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THE TARIFF QUESTION.

In the U.S.—The Debate Continued in the House—Incidental Protection—Capital Notes.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—In the senate Page (dem. Alabama) read a series of resolutions declaratory of what he believed to be the true constitutional American system of tariff. These asserted it to be the duty of congress at this session to reduce and adjust the import duties so as to secure justice, equality, uniformity and permanence in the revenue system. This being a revenue power only, cannot be construed as an embargo to prohibit importations so as to protect any American industry, but duties should be so apportioned on imported articles as that the rate on each, while producing its just share of revenue, will afford incidental protection to American labor and capital without burdening any industry further than that necessary to supply the legitimate wants of the government.
