Re-Capture of a Scoundrel.
Our readers will remmber of one Jim
McDonald alias Bill Johnson, who was
imprisoned in Berlin gaol for burglary, and who escaped a few weeks ago, in company with a companion, by stuffing his gaol clothes and putting them in the bed of his cell while he wore garments which had been given him by a confeder ate. Nothing was heard of this individual ince he left, until the other day, when he was arrested in Detroit on a charge of house breaking and theft. On Thursday night, 11th inst., Mrs.

Newbury, living on Indiana Avenue, Detroit, was startled by some one openhall, and also by a bright light which gleamed into the room where she was. She thought it might be her mother, and on opening the door to see, she noticed a man running from the front door to the street.
