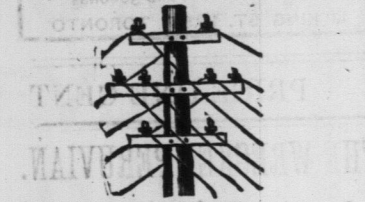

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MARKETS AND BOARD OF WORKS

Markets and Board of Works Meetings Yesterday.

Ald. Love, in the absence of Ald. Taylor, presided at the meeting of the markets and health committee yesterday afternoon. City Commissioner Costworth reported on the present bread-by-law, and referred to the recent seizures for light and unstamped loaves. Application had been made by some parties to the courts to have the by-law quashed. He found that the bakers did not, as a rule, conform to the provisions of the by-law. He recommended that the by-law be repealed and the old one reenacted. By the old-by-law 2lb. and 4lb. loaves were included, the present one excluded 1lb. and 1 1/2 lb. as well. The commissioner will canvass the city bakers further on the subject and get their views. The commissioner recommended the sum of \$40 as an allowance to Mrs. Jessie Carley for the improved market stalls. Mr. Carley had made on the house at the western cattle market. Action on the matter was deferred. The sub-committee which visited the city last Saturday morning and made recommendations for several much-needed improvements were passed. A numerously signed petition against the erection of a hayrack on the western cattle market was received.

Committee on Works.
Chairman Turner presided at the meeting of the committee on works yesterday afternoon. A large amount of business was done through with. The question of opening up Bleeker street which has been before the board for months, was again deferred. Mr. R. S. Applebee opposing the meeting in his opinion the present street plan should be given up. The matter will be taken up for two weeks. A deputation from St. Patrick's ward opposing paying the supplementary assessment—which had been confirmed by the court of revision—on the Borden street sewer. The chairman entered into a lengthy explanation of the roundabout way this contract traveled, necessitating the additional assessment, and said he thought the city should be ready to make up the \$3000. It was decided to have the city authorities which called on these taxpayers to pay this additional assessment. By this means the city's share would be one-third, but the committee decided that it should assume the whole amount. Mr. Carley said there were several other similar cases, and it is probable they will receive like consideration. Several petitions for sewers and block pavements were received. Ald. Love, on behalf of several York street merchants, got a sub-committee appointed to adjudicate upon street signs. By a former resolution of the board no sign is allowed to project over four feet across the sidewalk. Ald. Love explained that many of the street signs were ornamental and costly and the city should be relieved of many of them. The street railway company against the city for mactad taken from Yonge street when the new pavement was laid down was sent in again.
