## BORDEN CAUSES SENSATION IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

### FLEET UNITS BUILT IN CANADA WHOLLY IMPRACTICABLE PLAN CHURCHILL'S ADVICE TO BORDEN

Premier's Production of Hitherto Jealously Guarded Memoranda in House Comes as Bombshell—To Construct Dreadnoughts in Canada Would Mean Outlay of Seventy-five Millions on Plant, and Skilled Workmen Could Not Be Obtained—British Admiralty Would Be Unable to Spare Men for Two Fleet Units Proposed by Laurier.

OTTAWA, March 10.—Right Hon. R. L. Borden exploded a bomb shell in the midst of the opposition in the committee of the whole house tonight, while the naval bill was under discussion and it seemed for a time as if the debate would come to a sudden end. Mr. Turriff of Assiniboia, who had yielded the floor in the middle of his speech to enable the prime minister to make a statement, seemed fairly overwhelmed by the unexpected explosion and after a brief attempt to reply, was compelled to call upon Mr. Carvell, the Liberal member for Carleton, N.B., who during the day had already spoken at some length, to resume his labors.

**Can't Build in Canada.**  
 The bombshell consisted of letters and memoranda addressed to Mr. Borden by Right Hon. Winston Churchill, which demonstrate the impossibility of Canada constructing dreadnoughts for many years to come and incidentally proved that the Laurier plan of two fleet units was utterly beyond the realm of practical politics. To start a navy on the large scale proposed by the Liberals, would, according to Mr. Churchill, involve to begin with the creation of a plant, costing \$75,000,000, which would not be ready to do work for at least four years. The workmen for such a plant could not be obtained in Canada, and moreover, even the Canada possessed two fleet units today, the British admiralty would be unable to spare officers and experts to instruct crews and take charge of them. In passing the first lord of the admiralty had occasion to say that if the Laurier naval plan had been carried out the Dominion would have been unable to man one single cruiser. On the whole Mr. Churchill presented a most sweeping indictment and denunciation of the entire program of the opposition, at least from an imperial standpoint.

**Effect Was Crushing.**  
 The announcement of the prime minister tonight came with crushing effect, because all afternoon and evening the Liberals, from Sir Wilfrid Laurier down, had taunted Mr. Borden with suppressing important portions of the Churchill letters and memoranda. Indeed, to some extent they justified their obstruction upon the ground that the part of the correspondence which was not laid upon the table might prove of great value to their cause.

**Mr. Turriff of Assiniboia,** was speaking toward midnight when Mr. Borden entered the house. The galleries rapidly filled, the official galleries being occupied by ladies in evening dress. He asked leave of Mr. Turriff to interrupt him long enough to make a brief statement, and then read his correspondence with the first lord of the admiralty. As the reading progressed the Conservatives gave way to unbounded enthusiasm, and the conclusion of Mr. Borden's speech was a signal for uproarious cheers and applause.

**Still Obstructing.**  
 Nevertheless the house is sitting and may continue to sit until Saturday midnight. The Liberals during the day have been protesting that they were in the fight to a finish and the supporters of the government are determined and enthusiastic. The dissolution talk has faded away, but resort may be had to the closure, although likely not before next week.

The Codrere charges will be taken up tomorrow, when, by arrangement the house will come out of committee for that purpose.

### SUFFRAGETTE DEMONSTRATION IS REGARDED BY KING GEORGE AS DIRECT DELIBERATE INSULT

He Flushed With Anger and Was Calmed by the Queen—Women Saved by Police From Ill-Treatment at Hands of Crowd—Three Railway Stations Burned.

 LONDON, March 12.—Militant suffragettes "broke out" once more today. They attempted to arrest the progress of King George and Queen Mary as the royal couple were returning from the opening of parliament and burned three railway stations.

Mrs. Pankhurst tonight denies that her five lieutenants, who achieved the disgraceful feat of interfering with the royal procession, threw anything, even papers, at the royal carriage, and repudiates any intention of insulting the King and Queen. Their object, she says, was to present a petition to the King, but really it was to make a striking suffragette demonstration. They knew it was irregular to attempt to force a petition on the King, and he undoubtedly regarded it as a deliberate insult, for he flushed with anger, and Queen Mary placed her hand upon his arm as if to calm him.

**Women Were Frightened.**  
 The women, all of whom were young, and two very good-looking, were exceedingly frightened at the menacing aspect of the crowd of three or four thousand, which would undoubtedly have flung them into the lake in St. James' Park but for the protection of a large body of police. Some such outrage will surely be done in retaliation for the suffragette lawlessness when they are not fortunate enough to have the police to shelter them.

