 Ottawa, Sept. 27.—The cabinet was in session for two hours to-day, all the Ministers being present with the exception of Donald Macdonnell. More than ordinary interest is attached to to-day's meeting of the cabinet in view of the fact that it was the first gathering of all the Ministers since the resignation of the late premier. It is stated that a large accumulation of departmental matters was disposed of, but that the question of calling Parliament together was considered. The first business to be discussed was the appointment of the new judge of the Supreme Court in succession to the late Justice Gauthier. The new judge will take his seat on the bench on Tuesday next at the meeting of the cabinet to be held Saturday. Sir Frank Smith remaining over to attend it.

POBALLY FATALITY HURT.
 Eliza Hamilton, a Laborer, Fractured Her Skull by a Fall at the Simpson Building.
 A serious accident occurred at the Simpson building last night, the victim being Eliza Hamilton, a laborer, 28 years of age, who resides at 156 Queen-street west. NO OFFER MADE TO MR. CALLAWAY.
 A VERDICT IN THREE MINUTES.
 Mrs. Manser Died From the Effects of Medicine Taken to Procure an Abortion.
 "That deceased Amy Manser came to her death at 72 Bay-street on Wednesday, Sept. 25, from acute inflammation of the kidneys, brought on by taking Mrs. J. Clark's female pills with the object of producing a miscarriage, and that Maggie Jackman was exonerated from all blame in connection therewith."
 Such was the verdict rendered by Coroner Young's jury at the Morgue yesterday concerning the death of Amy Manser. Her husband, deceased, deposed as to the time his wife died and her actions preceding her death. Deceased had told him she had taken some regular pills which she received from Mrs. Maggie Jackman, Teraulay-street, the night before her death. He identified a bottle shown him by Coroner Young, as having been the same which had contained the pills his wife had taken. Witness was much distressed while giving evidence, and throughout the inquest. Dr. A. H. Garratt testified that he had attended Mrs. Manser during confinement, and that to his mind she was an unusually healthy woman. Mrs. Jackman, 132 Teraulay-street, denied having ever given deceased any pills or other medicine or ever having had any kind of medical care in her house. Deceased was witness's house on Tuesday night, but did not come inside, she simply asked witness to come and call on her, and said she had just called as she was passing and would not come in. Dr. Pepler testified to having been called in to see Mrs. Manser on Wednesday night, but deceased was not present on his arrival. Witness also stated in the statement of the post-mortem that deceased had taken some medicine which she had purchased from her death from acute inflammation of the kidneys.
 Dr. G. A. Bingham corroborated the evidence of Dr. Pepler. Drugs had been purchased by the acute inflammation of the kidneys, which was the direct cause of death.
 Other witnesses examined were Minnie McCutcheon, a neighbor of deceased; Maude Moffatt, a neighbor of Mrs. Jackman, who corroborated the testimony of the latter.
 It only took the jury three minutes to arrive at a verdict. There was nothing in the evidence to show that deceased got the pills that caused her death.
 At the request of a jurymen, Coroner Young ordered the jury to issue a writ of habeas corpus for the woman, unlawfully supplied with any drug or other noxious thing or medicine, or that she was aware of such knowledge that the same is to be unlawfully used or employed with intent to procure the miscarriage of a woman whether she is or is not with child."

SCOLLIE NOT MURDERED.
 JUDGE AND JURY ACQUIESCE IN THE FINDING.
 The Case Taken From the Jury by Chancellor Boyd, Who Expresses the Conviction That No Crime Was Committed.
 The Bench directed with Loud Applause by the Spectators.
 Peterboro, Sept. 27.—The trial of Hester Gray for the murder of David Scollie came to an abrupt termination here this morning. The Crown's case against the prisoner failed completely, and after a few minutes' deliberation heard in behalf of the defence, Chancellor Boyd ordered the case to be closed, and directed the jury to record a verdict of not guilty.
 When the court rose last evening several witnesses yet remained to be called for the Crown, but when this practically announced the abandonment of the prosecution, when he arose and stated to His Lordship that he would offer no further testimony. "Do you purpose calling any witnesses?" was His Lordship's significant question to Mr. Stratton, counsel for defence. "I have a few, whose testimony would like the court and jury to hear," replied Mr. Stratton.
No Blood on the Clothing.
 With the testimony of William Leahy, a neighbor of the Grays, the defence opened their case. Leahy swore to having seen the morning of Scollie's death when it was taken from the ruins. The neck and shoulders bore every appearance of having been in a severe struggle. Leahy testified that he saw the bones protruding from the body. He saw no blood on the clothing, though there were a few drops on Leahy's coat. The neck when the body was removed.
 Annie Gray's Story of the Fire.
 Annie Gray, the 13-year-old daughter of the prisoner, a slight little thing, bearing many of the characteristic features of her mother, gave her evidence in a manner that was remarkable. She was five years of age and placed in so peculiar a position that she had seen Scollie in the house when she retired the night of the fire. She and her mother, and two brothers, occupied the other bed. There were two stoves in the house, one in the kitchen and another in the room where they slept. On the morning of the fire, the witness said she was awakened by her mother's room. She awakened and started toward the door. The witness said she saw the flames coming to the hall, but the flames drove back. The mother got the ax from behind the door and she and Leahy went down and they scrambled out as best they could. The witness and her brother were almost immediately taken out on some of the clothing that she threw out of the window to them. When they got down, the witness went over to McGregors. The witness said she saw Scollie in the habit of reading after he had gone to bed.
 Her Testimony Unshaken.
 A long cross-examination by Mr. Stratton failed to shake the testimony of the witness in any particular. "Because Mr. Burnham was a rich man and she did not know where he was, 'no dresses on,'" was the reason witness assigned for passing Burnham's name. "I was sure that I saw the alarm."
 The witness Gray, the chubby-faced 13-year-old brother followed her in the night of the fire and he and his mother went to the kitchen and Leahy and when they had to the doors gone to bed. His story of the order of events on the morning of the fire was substantially the same as that told by his sister. To His Lordship the witness said she believed that he or she came into the house they had a drink of tea, made some shavings and went to bed.
 In answer to Mr. Clute, he said the witness was in the house when they went to bed. Leahy and Leahy's mother were in the kitchen. The little fellow gave his evidence in a manner that was impressive. He told him with his own eyes, witness.
 A Sudden Termination.
 When he stepped from the witness box Mr. Stratton called for the next witness, when His Lordship interposed a question as to the evidence of Leahy should go any further, unless the jury were wanted to have some further evidence. The jurymen shook their heads, and one of their number rose from his seat and expressed the opinion that the case was closed. "The case was very weak at the close of the Crown's testimony," said the jurymen, "and whatever suspicious circumstances were brought out here by the evidence of Leahy and Leahy's mother were very foolish, very wicked, but do not convict them of crime. It seems highly improbable that he could have been murdered there and have no signs of a struggle, no blood, and it is impossible that he could have committed the deed."
 When His Lordship directed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, the court-room was immediately filled with a cheering applause, which neither the sheriff nor his officers made any attempt to quell. Mrs. Gray was moved to tears by the announcement of her acquittal. She is still a charge of murder against Gray, and a charge of assault on the person of Scollie. These will in all probability be dropped.
