MINUTES
OF THE
BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE
OF
THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN PORT HOPE, FROM JUNE 4TH TO JUNE 9TH, 1855.

The SECOND SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened in Port Hope, in the Brown Street Methodist Church, on Thursday, June 4th, 1855, at 10 a.m.

The Rev. JAMES CURTS, President of Conference, took the chair, and directed the devotional exercises.

The 531st hymn was sung. The Rev. Dr. BREDIN, Secretary of Conference, read the 52nd chapter of Isaiah and 2nd chapter of the Second Epistle of St. Paul to Timothy. Revs. JOHN S. CLARKE and Dr. BADGLEY led in prayer.

The Secretary read the following official statement of the Transfers to and from this Conference :—

- Rev. Thomas Manning, B.A., to Toronto Conference.
- “ Thomas Woolsey, to Toronto Conference.
- “ Wm. Williams, to this from Niagara Conference.
- “ D. S. Houck, Rev. W. Sanderson, and Rev. R. Robinson from Manitoba and Montreal Conferences to this Conference.

The Secretary called the roll of Conference, after which the President asked the Conference to proceed with the election of its officers, whereupon—

The Rev. JOHN BREDIN, D.D., was declared duly elected as President.

The Rev. ISAAC TOVELL was declared duly elected Secretary.

The Secretary nominated W. F. HALL, Esq., Rev. JOSEPH YOUNG and Rev. FOSTER McAMMOND, B.A., as Assistants, the Conference confirming the nominations.

The Rev. W. H. EMSLEY was re-appointed Journal Secretary.

Resolutions of thanks were cordially passed and tendered to the ex-President and ex-Secretary for their valuable services during the year, to which suitable replies were made.

On motion it was *Resolved*,—That we re-affirm the resolution of last year for the appointment of a Nominating Committee, viz., that one minister and one layman be appointed from each District by the members present from the respective Districts.

1.—REV. ISAAC WELDON,

Eldest son of Levi Weldon, Esq., of Mariposa, County of Victoria, was born on the 23rd of August, 1835, and died in the parsonage, Colborne, on the 4th of April last, in the fiftieth year of his age.

Brother Weldon was of good U. E. stock, and was thoroughly identified with the interests of his native Canada. He received a fair education, and afterwards spent a brief period of his early manhood in the honourable profession of school teaching.

It was in the year 1855, at a revival meeting conducted by the Rev. G. J. Dingman, in the Nubbs' school-house, in the neighbourhood of the family residence, that brother Weldon was savingly converted to God. The repentance that led him a seeking suppliant to a throne of grace was deep and unfeigned, and the evidence of his acceptance with God abode with him till life's latest hour. From that memorable hour the one desire of his heart was to lead sinners to the Saviour. In the year 1861, at the call of the Church and under the constraining convictions of the Holy Spirit, Brother Weldon was enrolled among the candidates for the ministry, and for nearly twenty-four years he endeavoured to discharge the duties of his high vocation with fidelity and affection and success. His ministerial life was spent on three districts, and on every circuit his labours were owned of God with success. On some fields of labour extensive revivals of religion, with large accessions of converts to the Church of Christ, attested his fidelity to the Master and the Master's approval of His servant's work.

Some two months after his return to Colborne from the Conference of 1884, the heavy hand of sickness laid him aside from his loved work. Jaundice followed by dropsy, inducing cognate diseases, rapidly wasted the tissues of a strong and vigorous constitution until there was little left of the robust and active man. During nearly eight months our dear brother bore his afflictions with Christian patience and submission. He cherished the hope—it was hope against hope—almost to the last that the Lord would restore him to health and active service. He never wavered in his confidence in the Saviour. His testimony to God's abiding presence and love was freely borne all the way to the end. In reply to the question from his District Superintendent, shortly before he passed away: "Can you resign your all into the hand of your Heavenly Father?" he said, "Yes; I am enabled to give myself, my beloved partner, and our four dear children, and my ministerial work all up," adding, "God will take care of me and mine." At the close of funeral services, held in the church where he spent the closing years of his ministry, and where his labours had been so largely successful, his remains were borne to Lindsay for interment.

