

"Fasting is not a safe way to reuce in this method the proteins, ron, lime and vitamins are all reglected, and the starving body must ot utilize not only its excess fat, but nust draw upon the muscles and the ther body tissues, thus lowering the vitality and weakening the heart and other important organs. Frequently, too, rapid loss of fat is not accompanied by equally rapid loss of tissue, particularly skin tissue, and sagging folds of skin will be left. Reduction may be rapid for a week or two at the beginning-amounting even to a bound a day-but then, reduction must be gradual, and depend upon exercise, sweating or sun baths as well as diet regulation.


"When the diet is decreased, the essened amount of food causes the fat reserves of the body to be attacked first, and reduction starts at once. Only a small amount of salt should be taken. When an individual who is verweight eats salt in excess, water

"Bulk must occupy a very preminent place in the reducing dietary for two reasons-bulk gives a sense of fullness which is usually asociated in our minds with being 'well fed'-it satisfies the appetite, thus avoiding that most objectionable feeding of hunger, and also regulates the action of the eliminative organs.

"Constination is apt to prove a serious menace when the amount of food eaten is so materially decreased, and bulk will prove of great value here. Good elimination must be obtained in order to achieve desired results. Gluten bread is useful in this connection, as is also the coarsest bran bread, for they supply bulk with a low amount

"The vegetables eaten should be as little butter as possible-cream

sauces being entirely restricted. "In order to promote variety in a necessarily rather restricted diet, salads may be used if made of fresh vegetables or fruits and served w::h 'special" mayonnaise. This is made by substituting paraffin oil for olive oil, and the taste is not the least objectionable-it will, in fact, pass unroticed. Raw cabbage can be used liberally in salads in this way, and also string beans and asparagus.
