the fishermen who destroy the deer but the sportsmen who come here from abroad; we have seen it in the past.

The hon. member then referred to some cases tried before Magistrate Duder at Port Saunders in 1907 when these men had hunted deer on several occasions in the open season and failed to find them, and from dire necessity and from want of fresh meat for themselves and their families went out during the close season and shot several deer and divided them up amongst themselves. They were tried by Magistrate Duder and although the strongest testimony was adduced at the trial and with the law giving the Magistrate discretionary power in the case of settlers shooting for their own consumption, yet they were each fined \$10 and costs. Mr. Clapp here read affidavits from these fishermen in proof of their condition at the time of the trial. He said you must consider that these fishermen are cut off from any other civilized place during the long winter months. He referred to the discussion which took place in this House over the establishment of sanatoria, but now the Government were afforded an opportunity of taking a step in the way of helping to stamp out tuberculosis by granting the people an extension of the law and allowing them to secure fresh meat for themselves and their families in an almost Arctic climate where fresh meat is a primary essential to the good vigorous blood which is the life and stability of the race.

### Angling in Nfld.

Abstract of Official Returns Published in Forest and Stream, N.Y., by W. J. Carroll.

The reports from the salmon rivers last season show that the fishing has been the best on record; and further, that with due and proper protection in the near future, Newfoundland will furnish the very best angling in the world.

There were over ninety rivers warded last year, and the breeding salmon were protected. The mouths of the rivers were cleared of nets, and so the larger fish got up the rivers unimpeded, with the result that the number of fish caught weighing 20 lbs. was away beyond anything ever before known.

A large number of fish taken with the rod and fly weighed from 20 to 33 lbs.

Of course these were not nearly so plentiful as those caught under 20 lbs., but were sufficient to show that in all the rivers larger fish are being caught in greater numbers each year; and it is not too much to hope that the record as it stands now, namely 33½ lbs., will be easily and often beaten during the next season or two.

The number reported under twenty pounds was much larger than usual—5,944 fish, weighing 31,591 pounds. These figures are the official ones furnished by the wardens and guides, and do not include many other fish caught and not reported. Still the figures show an enormous increase in the total catch, and all the facts go to show that this grand result may in a few years be multiplied tenfold, and still our rivers would not unduly suffer.


While some good streams show magnificent fishing, other equally good ones show comparatively poor results, for the reason that the former class were visited by a larger number of anglers.

The figures from some of the principal streams are as follows: Hawk's Bay, 473 fish; weight, 2,710 lbs. Robinson's and Baraboh's Rivers, 446 fish; weight, 2,529 lbs. Salmonier River, 818 fish; weight, 3,582 lbs. Grand River, Codroy, 256 fish; weight, 1,835 lbs. S. E. River, Pistolet, 354 fish; weight, 1,785 lbs. Humber River and tributaries, 335 fish; weight, 689 lbs. Harry's River, 337 fish; weight, 1,714 lbs. There are many other rivers that show smaller results, such as Gander, Gambo, Terra Nova, Indian Brook, La Poile, Flat Bay Brook, principally because they were not visited by many anglers; any half dozen of the last rivers named, and many of the other rivers not named, could have supplied the whole total fish reported if they were fished fairly and with a sufficient number of anglers.

Of course these were not nearly so plentiful as those caught under 20 lbs. but were sufficient to show that in all the rivers larger fish are being caught in greater numbers each year; and it is not too much to hope that the record as it stands now, namely 33 1/2 lbs., will be easily and often beaten during the next season or two.

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The numbers of fish caught over 20 lbs. are getting larger each year, and the grand total is increasing in number in an extraordinary degree. The wardens reported last year that the salmon were numerous in the various rivers, and in many places, owing to the dry weather, very few of them comparatively were caught. ## Society Woman Suicides

After Being Arrested for Alleged Smuggling.

New York, March 20.—Mrs. Blanche Carson, of San Francisco, who was arrested here for smuggling several thousand dollars' worth of jewellery on her arrival from India, committed suicide early to-day by hanging herself out of the window of her hotel.

Mrs. Carson is socially prominent in San Francisco. She was returning from a tour of the world. She had attended the Durbar in the course of her trip and had bought some Indian pearls.

Mrs. Carson reached here the day before yesterday on the steamship George Washington. She was arrested on the charge of gross undervaluation and smuggling after having confessed that she had smuggled jewellery which the authorities valued at \$20,000. On her arrival Mrs. Carson had declared a package of unstrung pearls but had undervalued them so grossly that the customs inspectors decided that she had not told the truth.

On her appearance for examination she broke down and told of the large amount of jewellery that she had brought into the country concealed in her hat and elsewhere in her baggage. She was released on \$2,000 bail for further examination on Friday, registering at the hotel as Mrs. Edward Carson, of Paris. She was about 50 years and making a trip around the world alone.

Mrs. Carson had evidently sat up all night, and some time after five o'clock untied a rope from a large package in her room, and fastening one end to a radiator she slipped the noose around her neck and dropped out of the window.
