





"The patients are very difficult to awaken, and when aroused are likely to remain in an abnormally drowsy condition. Their state is perhaps best described by the word 'muzzy.' They seem very heavily dazed. In other respects they appear fairly normal, and it is this absence of a number of attendant symptoms that

makes the disease more puzzling. "The greatest interest is being taken in the outbreak, and an authoritative medical committee of experts has been set up to discover its origin and cure. So far as is known. no women have been attacked, and the patients are all Londoners, not seafaring men. The disease is not in the least infectious. That in itself proves it is not 'sleeping sickness.' Frankly, we are mystified."





Born in Holland in 1851, Mr. Van Riene was a violoncellist almost from infancy. He studied under Servais at Brussels, and at the age of fifteen played in the Rotterdam Opera House orchestra. It was Sir Michael Costa who first befriended Van Biene in London and enabled him to reveal his genius, notably on the concert platform with Madame Patti and other celebrities. The story has often been laid directly on the fruit.
