

# Holland and the Ex-Kaiser.

## Dutch Government Will Refuse Extradition -- U. S. Troops Take Russian Prisoners--Population of Odessa Leaving City--Confidence in New French Cabinet -- Powhattan's Passengers Transferred Safely.

### HOLLAND'S ANSWER

LONDON, Jan. 22. The Standard reports that Holland's reply with regard to the surrender of the former German Emperor will be that it is impossible to grant extradition at the call of a third country, if own country does not want extradition.

### RUSSIANS CAPTURED.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22. As a result of a clash between detachments of United States soldiers and Russian forces on January 10th, near Poleskaya, one general, six officers and forty-eight men of the Russian forces were captured and still held, the war department was advised to-day by Major General Graves, commander of the Siberian expedition. The United States casualties were one killed, one man of wounds and one severely wounded while five Russians were killed and one severely wounded.

### ORIGINAL ORDERS CANCELLED.

LONDON, Jan. 22. Some of the newspapers give great prominence to cancellation of original orders sending British troops into Silesia, East Prussia and Schleswig. Eleven battalions and a brigade of artillery were scheduled for plebiscite duty but it was officially announced yesterday, without a reason given, that it was found necessary to modify the arrangement. Under the new plan only one battalion will go to Schleswig, another to Danzig and still another to Allenstein. Speculation is rife as to the destination of the other battalions.

### NEARING ODESSA.

LONDON, Jan. 22. It is reported officially that twenty thousand persons have left Odessa within the past three weeks, due to activities of the Bolshevik forces.

Lack of transportation facilities makes it impossible to evacuate large numbers that are anxious to leave the city.

### MILLERAND CABINET SUSTAINED.

PARIS, Jan. 22. The Cabinet of Premier Millerand received a vote of confidence in the Chamber of Deputies to-night. The vote was 272 for the government to twenty-three against it. More than three hundred members abstained from voting.

### KILLED BY FALL.

LONDON, Jan. 22. Sir Robert Follet Synce, Deputy Marshal of ceremonies at the Foreign Office died to-day as a result of a forty feet fall from his bedroom window yesterday. He was connected with the Foreign Office for thirty years.

### COMMITTEE WILL CONSIDER.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22. Chairman Page of the naval service committee to-day appointed three Senators to determine whether an investigation should be made into the charges of John R. Rathorn of the Providence R. I. Journal that immoral conditions exist in the navy with the full knowledge of secretary Daniels.

### AFTER PROHIBITION LAW.

JERSEY CITY, Jan. 22. Effects to have the Federal prohibition amendment declared an invasion of State Rights as declared by Governor Edwards in his inauguration address on Tuesday will begin immediately in the United States Supreme Court, it was announced to-day.

### ANOTHER AMENDMENT.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22. Amendment of the national prohibition law so as to permit the manufacture and sale of beer, ale and porter

of three per cent. alcoholic content and wine of nine per cent., was proposed to-day in a bill introduced by representative Sabath of Illinois.

### NEARLY TIME.

ATLANTA, Jan. 22. The whipping of women of the city was ordered to be discontinued entirely by the prison committee of the Atlanta Council to-day, after a police hearing of charges brought by the Atlanta Humane Society protesting against the use of a contrivance resembling a chair into which women were tied and flogged.

### POWATTAN IN TOW.

HALIFAX, Jan. 22. The Dominion Government steamer Lady Laurier got a line aboard the American transport early this morning, and at 8 o'clock a start was made for Halifax. No attempt will be made to transfer the passengers unless the weather conditions greatly improve.

### ONLY A FAKE.

PARIS, Jan. 22. An emphatic denial of reports emanating from Berlin and published in America that "Riot and mutinies have broken out among French naval forces and troops at Toulon" is made by the French War Office.

### TO JOIN FRANCE AND ITALY.

CHAMONIX, SWITZ., Jan. 22. French and Italian engineers have arrived here to make studies on the ground for a tunnel under Mont Blanc directly joining France and Italy. This project, which for many years has been under examination, now appears to be near attainment as both governments have voted preliminary credits to commence the work.

### ELECTION MOMENTOUS.

LONDON, Jan. 22. Now that ex-Premier Asquith has been officially adopted as Liberal candidate for Paisley, common opinion is agreed that the contest will be most momentous, since the general election. Asquith's return to the House of Commons would find a welcome amongst well nigh every section.

### PASSENGERS TRANSFERRED.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. All passengers on board the disabled army transport Powhattan have been transferred to the transport Northern Pacific and are on their way to New York. This news was received here to-night, in a wireless message confirming previous reports from Halifax. The transfer of passengers was effected to-night under good weather conditions and without incident.


### Bank Manager Promoted.

RUMANIANS WANT ODESSA. WARSAW, Jan. 22. It is rumored that the Rumanians are about to occupy Odessa and organize a defense of that Black Sea port, according to reports received here.

It may reasonably be questioned whether any possible measure of Home Rule will bring contentment, but what we have seen to-day in Thurles suggest that any change will be an improvement of the present state of muffled civil war."

