Household Notes.

A very practical way to finish a floor is to paint it with linseed oil.

Coffee made with an egg has a rich flavor, which egg alone can give.

For the bathroom, cork mats which can be rolled up are among the sensible accessories.

Don't forget to close the refrigerator door each time you see the box, the ice will last much longer.

Rag rugs made of cotton wash well, are inexpensive and are often just the thing for the kitchen.

The bone should be left in a roast, it will help to keep the juice in and will add flavor and sweetness.

Damp salt is an excellent thing to remove stains on cups and saucers caused by tea and careless washing.

Paper bag cookery is peculiarly suitable for fish. They are much more delightful when cooked by this method.

Oysters chopped and served in the gravy of a particularly juicy porterhouse steak, are very delicious.

A boot tree is an excellent thing to use when darning a stocking. It helps in shaping the darns to the foot.

When boiling eggs, always have the water boiling when eggs are put in and then boil them for two minutes.

A chicken for broiling should be wrapped in a buttered paper bag. This will keep the flesh moist and retain flavor.

All rubbing and wringing by twisting is harmful when washing woollens; be sure to rinse out all the soap-suds.

Woolen fabrics such as flannel shirts, petticoats, trousers and blankets should be pulled into shape and hung straight to dry.

The color of green vegetables can be preserved if they are put on to cook in boiling water to which a pinch of salt has been added.

Put cauliflower in plain water to draw out any insects. After the insects have come out, put salt in the water—it will kill them.

Brass fenders and fire irons can be acquired with a special preparation which will prevent them from requiring constant polishing.

It is a good idea to rinse musty hangings, children's dresses and pinafores, in alum water. It will render them non-inflammable.

Wax candles which have become lustrous can be made perfectly white by rubbing them with a clean piece of lannel dipped in spirits of wine.

Before broiling ham, it should be soaked one hour in lukewarm water. Then drain, wipe and broil three minutes. The slices should be thin.

Tomatoes are delicious broiled. Cut them in thick slices, and broil them over a hot fire, when they are done, butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Paint marks can be removed by soaking them for a short time in benzine or turpentine, then rubbing them with emery paper or a little pulverized pumice stone.

When frying fish, have the fat boiling hot before putting the fish in the pan. When the fat is in the proper condition, a blue smoke will be rising from it.

Fruit jars should be sweet and clean before they are put away. Put a pinch of soda in the jar when you give it its final rinsing. This will destroy all old flavors.

If dumplings are kept boiling steadily from the time they are in the pot until they are taken out, they will be much lighter. Do not take the lid off oftener than necessary.

To remove rust from steel cover it with sweet oil and let it remain covered for a day; then rub it with a lump of fresh lime and it will then polish in the ordinary way.

The People's Will is Dominant

The Daily News this morning announces what has been currently rumored for some time past, that the negotiations for the sale of the Evening Herald had been completed, and that the Hon. P. T. McGrath, of the Evening Chronicle, was the purchaser.

We understand that Mr. Conroy, of the firm of Furlong and Conroy, acted for the sellers of the Herald Company's Shares, and Mr. Dunfield, of the firm of Morris and Dunfield, acted for Mr. McGrath and those associated with him.

It is also stated that the purchasers assume control immediately. Our readers can now assess at its proper value the report that we made to Mr. McGrath, who charged us with selling out Sir R. Bond, viz. that his mind was surcharged with purchase and sales, and that the Evening Telegram was not on the market, but at the next General Election would be found fighting under the Banner of the Liberal Party and under the leadership of Sir Robert Bond.

The fishermen are up in arms against the Government. The Government can do what it likes in the way of flooding all the districts with money for Government work. But it will not work. The fishermen are determined Morris shall go, and what they say and do will go next election.

The country is calling for Sir Robert Bond to take charge of its affairs. The people are tired of Sir Edward Morris. They are determined that Morris and his gang must go, and go they will when the people have had their say at the polls next election.

Money may play what part it can. But it will neither succeed in suppressing the voice of the fishermen, nor in making their votes count less.

The fishermen in their thousands asked to have an opportunity of recording their sentiments towards the Government this past fall. Then the Government turned down their petitions ruthlessly. But the day will come and is coming fast when they will speak and decide in no uncertain terms their verdict, and the Morris crowd will be packed, bag and baggage, into political oblivion.

The Morris Party will not succeed in muzzling the chief Opposition Press. The People's Paper, the Evening Telegram, will be open to the people, and its columns will be open to them to give utterance to the predominant sentiment of disgust at the doings of the Tory party and its Government.

The Fishermen's Advocate, the official organ of the Fishermen's Protective Union, will give utterance to the hostility felt towards Morris and his gang, and when the time comes, the members of the mis-named People's Party will wonder what struck them.

