To the Clergy and Parishioners of the several Parishes in the Diocese of Toronto.

My DEAR BRETHREN,

About this time in the preceding year I called your attention to the critical condition of the Mission Fund of the Diocese, and expressed my anxious desire that vigorous and united efforts should be made to extricate it from the state of embarassment in which it was unhappily placed.

I stated to you that, with balances overdrawn and money borrowed to meet former payments. this fund was in arrears to the extent of \$3739.47, exclusive of the amount required for the stipends due on January 1, 1866, viz. \$2097.50; making the whole amount of deficiency at the time I addressed you \$5836.97.

Though not without considerable anxiety as to the possibility of recovering ourselves from this alarming condition of the Fund, I felt that there was that buoyancy and religious life amongst the members of our Church in general, which would, if fairly put forth, effect our entire relief from all chance of crippling our Missionary operations.

In this I have not been disappointed; for through the efforts of the friends of the Church Society, both Clergy and Laity, the whole amount of last year's arrears has been cancelled, and we are only behind hand in the amount of the quarter's stipend due to our Missionaries on the 1st January next, viz. about \$2200; instead of \$5836 at the present period of the last year.

It is true we have to take into account the munificent donation of \$2000 bequeathed by the late Mrs. Williams, of Tccumseth,—a thoughtfulness for the interest and advancement of the Church, which I hope will be extensively imitated. But even with this abatement from the fund actually raised in the Diocese, we find a large and most hopeful improvement in our financial position as compared with what it was the preceding year. I feel persuaded that if the same strenuous efforts are put forth this winter, which were so cheeringly exerted last winter, we shall have enough in hand to meet the January payments of 1868, and probably be able,—which is so much to be desired,—to increase the number of our Missionary labourers.

During the past year thirty-two Missionaries, one Indian School Master, one Indian Interpreter, eleven Willows and four Orphans have received aid from the Society, as follows:

I trust, then, as I urged upon you in my last appeal, that there will be a hearty response:

First, to the Collection for the Mission Fund to be made in the several Churches and Stations of the Diocese during the next month.

Secondly, that a dutiful liberality will be exercised in the Collections made at the several parochial meetings; and

Thirdly, that there will be a vigorous prosecution of the Collections from house to house. We seem to be at no loss in any of our parishes in obtaining earnest and active Collectors. I thank them, on the Church's behalf, for undertaking this duty; and I trust their labour of love will be followed by the gratification of having large additions made to the funds of our Diocesan Missionary Society. And again I have to express my hope and belief that, in our City of Toronto, with so much wealth amongst its numerous Church population, there will be that expansion and vigor in its Missionary energy during the present winter, which will render its contributions towards this noble object at least proportionate to what is obtained in the other Towns of the Diocese.

I am addressing you, my dear brethren, with much hope and confidence; and it will gladden me more than I can express to discover that this my carnest appeal has been received by you with the warmth and earnestness which is due from privileged and enlightened Churchmen.

# DESTRUCTION OF THE NEW CHURCH AT PORT PERRY.

We are extremely sorry to learn that the neat Gothic Brick Church, in course of erection at Port Perry, has been destroyed by a fearful storm which recently visited that section of the country. Those zealous friends of the Church, Mr. and Mrs. Charles, of Port Perry, aided by others, had nearly succeeded in completing this handsome and much needed structure when the calamity overtook them. The tornado must have been of a very formidable character to have worked such devastation

with a building of its solidity. We are happy to hear that the Bishop has recommended the Rev. Mr. Forneri, the excellent young missionary in that neighbourhood, to make an application to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge for a grant, which his Lordship has promised to recommend under the unusual circumstances of the case. Contributions towards the restoration of the Church will be thankfully received by the Rev. Mr. Forneri, Uxbridge; Mr. H. Charles. Port Perry, and by W. P. Atkinson, Esq., Toronto.

## UXBRIDGE MISSION.

On Friday evening last, the 23rd inst., the members of the congregation of St. Paul's (English) Church, Uxbridge village, to the number of about forty, made a nocturnal visit to their respected pastor, the Rev. Mr. Forneri, at the parsonage, londed with all sorts of "creature comforts," such as flour, potatoes, vegetables, meat, geese, ducks, and fowls, jellies, preserves, jams and conserves of fruit, butter and eigs, -besides several bigs of oats for his horse. gentleman and family were entirely unaware of the import of their visit, and were therefore perfectly amazed at seeing their house uncoremoniously filled by ladies and gentlemen, -of whose approach they had no intimation, -each carrying either a basket or a bag filled with something highly useful. In a few minutes the tables were spread with the provisions brought for the occasion, and one after another joined in the hearty and cheerful repast. Previous, however, to partaking of the entibles prepared, an overcoat valued at \$25.00, was presented by Mr. Thomas Bolster, Sen., on behalf of several gentlemen of the congregation, to the Rev. Mr. Forneri, and A. Boultbee, Esq., read the following

ADDRESS: " Rev. AND DEAR SIR,-We, the members of your Uxbridge congregation, being desirous of expressing the kindly and Christian feeling that should exist between a pastor and his people; and which we assure you, (so far as it is possible, owing to your short abode among us ) we feel towards you in no common degree; and at the same time wishing to let you see that we do not forget the high privilege we, as Christians, have at this season of the year in making an "offering" from our harvestings to the Creator, by presenting them for the use of his minister among us, particularly as we regret to see that, as yet no day of general thanksgiving has been appointed. We therefore request your acceptance of these few things we have this evening brought to the parsonage, hoping they may prove serviceable to yourself and family.

"We would also express our fervent desire that your stay in our midst, may

be long, useful and prosperous."

To this Mr. Forneri replied with much emotion:-

"My DEAR FRIENDS,—I am unable to thank you sufficiently for your valuable and seasonable gifts. I feel your kindness the more as I am comparatively a stranger amongst you, my ministry is untried, and I have no claim whatever upon your gratitude or benevolence.

"Moreover it gives me heartfelt satisfaction and thankfulness to God to receive this substantial expression of your good will as an evidence that notwithstanding the church in Uxbridge has had many drawbacks and discouragements, you have

not become ' weary in well doing.'

"I thank you sincerely in my own name, and in that of my sisters, for your valuable presents, and pray that Almighty God may prosper my work amongst

you to the salvation of souls, and the glory of His Holy Name."

After tea was over, the remainder of the evening was spent in pleasant conversation and music, to the delight of all present. At about eleven o'clock the people dispersed, well satisfied with the manner in which they had spent the eve-

We are glad to hear that Mr. Forneri is so highly esteemed; and we feel sure that he is justly entitled to it. Long may he be spared to be the recipient of his people's affections and oblations, such as have been shewn and offered on this