TAKING IT EASY. AMERONGEN, Holland, Jan. 22. (By Associated Press.)—While the diplomats of the great powers are occupying themselves with the demand for his surrender for trial, former Emperor William, of Germany, as far as these outside Bentinck Castle can learn, remains unperturbed.

SPIES TRAIL LITVINOFF. LONDON, Jan. 22. Negotiations between James O'Grady, British delegate, and Maxim Litvinoff, representative of the Russian Soviet Government at Copenhagen, have reached a critical stage, because of an alleged system of espionage practiced on the latter, according to a correspondent of the Herald at the Danish capital.

NOT BADLY OFF. LITTLE, Jan. 22. Repatriation of German prisoners from the Little region has begun, and three thousand of these prisoners left for Germany yesterday. They appeared to be in excellent health and were wearing new boots and clothing, and took with them large quantities of estates.

ALL AFRICAN AIR ROUTE. LONDON, Jan. 22. Cairo and Cape Town, representing the extremes of the African continent, have at last been linked up by air service. The British Air Ministry has announced that an air route, over which engineers have spent long months of labor amidst great difficulties, is finally ready for traffic.

Newfoundlander on Missing Schooner.

New Disease Puzzles British Doctors.

London, Jan. 17.—Doctors have a new disease, encephalitis lethargica, to puzzle over. Several cases are now under treatment in the London hospitals. The chief symptom is sleepiness, yet the disease has nothing in common with the deadly "sleeping sickness" of Africa. In talking about the cases an official of the London hospital said:—"The patients are very difficult to awaken, and when aroused are likely to remain in an abnormally drowsy condition. Their state is perhaps best described by the word 'muzzy.' They seem very heavily drugged. In other respects they appear fairly normal, and it is this absence of a number of attendant symptoms that makes the disease more puzzling. "The greatest interest is being taken in the outbreak, and an authoritative medical committee of experts has been set up to discover its origin and cure. So far as is known, no women have been attacked, and the patients are all Londoners, not seafaring men. The disease is not in the least infectious. That in itself proves it is not 'sleeping sickness.' Frankly, we are mystified."

Most Gallant Naval Duel

(From the Australasian.) The posthumous award of the Victoria Cross has been conferred upon the late Captain Archibald Smith of the British steamship Otaki. When the German auxiliary cruiser Moeve was engaged in raiding it encountered on March 10th, 1917, the Otaki, a vessel of 9,375 tons, belonging to the New Zealand Steamship Company. The Moeve signalled to the Otaki to stop, but Captain Smith refused to obey. There ensued a running gun "duel," which lasted for twenty minutes. At a range of 3,000 yards the Otaki was sunk. Several hits were scored by the Otaki's guns on the Moeve. One shell struck the Moeve two feet under the saloon, where some neutral prisoners were congregated, and killed two German seamen. A fire was caused on the Moeve and the outbreak was not extinguished till three days later. When the Otaki, which had sustained several casualties and much damage, was heavily afire, Captain Smith ordered the crew to the boats. He remained on the Otaki and went down with his ship, with the colors flying. The Germans described the duel as "as gallant as naval history can relate."

Sharps and Flats.

Do you know that the Lancers are just one hundred years old? The dance was devised in the city of Dublin by one John Duval.

Do you know that the piano of Beethoven's time was nearly an octave shorter than the piano of today. That is, it had ten notes, or keys, less. The added keys in the treble are rarely used, but the additional keys in the base are valuable in octave effects.

Do you know that the first paucal dictionary was published in 1703? Its author was Sebastian de Brossard, a Frenchman. A small Latin dictionary of music had appeared two years previous. It was, however, intended for scholars, and was written by a Bohemian, Janowka. Louis XIV thought so highly of Brossard's carefully selected musical library, that he bought it for an annuity of 1,200 francs.

Do you know that four hundred years ago the musicianship of a composer was judged by the number of parts or voices in which his works were written? Nowadays four parts—soprano, alto, tenor and bass, seem sufficient for most compositions, but in 1601, Dr. John Bull found a composition of 40 parts, and was not contented until he had added 40 more.

WHAT IS EDUCATION?

(From the New York Times.) The truth is that "education" is finally and maturely picked up in the fields and streets, among men and women and realities, much more effectively and really than in the formal courses of schools and universities. However and wherever bit or missed, "education" is multifarious and profane, hard to grasp or define. One of the best concrete illustrations of it was made by Lord Morley. He said, in effect, that "an educated man knows when a thing has been proved and when it doesn't."