Brother Weldon was a good man, highly honourable towards his brethren, and greatly beloved by them. He was faithful to the trust committed to him, deliberate and kind in his administration of Methodist discipline, and a clear and fearless preacher of the gospel of the grace of God.

2.—REV. JOHN W. BUTCHER

Was born in St. James, Suffolk, England, in the year 1821, and died at Peterboro', Ont., on the 18th of November, 1884, aged 63 years. When but a boy he came to Prince Edward Island and settled in Charlottetown. He was converted to God in his seventeenth year, in a revival held by the Rev. Mr. Knight, pastor of the old Wesleyan church in that city. His work for Christ now began, and God blessed his labours abundantly. He assisted the late Rev. F. Metherall (the first Bible Christian missionary sent to Prince Edward Island) in special services which resulted in the conversion of hundreds of souls. At the close of these meetings, Bro. Butcher felt that his life work was the Christian ministry, and after much prayer to God for guidance, he offered himself to the Bible Christian Conference in 1843. He was accepted by the Conference, and received his first appointment to the Union Station. For twenty-four years he served the Church of his choice effectively and acceptably in the Prince Edward Island mission work. During these years Bro. Butcher laboured with untiring zeal, and suffered many privations and hardships for his Master; and yet, sustained by Divine grace and comforted by the hope of future reward, he was always happy in his work. In the spring of 1867 he received his first appointment in Canadian work on the Peterboro' station. His successive appointments were Peterboro', Mitchell, Ingersoll, Exeter and Crediton. On all these circuits his cheerful sympathies and genial disposition made him many warm friends. His great earnestness in preaching the Word, his faithful and affectionate pastoral visitation, his complete consecration to God and devotion to all that concerned the well-being of the Church will cause his name to be long remembered. But the most precious and endearing monument to his memory here, and his greatest joy and glory in heaven, will be found in the hundreds of souls led to God under his ministry. On the platform or in the pulpit his fine form, his pleasant face lit up with a heaven-kindled smile, and his voice mellow with manifest goodness and natural pathos made him a general favourite. About three years ago he sought and obtained from the Conference a superannuated relation, and settled in Peterboro'. His last illness was of only two weeks' duration. He gently breathed his life away on Nov. 18th, and passed triumphantly to his reward. "The memory of the just is blessed."

REPORTS, ADDRESSES, ETC.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN
THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE.

BELOVED BRETHREN,—We, your pastors and co-labourers in Conference assembled, present you our accustomed annual greeting in the name of the Lord.

We unite with you in fervent thanksgiving to God in the retrospect of the blessings of the year just closed, and in the joyous hopes for the future that animate our hearts.

The past year is forever memorable as the first of the corporate existence of our united Methodism. The consolidation of the four Methodist Churches in this country into a true and permanent union was an undertaking which might well be termed an ecclesiastical revolution—at once grand, difficult, and of furthest reaching consequences. That an enterprise embracing such vast and various and complicated interests could be inaugurated without a good deal of difficulty was not to be expected. That it has succeeded so far, with so little friction and so much of the spirit of forbearance and true brotherly kindness, is a fact for which we render to God our profound gratitude. May we continue to cultivate and manifest more and more of this blessed mind that was in Christ. Just here let us remind each other that if our union is to be in the highest sense successful, and if our Church is to accomplish the splendid purposes for which we are now being equipped, we must maintain the highest standard of Christian holiness. "Holiness unto the Lord" must be inscribed on all our banners. May its mighty energy consecrate all our individual hearts.

We devoutly return thanks to God that the baptism of the Holy Spirit has been descending in copious measure during the past year. God has set the seal of His approbation on our union in vouchsafing many gracious revivals of religion, in which multitudes have been led to Christ. Our net increase of members within the bounds of this Conference is over 2,900. We are deeply grateful to

God; let us pray and labour for much greater things during the present year.

