MINISTER HAGGART ORATES.

HE MAKES CARSWRIGHT SQUIRM UNDER THE LASH.

A Strong Protest Against the Nova Scotia Coal Deal.

Do Little or Nothing in the Matter—A Monument Asked for Chrysler's Farm.

OTAWA, Feb. 16.—Hon. John Haggart, in resuming the debate on the Budget this afternoon, took his position as a leading and senior Minister at the House of Commons. In a speech which occupied the Minister of Finance in these columns on Wednesday it was said that Sir John Thompson and Hon. Mr. Foster were the two foremost men in the Cabinet. Mr. Haggart is easily the third man, and in his own department takes the position of superior of all of them. He has made a first-class Minister of Railways, and the Intercolonial, under his management, is coasting to a drain on the country for its maintenance and as last there is the prospect of it becoming a successful investment. He has a hard business head and he has a knack of getting at the facts of a case even if he has to ruffle the feathers of some in the process.

Mr. Haggart is in his 57th year, is a big man of Scotch descent and has been in Parliament for 21 years. His speech to-day was an answer to Sir Richard Cartwright who was one of the best he has ever delivered. He has a good parliamentary style, will take with him his followers and what will rankle his opponents, and though he never professes to be a patriot, he is always ready with his hope in Canada's future and hold out that the day is at hand when our large investments for railways and coals will be much more productive than in the past. This afternoon Mr. Haggart spoke for nearly an hour and a half, dealing with Sir Richard Cartwright's speech and answering the statements made by that gentleman. He commenced by congratulating Mr. Foster on the case which he had delivered, and the country on the splendid statement made by the Finance Minister, which was a masterpiece of logic as shown by the increased deposits in the banks, etc. Turning to Sir Richard Cartwright's speech, he referred to Sir John Macdonald's always wanting a couple of professional philistines to be the witnesses in any case. Sir Richard himself was a candidate for a position under Sir John Macdonald.

Hon. Mr. Haggart: "Well, at any rate the hon. gentleman was a walking candidate. Certainly he would be classified as a professional philistropist." [Laughter.] Mr. Haggart then entered into a history of the N.P., asserting with the conditions of the country in 1878 and claiming that the effect of the policy had not only been to find employment for the young men and to develop the country, but there were actually 117 more articles on the free list now than there were in 1878.

He ridiculed Sir Richard Cartwright's statement that a million and a half Canada was added to the United States. The last two years, and quoted the figures of the United States census returns to show that the number of Canadians in the States had only increased 291,385 in the 10 years from 1880 to 1890, which shows included the natural increase of the 712,368 Canadians who had emigrated to the States. In 1880 this flow of population from Canada to the United States had been going on for a hundred years and was referred to by the first governor of the Province of Quebec.

'RASTUS BOBS UP.

He Lifts the Veil of the Future on This Content and Sea-Internation.

ROCHESTER, Feb. 16.—At the annual banquet of the Chamber of Commerce of this city held last night, Rastus Wiman predicted, as the result of the impending economic changes in the trade policy of the country, that within the lifetime of children now living a greater foreign commerce would be created than the vast internal commerce which now exists and flows in this section of 40 nations.

While exports of food products are likely to cease within a quarter of a century, there will be no limitations to possible exports of manufactures, except the ability of markets to absorb them, and in this sense the world seemed too small for the power of production on this continent.

Not being able to annex Mars in the recent near approach of the planet to each other, it remains to develop new regions for trade on the one hand and sources of supply on the other.

To inaugurate a movement in this direction it is not necessary to wait half a century for political union, but within five years, by an obliteration of the tariff now abhorred by the world, the first steps can be taken to make it commercially one.