They feel bad now. They will feel worse and progress will be made and by the time the General Election comes round they will be anxious only to find holes to crawl in and to hide their swollen heads.

Meantime, they can comfort themselves with the vagaries of Dr. Mosdell's Open Letter to Mr. Clapp. We do not intend to outrage the feelings of Mr. Clapp nor those of the Liberal Party, nor anyone else by the publication of such letters.

The Daily News, more aptly than probably its Editor knew, recalls the words of Caesar—*et tu Brute*. Ingratitude is bitter, but not always a vanquisher. Nor will it be in this case. Mr. Clapp commended Dr. Mosdell to the people of Bonne Bay as medical practitioner, and was instrumental in obtaining that practice for him. It is unnecessary to say more.

When the forgery was discovered Scotland Yard was informed, and they are now searching for the person who handed the check to the commissionaire. They have a description of this man, and find he left the hotel directly he found his messenger did not return with the money.

Mince Dumplings

These may be substituted for mince pies.

Prepare a good pie crust. Roll thin and cut in three-inch squares. In the center of each of these put a little mound of mince-meat made as for pies, gather up the four corners of the pastry, pinching the edges close together, brush with melted butter, sprinkle with granulated sugar, and bake to a light brown in a hot oven. Serve with hard sauce flavored with lemon juice and nutmeg. Decorate with holly. These are a pretty and pleasant change from mince pies.—Woman's World for December.

Peanut Brittle.

Shell and remove the brown skins from a quart of roasted peanuts. Roll the nuts until they are thoroughly broken; sift, saving the finer parts to use for rolling as you use flour for the cookies. Put a pound of sugar into a clean saucepan. Stand it over a brisk fire, stir and shake until the sugar is thoroughly melted. You must not add water or any other material. When it has melted and looks like golden syrup take it from the fire and stir in quickly as many rolled peanuts as the sugar will hold. Cover the board with the fine peanuts, turn out the hot mixture, sprinkle over more peanuts and roll into a very thin sheet. This must be done quickly or the mixture will harden. With a long knife mark the brittle into squares, wait a moment until it cools, then loosen it from the board, break it into squares and put it away. The rough, unsightly pieces may be put aside to use at once.—Woman's World for December.

That Wilson Would be President of United States.

John C. Baker, of Manhattan, was the happiest man in Will County over the election of Woodrow Wilson to the Presidency because of a prediction made by his sister, Mrs. Mary Russell, more than forty years ago.

Mrs. Russell was Wilson's teacher when he was ten years old, in Tilleton School, in Wilmington, S. C., and at that time predicted that the boy would some day be President. She did not live to see her prophecy fulfilled, dying three years ago at Leesville, N. C., at the age of 84.

As a token of his esteem Wilson presented his teacher with a little fretwork picture frame which is now in the Baker home. Mrs. Russell watched Mr. Wilson grow to fame and with each advance changed the pic-

ture in the frame. When she gave the frame to her brother she remarked: "You will want to keep this, for when he gets to be President you will be very proud of it."

Baker said that Wilson's father, the Rev. Joseph Wilson, visited him at Manhattan at the time his son published his first book and said: "Well, I don't see where Woodrow gets his smartness."

Driven by Sun.

Sun heat has been successfully used to raise steam in an engine in Egypt. The heating apparatus consists of 572 boxes of sheet iron, each three feet square, framed in stout wood and covered with two sheets of glass, separated by an air space of one inch.

All these are mounted on trestles, facing due south, with a surface of 6,000 square feet exposed to the sun's rays. Further heat from the same source is concentrated on the boxes by six feet mirrors, and a temperature of 450 degrees Fahrenheit, more than double boiling point, can be obtained in this way.

The sun-power engine is adapted for use in tropical climates, where the cost of fuel exceeds ten shillings a ton.

The F. P. U. Demonstrations in Green Bay.

TWILLINGATE To-day. Special to Evening Telegram.