Chicago Physician Believes He Has Serum Which Will Cure Tuberculosis in Any Stage.

 CHICAGO, March 10.—Belief that Dr. Peter P. Duket, a Chicago physician, has produced a serum which will cure tuberculosis resulted today in the application of Springfield for a charter to establish the Lorimer foundation at St. Rita's Laboratory for Tuberculosis.

**After Thirteen Years.**  
 Speaking of his experiments Dr. Duket says: "My attention was drawn to the treatment of tuberculosis by some experiments conducted along the line by Dr. Osler of Johns Hopkins University and Dr. Koch, the celebrated German physician, and I began at once to devote all my spare time to research work and experiments. After 13 years' work I succeeded in producing a lymph with which I was willing to begin treatments. "This treatment has been tried in altitudes varying from sea level to more than 8000 feet above sea level. Having concluded my experiments in extremely high altitudes in the summer of 1912 and being convinced of the merit of my discovery, I administered it under all sorts of climatic conditions. I came to Chicago believing it offered me the largest possible field for usefulness."

Patients Inoculated on Sunday Are Improving—Doctor Left New York for Montreal and Will Give Demonstrations in Toronto This Week and Will Treat One Hundred Patients at Ottawa.


### VIADUCT WORK SOON TO START

Six Tracks Will Be Built in Toronto by Three Railways—Freight Stations.

OTTAWA, March 10.—(Special.)—Provided the steel is procurable, construction of the railway viaduct on the waterfront at Toronto will be commenced this spring. The heads of the C. P. R. and G. T. R. have submitted in writing their proposals to the railway commission, and in these proposals have committed their companies to the construction of a six-track viaduct, and on the same terms as for the four-track viaduct.

That means that the city's share of the expense for the six-track viaduct will be no more than it would have been for the four-track viaduct. The division of expense is to be arranged at a conference of the engineers. There is every indication that the C. N. R. will have equal share with the other two roads in the construction and use of the viaduct.

### TORONTO'S MILK IS THE PUREST

Supply Probably is Best on the Continent, Says Dr. Hastings.

### STAMPING OUT SLUMS

Determined Crusade is Being Conducted by Medical Health Department.

"Toronto has probably the purest milk supply on the continent," was Dr. Hastings' opinion expressed before a large gathering at Walmer Road Baptist Church last night. George Poole, president of the Young People's Society, was chairman. Dr. Hastings' address gave a comprehensive explanation of the method by which the health department is stamping out slums. He stated that the expenditure was much larger than when he took office, but the citizens now benefited to the extent of nearly a quarter of a million dollars a year on the milk supply alone. Four years ago, the city's milk supply contained water deliberately used to dilute the milk, to the extent of one per cent. The quality now averaged half of one per cent. higher than the standard set by the Ontario pure milk law.



The Parkdale Canoe Club are opposing the exchange of properties with the Toronto Harbor Board on the terms as laid down by the commissioners. The club state that to build a house on the lot offered by the board would necessitate an excavated entrance over the tracks, an expensive cement foundation and that the board should bear this extra expense. The harbor board are objecting to this and are threatening to institute expropriation proceedings unless the club come to terms.



# Semi-Panic in Stock Markets--C. P. R. Down Seven Points

## ACUTE DEPRESSION IN STOCK MARKETS

Canadian Issues Break to New Low Records for Present Year.

## BEAR RAID ON C. P. R.

Heavy Slump in Brazilian in Toronto Exchange--Stocks Careening Downhill.

The acute depression in financial circles, engendered by the gathering clouds on the international monetary horizon, gave the stock markets a rather bad time of it yesterday.

The Toronto market held up fairly well during the morning, but the continued slump in Wall Street inspired heavier liquidation when the brokers met after the noon adjournment, and when support was withdrawn from Brazilian, prices went down to the downhill at a rapid pace.

The drop in Brazilian was the leading feature in the Toronto Exchange. The stock held within a narrow range during the morning, with the price close of 95 1/2. It was plainly apparent that the big interests were supporting the security, and when this support was withdrawn, as it was early in the afternoon, the quotation dropped with a thud.

When Brazilian began sliding downward the general favorites quickly followed suit. Toronto falls lost 1-4 points at 136, its lowest since last May. Twin City was off at 105, and General Electric dropped precipitately to 110, a 4-point recession, and its lowest since June, 1912.