We bespeak for all the ministers appointed by this Conference to labour among you that cordial sympathy and co-operation which has ever characterized the Methodist people in days gone by. During the year several of our honoured and beloved brethren in the ministry have been removed by the hand of death. The Rev. Dr. Rice, our Senior General Superintendent, has fittingly closed in Christian triumph a long and noble career in the work of God. The memory also of Revs. Isaac Weldon and J. W. Butcher will be cherished by multitudes who were led to salvation through their zealous and faithful labours.

With you, we mourn the sad events that have been occurring in the North-West. The rebellion, wickedly incited and stubbornly persisted in, has been met by an outburst of patriotism and self-sacrifice which can never be forgotten. We trust that the courage, endurance, and devotion to duty, so signally exhibited by our volunteers, may never again require to be called into exercise in the suppression of any similar insurrection.

We trust in God that lasting peace may speedily be established in that distracted portion of our country; while to those whose beloved friends have fallen in the struggle, we extend our tenderest sympathies, and offer up our most fervent prayers on their behalf.

We cannot but feel the highest satisfaction in the fact that in no single instance have any of the Indians under the care of our Church taken any part in aiding this rebellion—a strong additional proof of the reality and power of our missionary labours among these people, and a most convincing argument for the great and immediate extension of our missionary work among them.

While the rebellion has had the effect of temporarily disorganizing our work in the North-West, we rejoice that elsewhere throughout the vast missionary field the most cheering evidences of prosperity have been witnessed.

The great educational interests and work of our Church claim now, as never before, the most profound attention and the most judicious management. We trust that such a policy will be pursued as will be at once true to our Methodist history in the past, and the best for the great future of our Church and of our country.

We heartily rejoice in the steady growth of the Temperance and Prohibition sentiment of this country. Elsewhere will be found the energetic and unanimous utterances of our Conference on the recent attempts to emasculate the Canada Temperance Act, and our fixed resolution never to falter until the liquor traffic is fully and finally prohibited throughout the land.

We would most earnestly call the attention of our people once more to the sacred duty and urgent necessity of increased liberality in sustaining the various works of the Church. We firmly believe that the best way of securing this is by the universal adoption of the scriptural injunction of systematic and proportionate giving. We commend the subject to the most serious and prayerful consideration of our people.

We would also again express our commendation of the increasingly excellent literature of the Church, which for cheapness, first-class mechanical execution, high literary, moral and religious worth is, we think, unsurpassed on this continent.

And now, beloved, we beseech you to be instant in the discharge of all Christian duties. You who are parents, see to it that nothing remains undone on your part to secure the salvation of your children. Let the class and prayer meetings be deeply loved and faithfully attended. Guard with holy jealousy the sacred observance of the Lord's Day.

Above all, let the life of God be maintained in your own soul. Live very near to God, and labour hard to present to the world in your own persons the highest and noblest examples of Christian character and achievement. And unto Him who is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before His presence with exceeding joy, be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Baker, M.A., F. H. Wallace, B.D., Joseph Young, John Leuroyd, J. J. Leach, J. B. Clarkson, M.A., John Bredin, D.D., re-elected Chairman, and Isaac Tovell, re-elected Secretary.

It was resolved that the Examiners shall forward their questions, in manuscript, to the Secretary not later than the 1st of April. The Secretary shall superintend the printing and distribution of the questions.

It was resolved that April 29th, 1886, at Lindsay, be the date and place when the Examiners shall meet the candidates and probationers for examination in their respective subjects of study, and that a public meeting be held at the close of the second day, to be addressed by Revs. Dr. Bredin and Joseph Young.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee on the State of the Work beg to report as follows:—

The State of the Work, in respect of its purely spiritual aspect, is such as to call forth hearty thanksgivings to Almighty God for the great gift of His Spirit during the past year, in connection with the regular and the special religious services of the Church, especially in connection with the latter. "The promise of the Father" has been fulfilled to us; and we have been made to feel again the force of the truth, "It is not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit." And the Committee desire to remind the Conference of the fact, that the outpouring of the Spirit has been not a local gift, but a gift to the Conference—almost every circuit sharing in this supreme and indispensable blessing of the Most High. As a result, many hundreds have been added to the membership of the Church.

