Topics of the Week.

Militia General Orders (6) issued last Friday contain the regulations to govern the annual drill of 1890-91. They are with a few unimportant exceptions identical with those issued last year. The dates for the camps are given, but the locations are not yet stated. The three Ontario camps open simultaneously, on the 17th of June; those for Districts 5 and 6, Quebec, on the 24th June; District 7, Quebec, 1st July; District 8, New Brunswick, 24th June, and District 9, Nova Scotia, some time in September.

There is an air of permanency about the latest enterprise of the Queen's Own Rifles—the Q. O. R. of C. Revolver Association, nearly thirty members having already purchased revolvers and commenced practice. Great interest is reported to be taken in the affairs of the association. The rules of the organization have been printed in neat pamphlet form. The Association recommend the adoption of a .32-44 revolver, as that best suited for the practice. The maximum length of barrel is fixed at 7½ inches, and the minimum pull of trigger is to be three pounds. The practice will be at 25 and 50 yards. Paper targets will be used, with seven divisions, the bulls-eye counting seven points. The Queen's Own would naturally like to see similar associations formed in other cities, and to facilitate revolver practice they will furnish targets at a reasonable rate and send any information desired on application being made to the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. W. S. Duncan, at 32 King street West, Toronto.

Since our last issue, Lieut. Manning and Capt. Busteed have accepted the places offered them on the Bisley twenty, which is now complete, the last acceptance coming from the thirty-third man on the list. Pte, Burns of the Vics, who distinguished himself by winning the Governor General's prize last year and who refused his place on the team, now finds that he might have accepted, and it is not improbale that should a vacancy occur between now and the time of sailing he will be given another chance. The team sail on the 25th June, on the Parisian, and the N. R. A. meeting at Bisley opens on the 14th July.

A commendable effort is being made to increase the military spirit amongst the French youth of Montreal, who are blamed for not keeping their one French regiment, the Sixty-Fifth, up to the standard to which it should attain. L'Etendard says in a recent issue: "How much better it would be for the entire community if our young men, instead of passing their time in bar-rooms or at their clubs, would give a little more attention to military exercises. It is necessary, however, that the best men amongst us should give the example, and the sons of our first families should consider it an honour to belong to our military corps-While we have but one French-Canadian battalion in Montreal it should be the finest in all the Dominion. But we know of families who, instead of encouraging their sons to go and enrol themselves in our militia companies, where in perfecting their health and strength they work for their country, prefer to see them frequent clubs, loaf in saloons and become demoralized in every sense of the word. Let us follow the example of our English-speaking compatriots, who form numerous regiments, and let it not be said that they are in a better position than we to defend our common country. It would be something new to see the English surpass the French in the defence of this Canada of ours, for in the past the French Canadians were always the first to serve their country against a common foe."

An attractive feature of the Toronto Globe of Saturday last was a liberally illustrated article on the Military Institute recently established in that city. The writer takes occasion to review the military history of Canada from the time of Wolfe, and coming down to the present has. this to say of the Institute: "The establishment of a Military Institute in Toronto will facilitate 'reading and discourse' amongst military men. It will be the means of disseminating knowledge, will familiarise the members with the latest developments in implements of warfare, the latest products of military science, and the latest accomplishments of military strategy. It may, if successfully conducted, be even hailed as the advent of a new era in the history of our citizen soldiery. The Institute is not of a pretentious character, but it has been brought into existence to supply a long-felt want. It will, it is hoped, be the vital centre from which the military thought of the day will radiate to all parts of the Dominion. It is intended to be the trysting place where the officers, past and present, who have patriotic instincts will gather to discuss whatever influences, benign or sinister, may be operating upon the profession of arms."

THE MILITARY RIFLE

Details of the Scores of the First Match--The Returns not all Sent in.

The details of the scores made by the teams who participated in the first match of the Canadian Military Rifle League, held on the 17th inst., make very interesting reading, and if they do not show the relative superiority of the teams they do at least prove that the weather throughout the whole country was exceptionally unfavourable for rifle shooting. The conditions, it may be again stated, called for seven shots at 200 yards, standing or kneeling, seven at 500 and seven at 600 yards, the rifle used being the Snider. The "possible" individual score was thus 105, but dozens of men with good Wimbledon records appear with 50's or 60's to their credit, and one "old reliable," who regularly wins a place on the team, figures with a hard earned 35 at the three ranges. Small wonder is it, therefore, that the many teams of new shots made such absurdly low scores, and with ordinary weather conditions a marked general improvement may be looked for when the second match is fired, on Saturday of this week. We have again to request that the Captains of teams will be more prompt in mailing their score sheets. They might easily in each case be made up on the range, and mailed as soon as the person in charge gets back to town from the range. If all were mailed Saturday night, as they should be, we could publish the greater number of the scores in the first issue after the shooting; but in this instance, so great has been the delay, that the second issue has had to be held over a day in expectation of the arrival of the scores of some of the leading teams. And even now the record is incomplete, as will be seen.