## BIG GERMAN BANK HAD A GOOD YEAR

Profits of Deutsche Bank Increased a Million Dollars--Gain in Deposits.

BERLIN, March 10.—Continued increase in the business transacted by the Deutsche Bank in the year 1912, which was reported for the year 1912, which shows a turnover of \$31,400,000, compared with \$30,000,000 of the previous year, and net profits of \$9,000,000, an increase of \$1,000,000 over similar profits for the year 1911.

## WORLD-WIDE CRISIS IN MONEY SITUATION

New York banks for some time have been avoiding time loans and any available funds have been used in the call market; this has kept the rate there, thus far, low.

## TWIN CITY EARNINGS.

Further weakening in C.P.R. in New York resulted in a weak opening in the afternoon, and new low levels were touched by most of the active stocks.

## MONEY TIGHTNESS BREEDS PESSIMISM

New York Market Again Overshadowed by Disturbing Conditions Abroad.

## BIG DROP IN C. P. R.

Slump of More Than Seven Points--Specialties Suffered Severely.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Pronounced weakness again developed in the stock market today and new low levels were reached by many of the prominent issues. Developments of the day seemed to emphasize the influence on this market of strained financial situation abroad.

From Berlin it was reported that as high as 10 per cent. was being bid for loans over the end of the month. Liquidation by Berlin in London and in this market, on direct orders was an unsettling factor.

Prices of Americans were depressed sharply in London before the opening here and this market followed the lead thus given, with especial weakness in Canadian Pacific and Union Pacific. The drop brought out some liquidation, which steadied the market and quotations were borne down to a still lower level.

The local money market reflected the effect of the loss of gold, with the probability of further large exports this week. Both time and call funds were firmer. Foreign exchange held strong. It was pointed out that not all of last week's exports of gold were reflected in the last bank statement together with other amounts as may be sent abroad is likely to make the showing this week a poor one.

## ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SWASTIKA

Company Had Very Small Credit Balance--Old Board of Directors Elected.

## SMALLER GAIN IN RAILWAY EARNINGS

Record of January Not Maintained Either in Canada or Across the Border.

Gross earnings of the Canadian railroads are showing a declining tendency compared with the record of a month and two months ago, but still evidencing very satisfactory gains over the corresponding period of last year.

The United States roads for February report a gain of 4 per cent. over last year, compared with an increase of 12.9 per cent. in January. The difference is accounted for by weather interference as reported by the weather conditions, January, 1912, evidencing a very poor record for the railways, owing to the heavy snowfalls.

## IRREGULARITY IN MINING MARKETS

Acute Depression in Financial Circles Not Without its Effect on Sentiment.

## SOME ADVANCES SHOWN

But General Trend Seems Easier--Several Sharp Declines Are Recorded.

The mining market showed a good deal of irregularity, several issues evidencing a disposition to make for higher levels, while many others sought for development and the influence of acute depression in financial circles, as exemplified in the severe declines in the big stock exchanges.

The strong advance of the Porcupine list were Swastika, Dome Extension, Foley-O'Brien and Pearl Lake, and in the Cobalt, Peterson Lake and Timiskaming. Swastika was the leading feature, with the shares up nearly a point to 16, a new high for the month.

The annual meeting was held during the day, and the buying was no doubt founded on expectations of a favorable report. Dome Extension held firm at 14 1/2 and Foley-O'Brien moved up to 30, its highest level since October last. Pearl Lake was bid up to \$1 during the morning, but the quotation sagged back again, and the close was steady with last week's final figures. Timiskaming gained 2 1/2 points at 41 on the dividend announcement, but worked back to 39 1/2 later on in the day, leaving a net gain of just a point. Peterson Lake sold at 23 3/4, an advance of two points, and held its improvement. The demand was founded on the report of a deal for the sale of the mine to an English syndicate. Trethewey moved up to 45.

## GOOD NEWS SOUND ON THE PEARL LAKE

PORCUPINE, March 10.—The directors of the Pearl Lake Gold Mines, who are in camp on an inspection trip to the mine, express themselves as very highly pleased with the showing of the big vein at the 600 foot level. They will not leave here until tomorrow and will give out the report of the assays on the vein on Wednesday. It is understood that the lead shows phenomenal values at the bottom depth of the mine, and that the report will be one of the most favorable documents bearing out the justification of Porcupine.

## SWASTIKA MILL STARTED.

SWASTIKA, March 10.—The mill at the Swastika mine, with a capacity of 25 tons, will first drop stamps today, and the mill will be in full operation by Wednesday.
