Death of Sir Michael Costa. London, April 29 .- Sir Michael Costa, the distinguished musician and composer, died of apoplexy at Brighton aged 74. The deceased was a native of Italy and began life as an orchestra player in Naples. Coming to England in 1828 he devoted himself to operatic, orchestral and oratorial music, For years he was conductor of Her Majesty's theatre and the Royal Italian opera, Covent Garden. His most successful works were the oratorios of Eli and Naaman and the operas of Malek Adel and Don Carles. He was knighted by the queen in 1869. Sir Michael was a leading figure at the great musical events in Britain during the past half century.]

THE MORRISON TARIFF BILL. A U. S. Free Trader on National Isolation and Foreign Exclusion.

WASHINGTON, April 29.-In the house Hiscock discussed the Morrison bill. He made a comparison between the condition of the business of the country prior to the tariff of '61 and its condition at present. He deduced the conclusion that the protective system was a better one for people. Agricultural products secured a higher ger post to convey despatches to General price now than they did twenty years ago, a result which was attributable to protection. The policy which the other side sought to initiate might have the effect of giving the farmer a market abroad, but it would do it only in one way by turning out to would do it only in one way by turning out to agriculture a larger proportion of producers and lowering the prices of products. At present prices the American farmer could not compete with foreign production and must depend on a home market for the consumption of his products. The protective system organized manufactures and labor, incited the inventive genius of the people and gave capital an opportunity for people and gave capital an opportunity for safe investment. He denied that it had the effect of building up monopolies.

REAL ESTATE IN TORONTO

HOW THE CITY IS GROWING AND PROPERTY INCREASING IN VALUE.

The Moving Season—Landlords and Ten ants—What Houses Are 1: Demand-Speculation in Business Sites.

In conversation yesterday with severa prominent real estate men a World repor-ter was assured that Toronto has the best real estate market of any city in Canada. The city's history has all along been marked by a steady and encouraging growth, and at the present time the Queen city is still moving forward with the same apid strides. It will not require many years at its present rate of progression before the city will include the very respectable area bounded by Scarboro heights and Humber, and the Daverport

Todmorden.

It is a pretty safe assertion to make that any commonsense investment in Toronto real estate will turn out profitably. One gentleman says he does not know where you could invest in Toronto and lose by it.

Prices have a steady upward tendency, and can neither recede nor remain stationary. Mr James Johnson, who is a veteran in the real estate business, very truly remarks that transactions would have been much more lively in Toronto but for the abstraction two years ago of some seven much more lively in Toronto but for the abstraction two years ago of some seven millions from our banks to be sunk in wild speculations in the Northwest. He maintains that that money has been buried never to be resurrected, and that the Northwest has been discounted for ten years, and it will take six or eight years before Toronto and Ontario get thoroughly over this serious draining of the banks and monied men.

over this serious draining of the banks and monied men.

This is the moving season, and the nomadic tenant is busy pulling down and setting up his beloved stoves and pipes. Notwithstanding the great number of houses that have been put up of late, the demand for renting houses seems to be greater than the supply. All the gentlemen whom The World reporter visited yesterday were unanimous in their assertion that many strangers were coming to Toronto to live, among them retired zitizens of other places and farmers, for whom no

ronto to live, among them retired sitizens of other places and farmers, for whom no city presents so many attractions as Toronto. It is a fine city for the retired man of money to pass the twilight and sunset of his life. That there is an active demand for houses may be conjectured from the fact that at one real estate agency, that of Wm. A. Lee & Son, thirty-two out of a list of forty-six houses have been rented since Thursday last.

The house most in demand is one that rents from \$12 to \$18, containing seven or eight rooms, and having more or less of "modern conveniences." It is houses of this kind that seem to bring the highest rate of interest to the landlord. There is no difficulty in renting a dwelling of this description. As the value of a house increases above \$2000 the landlord's interest diminishes, a house worth from \$2500 to \$3000 renting on an average for about \$20 a month, which cannot be called a highly remunerative investment. Rents seem to have increased on an average about 10 per cent. over those of last year, and in no case are they lower.

Speculation is confined more at present to business sites than to residences, Queen street west being the most active quarter. What property owners in that street would like to see is the removal of the asylum, whose back fence extends for a quarter of a mile along the street, breaking the business character of the street for that distance.

ABOUT PRISON REFORM. An Interesting Paper on the Subject

At the last meeting of the Trinity college mission and literary society a paper was read on the history of prison reform by Mr. John Hague. The paper dealt exhaustively with the question as to the condition of English prisons at successive stages, and showed how for centuries they were full of horrors, physical and moral. The cause of the cruelties of the penal code was discussed fully, and attributed to the incessant social strife which made England a

sant social strife which made England a camp for centuries, so that practically martial law prevailed rather than civil. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning Chief Justice Hagarty and Judge Galt took their dictment and pleadings in the famous cor spiracy case. Things took an unexpected turn, and there is a probability that it may be many months before the case comes to trial, and there are those who say that it

Counsel for the prosecution are Æmilius Irving, Q. C., S. H. Blake, Q. C., and James Bethune, Q. C. The defendants are represented as follows: Mr. Bunting, by Dalton McCarthy, Q. C.; D. McMaster, Q. C., and W. A. Foster: Mr. Wilkinson, by Nicholas Murphy: Mr. Kirkland, by Dr. McMichael, Q. C., Alex. Cameron and W. Caswell; Mr. Meek, by Hector Cameron, Q. C., and Dr. McMichael, Q. C. Mr. Irving proposed to proceed with the arraignment of the defendants.

Dr. McMichael objected to the way in which the counts in the indictment were framed, on which a lengthy argument ensued. The objection was made on behalf of all the defendants, but his lordship decided to allow the indictment.

Mr. McCarthy objected on behalf of Mr. Bunting to the whole indictment on the ground that it was insufficient. After much more argument it was decided that the counsel for the defendants should issue a writ of certiorari, with the consent of the counsel for the crown, and that the demurrer should be argued before the full court of queen's bench.