The 54th Battalion report having used the 16-inch inner and 24inch magpie at 200 yards. An examination of their shot for shot score, published below, shows that their possible loss by this was eighteen points, so it is fair to assume that with the larger inner and magnie they would have had nine or ten points more to their credit.

Preparations being made in St. John, N.B., for a great celebration' on the 12th of July, the 62nd Fusiliers ask to be allowed to fire the fifth match on the 5th instead, a privilege already promised the Toronto corps. All others desiring a change in the date are requested to forward their notifications without delay.

In the totals published last week, as received by telegraph, there were a few mistakes which it is as well to note here. The Regina Rifle Association scored 571, not 570; the 10th R. G. second team 526, not 524; the 35th Battalion Orillia team 413, not 351; the 5th Royal Scots second team 292, not 342; the 1st P. W. R. 254, not 264; and "A" Battery R. C. A. with a score of 414, was omitted from the list. The second teams entered from the Governor General's Foot Guards and the 1st P. W. R. do not appear to have fired.

THE RULES OF THE LEAGUE.

EDITOR MILITIA GAZETTE,—Now that the smoke of the first great League Match is cleared away, we can see where there is a weak point in the otherwise admirable system of checking. The scores are properly kept by members of rival regiments, not competitors, but why is there no provision made for the checking of the markers at the butts?

In the case of a team firing where no other team is competing, what is to prevent the markers giving a bull's-eye for every inner or magpie, and in such a case the markers would, of course, be just as much interested in the result of the match as the riflemen themselves. In cases where several teams are competing at once, such dishonest marking would be of course impracticable, as the targets are drawn for at every range and each team checks the other's performance; but where only one team is firing, I think the officials of the league should see that there is some system of checking the markers put into force immediately. I do not for a moment insinuate that the marksmen

themselves would take any unfair advantage, but when a marker in the butt has a father, brother, or a friend firing at his target, and is not overburdened with scruples of conscience, there is nothing whatever to prevent him from giving first place to the man he wants to give it to.

I notice that the team from B Battery fired in the morning. Will you kindly let your readers know why they did so, and also if their marking was done partly or in whole by a fatigue party of their own men, or if it was done by the regular markers on the range.

Every true rifleman will agree with me in wanting to have these little matters of detail so arranged as to be above possibility of suspicion.

All exceptions to the general rules of the League should be duly notified to the other competitors, through the columns of this paper, and that everything may be fair and above board is the sincere wish of MARK IV.

Regimental and Other News,

Is J. Ethier, Q.C., is to be appointed joint city attorney of Montreal, on condition of giving up his commission in the 65th Battalion, in which he is junior Major.

Lord Dufferin has sent a subscription of \$25 towards the fund for the erection of a monument to Major Short and Staff-Sergt. Wallick of B Battery, who met such a tragic death at the recent great fire in Quebec:

The 65th were to have had a parade and sham fight on Ascension. Day, the 15th instant, but circumstances preventing the turnout on that day, it was held on the following Sunday. The Witness reports considerable indignation to have been aroused by the proceeding, and says: "This, it may be remarked, is not the first Sunday sham fight held here. Years ago a Sunday review was held here, and the famous General Stonewall' Jackson—noted both for his piety and his splendid courage—who was a visitor here at the time, attended it. Afterwards, in his diary, he expressed regret at having done so, and a determination to decline invitations to Sunday reviews thereafter."

The Orillia Packet of the 23rd inst. has a complimentary reference to the military services of Mr. Andrew Miscampbell, lumberman, who has just been nominated as the Liberal Conservative candidate in East Simcoe for the Ontario Legislature. From a mere lad he took an interest in military affairs, and was a member of the volunteer band at Barrie. He was one of the first to pass through the military school at Toronto, about 1863, and obtained a first-class certificate, though the examiners stated that it was not quite regular to graft it to one so young. In 1866 he was Sergeant-Major of the provisional battalion, now the 35th, Simcoe Foresters, while on service during and subsequent to the Fenian raid. Mr. Miscampbell was also for some years drill instructor of the Gookstown and Barrie (No. 5) Companies.

The Montreal Rifle Rangers of 1854.

The annual dinner of the "Montreal Rifle Rangers," which was held at the City Club, Montreal, on the evening of the 22nd May, came off with great eclat. Capt. Thomas Lyman (now Lieut.-Col. Lyman) occupied the chair, and Lieut.-Col. J. W. Hanson, formerly Brigade-Major of Militia (now residing at Berthier en haut), the vice-chair. Among those assembled around the festive board were the following old members of the corps: T. F. Blackwood of H. M. Customs, Toronto, G. W. Stephens, Esq., acting Mayor of Montreal, Lieut.-Col. John Macpherson, Director of Militia Stores, Ottawa, Alderman W. Farrel, Mr. Michael Bourret, Mr. Malcom Morison, Mr. Robert Forsyth, Mr. J. H. Wood, Mr. R. L. Gault, Mr. Walter Wiley, all of Montreal.

This corps was the first company formed in 1854, prior to the Militia Act of 1855, under the command of Cap. Thos. Lyman (now Lieut.-Col.) of Montreal, all the gentlemen present being members of

the company when first formed.