Resident Coaker arrived here from Tizzard's Harbour on Tuesday. He spent Monday night at Morton's Harbour where he addressed a Union meeting, which was in session at his arrival. He was not expected at Morton's Harbour. Leaving next morning accompanied by delegates for the District Meeting, the people gave them a grand send off. Tizzard's Harbour was also visited and a grand reception was accorded the visitors. Twillingate District meeting was opened on Tuesday afternoon and held three sessions. Several important matters were discussed; amongst them the reservation of the green timber in Green Bay. Capt. M. Phillips, one of the selected Union candidates, intimated his wish to withdraw as a candidate which the Council agreed to and decided to leave the matter to the discretion of the President. The President delivered a splendid address of two hours on Tuesday night to a crowded audience. A local Council meeting was held on Wednesday night which was again packed and closed at midnight. Last night a grand demonstration was held. The town was paraded by 400 union members, with lanterns, fog horns, drums, side lights and cheering for the Union and Coaker, squads of members were placed at four of the principal hills equipped with guns and fired volleys of musketry which made the town rattle for nearly two hours, and many of the houses were brilliantly illuminated. The parade lasted for nearly two hours. It arrived at the hall at 9 o'clock. The hall was crowded. The President thanked the people for the splendid demonstration accorded him and the delegates, and delivered another address of one and a half hour's which was continually applauded. Capt. A. Yates, one of the candidates, next addressed the meeting followed by Capt. Jas. Jones of Little Bay Islands, Capt. Job Parsons, of Long Island, Friend Lush, of S. W. Arm, George Roberts, Adam Pond, Capt. Ed. White and Wm. Smith, of Twillingate. These are all determined to back Coaker, and the demonstration of last night which is the first of this sort tendered to the President is an intimation to the country of how it feels about the Union. The President left for Herring Neck this morning and will join the Prospero at Change Islands or Fogo about Monday next. The Supreme Council Convention will open on arrival of the Prospero at Change Islands. Mr. McGrath again lied about Coaker in the Chronicle on Monday and this is Twillingate's reply: "Long live Coaker and the F. P. U. Forever" is our motto.







Education.

Education is the art of mixing Greek roots with the football course and producing college graduates who can cope with anything but a single-entry ledger. It is an expensive process, and some boys never get anything out of it except the correct idea of how to aim a goal kick.

A university degree is a good thing, but it doesn't put any vegetables in the cellar unless it is hooked to a steady job.

Some people go to college and get so much education that they don't know anything. One of the saddest sights on the Yale campus is a lettuce-eared student who can translate Virgil sitting down or standing up, but who doesn't know whether Oscar A. Underwood lived B.C. or A.D. There is such a thing as getting so much education that the local liveryman has to instruct you how to mark your ball.

Nobody can have too much education. If it is aimed in the right direction. The trouble is that too much of it is aimed at the biceps and not enough at the head.

Australia's Kipling.

Lindsay Gordon, the poet of Australia, has been compared with Rudyard Kipling. Adam Lindsay Gordon was born in the Azores, October 19, 1833. At the age of seven he was sent to Cheltenham on the very day the college opened.

After a year he disappeared, and we set him again six years later as cadet of the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich. He was the friend and fellow of Gordon of Khartoum. At the end of three years he left. Then he was sent to the Royal Grammar School at Worcester. Up to then he had filled in his time learning French poetry, and frequenting boxing saloons and racing stables.

He signalized his connection with Worcester by stealing a mare and riding her at a steeplechase. Then he had another year at Cheltenham when, as a result of actions that perturbed a good Puritan home, he was shipped to Australian Police, trained horses, got into Parliament.

Finally he failed, and died in poverty. But fame has followed his death, and now every Australian home knows his work, because he sang the normal life of a new community.

Progress is being made with the arrangements for celebrating the centenary of David Livingstone in March next. The latest suggestion is that the house in Blantyre in which the great missionary was born, should be acquired and maintained as a place of pilgrimage and as a source of inspiration to the youth of Scotland. The range of buildings, of which the house forms a part, called Shuttle row, will, it is understood, unless modern requirements are complied with, be demolished. The buildings are occupied by miners and other workers.



LONDON, Dec. 5.

An armistice between Greece and Turkey will be concluded in a day or two, according to a despatch from Constantinople.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 5.
Reports from the Prairie Province show that cold weather has set in. Zero temperatures have been recorded in Manitoba and Saskatchewan, and in Winnipeg 19 below zero.

LONDON, Dec. 5.
Sir Edward Grey declared to-day that although the proposed ambassadorial conference in London was making progress towards realization, it had not yet been definitely decided by all the European Powers, whether the moment was opportune or not.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.
It has just been learned that the Prince of Wales was operated for adenoids before going to Paris to be the guest of the Marquis and Marquise de Breteuille. The operation was successful. Since it took place the Prince, now at Oxford, has made most gratifying progress in his studies. He is fast becoming an athlete, going in for running and football.

LONDON, Dec. 5.
A St. Petersburg despatch to the Daily Mail says that the Czarevitch is still confined to bed with the doctors in continual attendance. It is uncertain whether he will ever recover the use of his leg. The Czar and Czarina did not believe the illness a grave one until Dr. Fedoroff the specialist, saw the prince at Castle Spalo. He will probably go to Gagri on the Black Sea.

PARIS, Dec. 5.
France's position in the present tense situation is thus summed up by Ferner Poincaré. The programme of France is, first, continuity in our Foreign policies, and consequently the practice and preservation of our alliances and friendships; second, sincere and continued efforts to secure the peace of Europe; third, above all a firm and calm resolution to secure respect for our rights, and maintain our national dignity free from all possible attack. France speaks from a European situation. We stand by our allies.