**Murderer Confesses.**

**Player of James Marnelli Acknowledges Guilt--The Eternal Triangle Again.**

St. John's, N.S., Jan. 15.—Koval has confessed to the murder of James Marnelli, implicating the wife of the murdered man. At 11 o'clock last night prisoners and keepers of the jail were awakened by a series of piercing screams which issued from the cell of Mike Koval. He had broken down under the dread-sight of the murder which has resting on his mind since last Christmas night. County Jailor Karn, was sitting in his private office on the first floor of the jail, was called by the commotion and he went to the cell of Koval. "I killed Marnelli," Koval said when approached. hands of Jailor Karn, who refused to give it out for publication without the authorization of D. A. Cameron, counsel for the accused. "Koval has been wearing down for several days," Jailor Karn told the Record this morning. "He hasn't been sleeping well lately and it was evident that something was weighing him under. He appears relieved now that he has told the story of the crime. Mrs. Marnelli will be placed under arrest this afternoon as an accessory. How Marnelli Was Murdered by Koval For some reason best known to themselves the authorities are unwilling to divulge the contents of the confession obtained by Jailor Karn, but naturally the details of such a document could not long remain a secret and most of the details of the tragedy are known. Koval, it is stated, was handed a revolver by Mrs. Marnelli and told to go out and kill her husband who was then correctly supposed to be on his way home from a point some distance away. Why Koval was forced to obey her is not stated, but it is supposed that she had some influence over him. At any rate Koval waited for Marnelli beside the road, and when the victim came driving along, Koval shot him. Marnelli was wounded but not fatally, and he leaped from the sleigh and ran for his life. Koval pursued him with the club which Marnelli carried in the sleigh for his own protection, and beat him to death with it. This accounts for the horrible condition of the skull when found by passers by a short time later. Took Off Blood-Stained Clothes. Koval then returned to the house and took off his blood-spattered garments replacing them with those he was wearing when arrested by the city police. These are the garments afterwards discovered by Detective Edwards and now being examined for blood tests by experts employed by the crown authorities. What part, if any, Lillian Lewis had in the affair is not known, but Koval's confession exonerates Steplock and Dumbell. Mrs. Marnelli is Arrested. Mrs. Marnelli, wife of the murdered James Marnelli, was arrested at her home on Langan Road by Constable C. W. Edwards at 11 o'clock this morning. When she was arrested by the constable she knew nothing of Koval's confession. She protested strongly against her arrest, saying that she knew nothing whatever of the crime. She will be arraigned before Magistrate Campbell this afternoon on the charge of being an accomplice in the murder. Details of Confession Leak Out. The sworn confession of Koval as taken by Jailor Karn last night will not be made public for several days yet. In spite of this some of the details in connection with the murder have leaked out from various sources. The dreadful crime was planned by Mrs. Marnelli, it is said. For some days before it took place it was noted that she was on unfriendly terms with her husband, and indulged in long weeping spells. The murder was committed by Koval at Mrs. Marnelli's instigation. He left the house clad in a blue suit and lumberman's socks and boots.

He waited by the side of the road for Marnelli, and when the latter drew near Koval shot him, afterwards beating his head into the battered condition which it displayed when the body was found. Returning to the house he changed his clothes, donning an overcoat. Steplock Was Suspicious of Koval. Stephen Steplock admitted to the authorities several days ago, when questioned in his cell at the county jail, that he had noticed the movements of Koval. He saw Koval leave the house with a lighted lantern and saw him return clad in different attire. Had Secret Influence Over Lewis Girl. When Lillian Lewis was questioned by the police some weeks ago as to Koval's movements on the night of the murder, she said that he had not left the room for over a minute. "The Broken Melody."  
Born in Holland in 1851, Mr. Van Biene was a violinist almost from infancy. He studied under Servais at Brussels, and at the age of fifteen played in the Rotterdam Opera House orchestra. It was Sir Michael Costa who first befriended Van Biene in London and enabled him to reveal his genius, notably on the concert platform with Madams Patti and other celebrities. The story has often been told of how, in the late sixties, a half-starved lad left his garret in Northumberland Court, Charing Cross, and fixing on a spot near Piccadilly, played on his violin to the delight of the assembled crowd, repeating the performances for nine or ten weeks, until Sir Michael Costa accidentally heard him, and gave him his chance. Van Biene thought his street playing days were over for ever, but while walking along the London streets one day he was strongly reminded of his early struggles by seeing a lame boy playing to an unsympathetic crowd. Van Biene took the violin from the boy's hand, and so played to entranced listeners that before he left the boy's cap was heavy with money; the player was recognized as he walked away and loudly cheered. In January 1913, his health failed suddenly, but he went to Brighton to fulfil an engagement despite his wife's entreaties. As he was standing on the stage of the Brighton Hippodrome on the night of the 23rd, playing in the "Master Musician," and about half-way through the piece, he fell back in his chair. The curtain was lowered, and he was found to be extinct. His own son was conducting at the time, and the performance proceeded, most of the audience being unaware of the musician's death until next morning. **The Uses of Waste Paper.**  
Few housekeepers are aware of the many uses to which waste-paper may be put. After a stove has been blackened, it can be kept very well for a long time by rubbing it with paper every morning. Rubbing with paper is a much nicer way of keeping the outside of a tea-kettle, coffee-pot, and tea-pot bright and clean than the old way of washing them with soda. Rubbing with paper is also the best way of polishing knives, tinware and spoons. They will shine like new silver. For polishing mirrors, lamp chimneys, etc., paper is better than dry cloth. Jams and pickles keep much better if brown paper instead of cloth is tied over the jar. Tinned fruit is not so apt to mould if a piece of writing-paper cut to fit the tin is laid directly on the fruit. If it is necessary to step upon a chair, always lay a paper on it, and thus save the paint or woodwork from damage.