After the usual loyal toasts were disposed of, speeches and songs were the order of the evening. Interesting addresses were delivered by Lieut.-Col. Lyman, Acting Mayor Stephens, Mr. Blackwood, Mr. Wiley and Lieut.-Col. Macpherson. The latter gave his old comrades some statistics of the Canadian militia, showing the results attained by the good example given them by the "Montreal Rifle Rangers," which was formed in 1854 and gazetted in 1855, being the first volunteer rifle company organized in Canada under the present militia system. He hoped that the annual gathering would be continued as long as any of the members of the old company are left. He contrasted the first turn out of the company of 80 as smart, tidy and soldierly looking men as ever drilled, with the remaining 24 men now in existence, and these scattered about in different parts of this continent.

It may be interesting to note in speaking of the early days of volunteering, that the cost of the uniform of the "Montreal Rifle Rangers" was £20 each and was paid by the members of the company. The youngest member is now over 55 years of age, and most of those left look as if they will meet at many annual gatherings yet

look as if they will meet at many annual gatherings yet.

Letters were read from Charles Nelson of St. Paul, Minn., John Pope of London Ont., and L. S. Levey, New York, expressing regret at

not being able to attend.

During the evening the company was serenaded by the pipers of the

5th Royal Scots, the regiment being out that evening for drill parad. Subsequently Lt. Col. Caverhill and the officers of the Royal Scots paid the compliment of a visit to the City Club to meet the old members of the Rangers; which was duly appreciated.

All separated at 11.30 p.m. after singing the National Anthem and

having spent a most enjoyable evening.

Hamilton.

There was a fair turnout of the 13th Battalion on Wednesday evening, 21st inst., for the regular battalion parade. Major McLaren was in command, and Captain Tidswell was acting adjustiff. The Queen's Own.

In this week's issue I shall endeavour to give you as full an account as my limited time will permit of the Queen's birthday trip of the regiment to Peterboro'. Punctually at 8 o'clock on the evening of the 23rd inst. the regiment paraded in heavy marching order, with great coats rolled, and after a short delay moved from the shed up Jarvis, along Carlton (passing Lt.-Col. Allan's house) and up Yonge to North Toronto station, reaching there at about 9.30. After giving the express sufficient start, the regiment entered into the long special train, and at 10.10 p.m. moved off amidst the cheers from the immense throng assembled to witness the departure of the "boys in green." Shortly after 1 a.m. the train drew into the station at Peterboro', where ringing cheers from the large crowd, assembled despite the lateness of the hour, assured us of our hearty welcome to their hospitality.

Immediately on the stopping of the train an address of welcome was presented to Col. Hamilton by the Mayor, on behalf of the citizens, upon the conclusion of which the regiment fell in and, to the music of the bands, marched to the camp grounds, followed by hundreds of the towns-

people and members of the 57th.

The gray streaks of dawn were visible before any one turned in, and mot more than a couple of hours' sleep could be obtained before reveille sounded, and everyone was out polishing and cleaning up for the march out. About 10.30 the men fell in, and headed by a detachment of cavalry, started for the review grounds. At Ashburnham Road the 57th were drawn up, 250 strong, and accompanied the Queen's own to the grounds. After the feu-de-joie was fired, and three hearty cheers for the Queen were given, the regiments formed into column and marched past. All the movements were exceptionally well performed, considering the exceedingly bad condition of the ground. After a brief rest the march back to camp commenced, after which the men were dismissed for the day.

On Sunday a church parade was held to St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, which was attended by both regiments. A splendid service was given, the singing being especially good; and the band of the Queen's Own, stationed in the gallery, rendered "The Heaven's are talking"

chorus from Handel with splendid effect. On the return to camp heavy black clouds betokened dirty weather, and the men were speedily dismissed and set to work unrolling tent curtains and preparing for rain, and none too soon, for in a few moments the "Heavens did tell," deluging any luckless individual whose duty called him from cover. The rain poured through a number of the tents, and gave the men an idea of how well the old tents would protect them should it ever be necessary to use them again for a campaign. Despite "Old Probs" endeavours to put a damper on the spirits of the men, the "cook's parade" was held, and torrents of rain did not mar the success of that feature of Queen's Own camps.

At 10 p.m. the bugles sounded the fall-in and by this time the rain had ceased and the column moved off en route for home. A very hearty send off was given by the Peterborough folk as the train steamed off. Thus a very pleasant trip as far as Peterborough hospitality was concern-

ed, was brought to a close.

Nothing could exceed the kindness of the towns people and the 57th, and the citizens vied with each other in their endeavors to make the trip as pleasant as possible. On Saturday the officers were tendered a luncheon by the mayor and councillors, and in the evening the noncoms were tendered a moonlight excursion by their brother non-coms of the 57th, which was acknowledged on all sides to be an exceedingly pleasant surprise, and certainly will ensure a very happy return at the hands of the Q.O.R. non-coms when they visit Toronto during carnival week. The regiment reached town about 4 a.m. Monday carrying with them a splendid report of the hospitality of the Peterborough people.