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.
In a crowded House this afternoon Premier Borden said, in part:—Having inquired what form any immediate aid that Canada might give, would be the most effective, we have no hesitation in answering, after prolonged consideration of all the circumstances, that it is desirable such aid should include the provision of a certain number of the largest and strongest ships of war that science can build or money supply. The Admiralty placed the cost of modern battleships, with armaments, at \$2,350,000. The cost of three such ships would be about \$3,000,000. We ask the people of Canada, through their parliament, to grant that sum to His Majesty, to increase the effective naval forces of the Empire, to safe-guard our shores and sea-borne commerce, and to make sure of the common heritage of all who owe allegiance to the King. The ship will be at the disposal of His Majesty, for the common defence of the Empire. They will be maintained and controlled as part of the Royal Navy and we have the assurance that, if at any time, it should be the will of the Canadian people to establish a Canadian unit of the British Navy, the vessel can be recalled by the Canadian Government and form a part of the Navy. The ships will be built in British yards under supervision of the Admiralty, as there are now no adequate building facilities in Canada. I submit here the cost would be an additional \$12,000,000. Attention will be given to the establishment of ship building in Canada, and the Admiralty is willing to place orders here, at first for small vessels. Canada is sending these three ships to range themselves in the battle line of the Empire with those of the Mother Country, Australia and New Zealand. They will be three of the most powerful battleships in the world, and will bear historic names, associated with this country. The problem of representation in the councils of the Empire is being studied, and, in the meantime, the presence of a Canadian minister will be welcomed in London, during the whole or any part of the year, to attend the meetings of the Imperial Defence Committee. Special arrangements will be also made to give Canadians the opportunity of serving, as officers on the Canadian ships.

Naval Treasure.

Great satisfaction has been expressed throughout the country on account of the purchase of the log-book of Nelson's ship, Victory, by the well-known art collector, Mr. Thomas J. Barratt. The logbook contains a vivid account of the Battle of Trafalgar, written on the day after the action. Private collectors were particularly anxious to secure the log, and one of them even made an offer for the two leaves recording the events of October 21, 1805. Mr. Barratt, however, promptly paid several thousand pounds for the book, and thus secured for the nation one of the most precious relics of Nelson.

The logbook is unique because it was actually written by Nelson's sailing master, a man named Atkinson. It is not, of course, the official log-book, which is the property of the Admiralty, and which is kept at the Public Record Office, together with all other navy log-books. Atkinson, however, apparently kept a rough log-book of his own, with the aid of which he prepared the official log-book which he had to send to the Admiralty in order to comply with the rule. "No log; no pay."

The North Pole By Aeroplane Proposed.

Captain Bartlett Says That It Would be Safest and Easiest Way, Boston, Nov. 30.—The safest and easiest way to reach the North Pole, an entirely feasible way is by aeroplane, said Captain Robert A. Bartlett of the Peary North Pole party, to the members of the Aero Club of New England, at its annual dinner to-night.

Captain Bartlett said an aeroplane could be taken by trail in Cape Jessup, which is but 291 miles from the Pole. With the latest machines this would be but a few hours flight to the Pole. He said the ice would furnish suitable landing places all along the route, but all necessary supplies would have to be carried for the trip to and from the Pole.

"The ideal trip," said the speaker, "would be to go from Cape Jessup directly over the Pole and land at Cape Cheluskain in Siberia, the latter point, however, being 720 miles beyond the Pole. In summer months of July and August the conditions are perfect for flying, and I can see no serious difficulties which might not be guarded against."

Biggest Woman Dies Insane.

SHE WEIGHED 730 POUNDS.

White Confined in Asylum She Used to Break Down Walls of Her Little Room.

Montreal, Nov. 28.—The biggest woman in the world died to-day in Montreal. She weighed 730 pounds. Her name was Justine Masson. Her mind became affected some time ago, and she was taken in charge by the Assistance Publique.

During her stay there her exploits became famous. She was so big and so strong that in her fits of insanity she used to break down the walls of the rooms in which she was confined, and it was finally found necessary to build a special house for her outside the main building.

WOULDN'T RISK HEARSE.

She was so large that a special coffin had to be built for her. Then an undertaker could be found who would encase her hearse with the weight, so the body had to be removed in an express wagon.

On one occasion she caused a sensation at Bonaventure Station by insisting on getting into a victoria to be driven to her home. She got in, but the carriage had not proceeded very far before it broke down. She then, it is said, took a street car, but could not get through the door and had to stand on the back platform, blocking the passage so that no one else could get in.

On another occasion she was arrested and an attempt made to take her to the police station. Four policemen from nearby beats were unable to handle her, so the reserves were called out. Ultimately eight officers bundled her into a piano wagon.
