TRYING TO CONFUSE

The Alexander and Budd people are making an effort to confuse the aldermen and the public in the cost of city power.

The unfairness of the method adopted by the company is shown in the fact that the figures of the light system are for the entire year, including the first few months when no business was being done at all.

The city of Calgary is manufacturing current at the present moment for the sum of 1,008 per k.w. It is not a question of argument, but a straight question of fact.

The salaries of the men who are making the power amount to \$455 a month. There can be no argument about that.

The one serious objection to this climate is that the weather in the winter time it is so mild that we are never able to have good ice for a bonspiel.

Now that the board of trade has a good list of candidates for office, the next thing is for the members to turn out and vote the best of them into office.

There is no denying the fact that the average wage earner in Calgary today is paying too much for rent, coal, wood, light, lumber, telephone and power and taxes generally, and the bare necessities of keeping body and soul together are excessive, and they should always keep a memorandum in front of them reminding them that they are but the chosen directors of managers of a trading company (the people) who expect and will demand that the business of the company be conducted in an honest and economical and paying basis, for and on their account, and to prevent any of their vested rights being acquired by any competing company.

R. B. Bennett struck the nail square on the head at the last council meeting, when he designated the Budd and Alexander power and street railway proposition as but a "stock jobbing proposition." Mr. Alexander I know not, but these days men are frequently measured by the company they keep like begets like; "birds of a feather flock together." Mr. Budd has played the part of the "self sacrificing and philanthropic promoter" of more than one eastern "scheme," and up his sleeve at this very date can be found a varied and highly colored assortment to be disposed of (now that the Christmas rush is over) at "cut prices, with the usual discount for spot cash." Since the westward march of the "milled fist" lies hidden beneath the lamb-like and "innocent abroad" sort of covering which

envelops this Budd and Alexander power and street railway proposition, and ready as it always is for the sake of personal aggrandisement to strike down every effort made toward municipal ownership for and by the people. The public are but awakening to the possibilities of power, commencing to take an intelligent interest in all that so vitally concerns their welfare, organizing and educating themselves so as to intelligently decide what is best for themselves; and the time is not far distant when our city business will be conducted by a few practical and educated men, at a saving of not less than 80 per cent. to the ratepayers, and until this day arrives let our aldermen knock all such stock jobbing propositions dead as our old friend Julius Caesar was knocked.

Where Would They go if Turned Out of Calgary People

MR. HUNTER AND THE APOSTOLIC BISHOP

Evangelist Announces that he Will Take no Second Place

A large congregation assembled at the Central Methodist church last night to hear Messrs. Crossley and Hunter continue their revival meetings. The evangelists were supported by Rev. Messrs. Kerby, Bishop, and others.

Mr. Hunter took his text from the 8th chapter of Luke, the 41st and following verses. It is the story of our Lord raising the daughter of Jairus from the dead and healing the sick woman.

This woman touched Jesus and felt that she was cured; so shall we feel better when we meet Jesus through faith.

"When they came to the house, behold the majesty of the Lord, no one can remain dead in His presence. 'And the spirit came back to the maid again,' not up the table leg, as people are led to believe at these spiritualistic seances, but straight into the maid again."

Some in Calgary would neglect the Lord if one were raised from the dead. If our Lord were to say to one of the ministers on the platform, go to the cemetery and by singing the doxology raise one from the dead, take him down to the church on the platform that the people of Calgary may be converted; even then some would neglect Him, while others would receive him.

For men in Calgary care more about lots and dollars than about the souls that are still unsaved.

I would rather see 100 souls saved than 100,000 new men brought into the city; intine you may grow to a big city, say of 50,000.

We read of our Lord casting devils out of a man and sending them into the swine. I don't know where all the devils would go if turned out of the people of Calgary.

We are told that a woman can hold seven devils; in the same ratio I should think a man could accommodate 770.

I believe Jesus has the power to heal the sick if they have faith. Take Jesus into your politics, your business, your amusements, your reading.

If Jesus came to Calgary he would not be allowed to preach in some places because he wasn't properly ordained.

I'll take second place to no apostolic bishop in God's universe. What I am after is apostolic success, not apostolic succession; and I believe none have had greater apostolic success than Bro. Crossley and myself.

But I will take second place to General Booth. If you are not a Christian, said Mr. Crossley, I can tell you the month, week, day, hour and second when you will be converted. It is explained in my text, Jeremiah 29: 18: "Ye shall seek me and find me when ye shall search for me with all your heart."

Defending The Governor

Editor Albertan: With all due deference to Professor John Westlake's opinion, as reported in your issue today, allow me to respectfully point out that Governor Swettenham's action in ordering the United States armed troops off the island of Jamaica was justifiable and, under the circumstances, absolutely inevitable.

The American admiral's action in landing armed troops on his own initiative without first obtaining the sanction of the British governor is totally opposed to and a direct breach of international law.

Editor Albertan: In your issue of Thursday, in an editorial under the heading "India's Cooperations," you say that there is an unparadiseable contrast between the treatment of Indians in Portuguese East Africa, and in the Transvaal.

You appear to be ignorant of the fact that the only Indians in Portuguese East Africa who are accorded the rights you speak of are natives of Portuguese.

These Goanese cannot fairly be compared to the Trading Indian coolies of the Transvaal, though in outward appearance they resemble them. The Goanese are the descendants of white Portuguese, whose language they speak, and they are Roman Catholics and have high sounding Portuguese names.

The only attributes of the Indian Coolie which they share is their ability to live and thrive and get rich where a white man would starve.

In all Portuguese East Africa, half castes of Negro blood rank by Portuguese royal edict as white men, and are socially treated as such.

The Goanese nationality claim and obtain the same rights.

In British south and central Africa any one with native blood is classed and rightly so, as a native. To this same altruistic treatment of half-castes is due most of the trouble, rebellions and lack of progression, which have caused the stagnation of a nationally wealthy country.

It is sincerely to be hoped that the "brighter day" you speak of is not far off when, British colonies will accord to the colored races the rights of white men.

The melancholy results of any such quixotic policy may be seen in Turban Natal, where the colonists have at last been forced to adopt stringent immigration laws.

If the Portuguese colonists had similar political power, they would use it as British South Africa has and will continue in a still greater degree to use hers.

Trusting that you will be able to spare me some of your valuable space, as the question involved is of enormous importance, and resolves itself into the question whether a country is to be a white man's or not.

On every side were heard regrets at the absence of the Golden curlers, who have always made some very interesting games in the past bonselpiel.

Archie McKillop's rink is a very promising one and should it meet Stephenson's rink of Wetaskiwin there will be a very interesting and hard fought game.

The game between Sheppard of Strathcona and Freeze of Calgary proved to be a very close match; at one time everything seemed to be for Freeze, but a few clever shots by Mr. Sheppard won the game for him.

The showing of Fletcher's rink against McKillop's was a great disappointment to the northern men, but he was unfortunate in getting up against one of the crack rinks of the bonselpiel.

John Mosley's rink went down to defeat, but he got in the jewelry class on a toss.

After a cold blast lasting four or five weeks it was rather unfortunate for the curlers that the chinook came. However, though the curling may not be up to the mark, the sport is as keen and the poorer rink gets a better show to win out.