In connection with this great fact, it must be remembered how much we needed this cementing influence of grace to bind into a compact body our but recently organically united Methodism: and we gratefully accept the blessing of God upon our labours as a completing evidence that in consummating Union we but fulfilled His will.

The general testimony concerning the Union, so far as it could be gathered by your Committee, is, that, with very few exceptions, it has worked well, and thereby we have been taught that many of our fears were baseless.

The work of grace, over which we rejoice, has had its own effect upon all the interests of the Church.

While we think it is true that there is a growing respect for the Lord's Day among our people, we are satisfied that much remains to be done in the direction of cultivating a still more loyal feeling in regard to the proper observance of this great Christian holy day.

Your Committee were unanimous in recognizing the fact that there has been of late an increase of temperance feeling and sentiment and labours, amounting to a revival, throughout all the region covered by the Conference, and that this rising tide gives promise of continuing its flow until the abomination of the liquor trade be for ever hidden from our view.

Sabbath School statistics continue to show progress all along the line.

Your Committee think that our congregations generally throughout the Conference are ripe for evangelistic work, and anticipate great good to follow the organization of a Conference Evangelistic Society.

The Committee recommend very earnestly that this subject of the State of the Work should have a more definite and impressive recognition in the various courts of the Church, where now, unhappily, the question of finance and administration crowd out the still more important question of the State of the Work, and would respectfully urge the Conference to show the lower courts a good example in this respect.

In considering the State of the Work, the conclusion of the whole matter with your Committee is, that never did a Conference enter upon its career with brighter promises than the Bay of Quinte Conference.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are gratified to be able to report that the educational schemes of our Church have met, during the past year, with increased sympathy from our people. In this Conference we enjoy having within its bounds our Methodist University, and also Albert College, with its adjunct, Alexandria College. These institutions of higher education are accomplishing a noble work in this country, under Christian guardianship; and while other Churches grow enthusiastic over the prosperity of their educational institutions, we call upon our Methodist people to appreciate the unexcelled efficiency and moral safety of our own University and Colleges.

Victoria University, at the close of the past college year, sent out, from all departments, 103 graduates. She has made for herself a noble history, and we anticipate her future career with hopeful pride. In Albert College our people possess a most efficient institution, where young men and women are thoroughly prepared for entering upon the higher course of study, and for successfully filling positions in commercial, professional and social life, and we heartily commend it to the patronage of our people.

We would again express our hearty sympathy with the work of the Bursar of Albert College, Rev. Amos Campbell, in his effort, as agent of that institution, to complete the endowment, and successfully lay before our people the claims and advantages of the College.

In the great increase in the membership of the Methodist Church during the past year, in the increased contribution to the Missionary Society, and in the delightful harmony that has prevailed, we gratefully recognize the marks of Divine approval of Methodist Union; and while other departments of Church work have thus advanced, our Educational Fund has received, in this Con-

ference, a contribution twenty per cent. in advance of that given last year by all the bodies now united. Let us determine to raise for this fund in the Bay of Quinte Conference, this year, at least \$2,000.

We recommend Conference to direct the attention of all the ministers to the requirements of the Discipline, that the claims of this essential department of our Church work may be brought before each congregation on every Circuit; and that collections and subscriptions may be solicited somewhat early in the Conference year.

We think it would be well for each District to enlist the active sympathy of all university men, members, and adherents of the Church, within its bounds, with our educational work. We beg to re-nominate, as representatives of this Conference on the Board of Albert College, Revs. John Learoyd and F. B. Stratton.

