#### Germany Badly Injured

BY ITS OWN PROPAGANDA.

Berliner Tageblatt" Prints Norwegian Article Showing Its Reaction. Berlin, via London, June 24.-German newspapers are realizing more and more that pro-German propaganda in the neutral countries—a certain kind of propaganda, at least-especially during the initial stages of the war, has done infinitely more harm than good to Germany and the Germans. Thus, the Berliner Tageblatt published a translation of an article which appeared in the Norwegian newspaper Morgenbladet, which reads:

"Nothing has influenced public opinion in Norway so much to the disadvantage of Germany as has the distribution of a certain kind of circulars, protests and pamphlets vilifying Germany's enemies. Each of these warnings fulfils diametrically the contrary of its desired effect and literally disgusts Germany's best friends. Before us lies a pamphlet with Sir Edward Grey's picture on the front page, the cut line reading, 'Europe's leading criminal.'

"The accompanying article discusses the 'game of intrigue' played by the 'unscrupulous scoundrel.' Another circular on our desk, with the picture of Minister Findlay (British Enyoy to Norway), says: 'What was the riminal Thomas in Bremerhaven 40 ears ago, with his hell machines. compared with a Grey or a Findlay? A mere amateur! Is there anywhere in this world a more nefarious hypocrisy, more criminal simulation than in England? Down with these dastardly Britishers!

"Many other pamphlets and circulars sent to us have only one purpose: to nourish the vulgar hatred of England. Dresden appears to be the chief point from which the agitation emanates. If Germany's foes had agents in other countries, paid for the work of weakening pro-German sympathies and of reducing the faith in the dignity of the German nation, this work could not be done more effectively than by these pamphlets which are sent from Dresden for distribution in Norway."

#### Thanks to Lord Haldane

In the course of his Dundee speech, Mr. Winston Churchill, referring to the ex-Lord Chancellor, said he deeply regretted that Lord Haldane had ceased to fill the great office which he

adorned: "No more sincere patriot has served the Crown. There never has been an occasion in the Cabinets of the last seven years in which I have sat that, as the need arose, Lord Haldane has not from his great knowledge of the German government system warned us to be on our guard against the dangerous side of their

"There never has been a time when for the defence of this country, military or naval. He it was who entered into those intricate arrangements with France which enabled our Army to be so swiftly brought to the scene of action, just in the nick of time. He it was who prepared that Expeditionary Army in the face of much opposition and in days when every penny was hard to get. He it was who organized the Territorial Force which has so splendidly vindicated itself and its founder, and upon whose gallantry, discipline and numbers the weight and even the success of our military operations hitherto have notably if not

mainly depended. "Till a few months ago all the land forces which we employed in this war, which we put in the field, were the products of Lord Haldane's organization, and in the fateful and convulsive days before Great Britain drew the sword of honor, when the chill of doubt struck into many hearts whether we should act as we were boundin those days no man stood closer to Sir Edward Grey and no man saw more clearly where our duty led."

This is a worthy tribute to a great patriotic statesman who has been cruelly wronged by the malicious attacks made upon him by the baser elements of the Unionist press.

#### Your Boys and Girls.

Two boys were playing at the home of one of them when the latter was sent on an errand and his friend went with him. On the street they met a gang of tough boys spoiling for a fight. One of the two had been taught to fight whenever he was attacked. The other had been taught to defend himself but do no unnecessary fighting.

The latter sized up the situation at a glance. It was impossible for the two boys to stand up against the gang, and he had no pride that required him to undertake an impossible task. He was prepared to fight one at a time, but he had that better part of valor which suggested a discreet retreat, with an appeal to the

police or some adult. We should guard against cultivating that false sense of honor which will lead a boy to do foolhardy things in upholding a perverted idea.


