Financial Uneasiness in France

PARIS, August 7—Upward trend of the dollar is causing great financial uneasiness in France. The dollar on the Paris Bourse last evening closed at 7 francs 87 centimes, having reached 7 francs 76 centimes during the course of the daily transactions. Bon Soir, in its leading article, said that the franc, which was worth twenty cents before the war, was now equal to twelve cents.

In sympathy with the dollar, the pound sterling also is amounting, having sold this afternoon at 35 francs 35 centimes.

Seventy seven Shubenacadie boys enlisted in the war and of these sixty lived to come back. They have all been presented with gold watches, suitably engraved. Probably no other community in Canada has honored its returned men in this way.

THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

Hon. W. L. McKenzie King the New Leader

The Liberals throughout Canada held a very successful convention in Ottawa last week one of the most important subjects before the convention being the selection of a new leader to take the place of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, which resulted as follows.

THE NOMINEES

The nominees for the position of leader of the Liberal party were: Alex. Smith, Ottawa, proposed by J. E. McCall, of Cobourg, seconded by J. MacAulay, of Warton; Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, proposed by Sir Alan Aylesworth and seconded by Hon. Sidney Fisher; D. D. McKenzie, proposed by J. A. Robb, and seconded by Hon. Frank Oliver, N. T. McMillan and J. H. Sinclair.
Hon. Geo. P. Graham, proposed by W. W. B. McInnes, of Vancouver, seconded by C. T. Monteruil, of Essex. Hon. W. S. Fielding, proposed by Premier Martin, of Saskatchewan, and seconded by Premier Foster, of New Brunswick.
Mr. Smith announced his withdrawal from the contest before the voting commenced.

Ripening Tomatoes in a Short Season (Experimental Farms Note) In a comparatively short growing season, the tomato usually produces a large crop of green fruit but only in favourable summers is there much ripe fruit produced unless special measures are taken to hasten ripening.

CHOICE OF VARIETY. Only the very earliest varieties should be used. The Earliana variety and strains developed from it, such as Alacridy and Sunnybrook, are the best to use.

LOCATION. Tomatoes should be grown in a well sheltered garden where the wind is prevented from beating them about. They should be in the open sunlight; shade is fatal to success.

STARTING. At Brandon the tomato seed is planted in seed boxes in a hotbed the first week of April. An earlier start can be made when seed is started in the house but more satisfactory results are attained in a hotbed.

PLANTING. The tomatoes are planted in the open about June 10th. Earlier than that it is too risky for frost in Manitoba, and while that date is not entirely free from frost risk, later planting would have too short a remaining season for the development required.

STAKING. The tomato plants should be staked upright and should be pruned to reduce the foliage. These operations probably have a greater effect in inducing early maturity than anything else, with the exception of variety.

The object is to allow the sun to shine more directly on the stems and fruit and to check the production of excessive foliage and late blossoms. The plant should be trained to grow to one upright stem instead of numerous spreading branches. It should be fastened upright by driving a stake in beside it and tying to the stake.