As the representative on the Board of Alma College, we nominate Rev. E. N. Baker, M.A.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Your Committee on Memorials having had under consideration the memorial of Campbellford Official Meeting, praying for a reversal of the action of the Conference Special Committee, in placing the Campbellford late Bible Christian parsonage in connection with Seymour East Circuit, beg to submit:—1st. That, as the parsonage was chiefly paid for by the people contained in the said Seymour East Circuit—of which Campbellford was at that time only a very weak appointment, contributing about \$40 of the \$1,400, the cost of said parsonage—it does not appear that any wrong was done to Campbellford Methodist Church by the Special Committee in ordering that the parsonage should be retained for the use of the people by whom it was erected, and which, by the arrangement of last year, was left a very weak charge, and without any other

parsonage than the building in dispute, in which the present occupant resided as pastor of the same Circuit before the Union, Campbellford being its geographical centre. 2nd. The legal opinion of Mr. J. J. McLaren, laid before your Committee, is evidently based upon the assumption that the only claim upon the Bible Christian connexional property sold was such amounts as were comprised in certain mortgages upon said properties; whereas, by reference to the General Conference Journal, page 83, and sub-section 4 on page 13 of the Discipline, it is evident that the Bible Christian Treasurers still in office have claims absolute upon proceeds of all Bible Christian connexional property sold, so long as any of the missionary debt remains unpaid—that is, after extinction of all other debts on such property.

In view of the foregoing, your Committee respectfully submit that the decision of the Special Conference Committee, making the said parsonage part of the Trust Estate of the East Seymour Circuit, be confirmed.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee met at the call of the Convener, and appointed Rev. J. S. Clarke Chairman, and Rev. A. Browning Secretary. The subject of the amendments to the Canada Temperance Act by the Senate of this Dominion was brought before the meeting, and after a most careful and exhaustive discussion of the whole matter, it was decided to submit the following resolution to this Conference, and that if the said resolution be passed by this body, that the Secretary of the Conference be requested to send a copy of the same to each member of the Dominion Parliament:

Moved by Rev. A. Browning, seconded by Dr. Ford, of Norwood, and *Resolved*,—That we, the members, lay and clerical, of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church, having learned with alarm and indignation of the action of the Senate of Canada in so annulling the Canada Temperance Act as to exempt from its operations the sale of ale, porter, lager beer, cider, and light wines, containing not more than twelve per cent. of alcohol—which amendments are now awaiting the action of the House of Commons—desire to express our opinion that such action is in direct violation of the solemn compact entered into by the Senate with the people of Canada, when that honourable body passed the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, by which they undertook that any county or city which chose to adopt its provisions should be undisturbed in the possession of them for at least three years; and is such a total disregard and defiance of the popular will—as expressed in the prayer of over 100,000 petitioners, and the vote of seventy-five constituencies, giving a majority of 46,000 in an aggregate vote of 200,000—as merits our strongest and most emphatic condemnation. That the members of this Conference appeal with confidence to the representatives of the people in the House of Commons to withhold their sanction from this unrighteous attempt to defraud the people of their rights by utterly destroying the usefulness of the Act in question; and pledge themselves, in every legitimate way, to oppose the re-election of every representative who by his vote or influence seeks to counteract the will of the majority and perpetuate the injustice of the liquor traffic.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Your Committee beg to report, that in consequence of the returns of last year being omitted in the Minutes, we have not sufficient data to note any comparative increase, or otherwise. Our present returns, however, contain many important and interesting features, principally among which we mention,—Number of schools, 328, supplied with a staff of 2659 teachers, who are instructing 20,732 scholars, 3493 of whom are meeting in class: 1368 of these are reported to have been converted during the present year, a very gratifying proportion, surely, to the whole number of the reported increase of members to the Conference. About one sixth only of the number in our Sabbath-schools are studying the Catechism, which your Committee think is not a fair proportion, and would therefore recommend its more general use. Over 6000 of our scholars are reported pledged to total abstinence; while this is a hopeful sign, yet we believe the organization of Bands of Hope in connection with our schools would greatly augment the number. Our libraries furnish Sabbath-school literature in volumes to the number of 26,347. Our own denominational periodicals are patronized, in the aggregate, to the number of about 21,000, while a little over 3,000 are publications from other sources. We recommend the more general use of our own periodicals. The general Missionary interest has been aided by our schools to the amount of \$1,400 for the present year; the amount for home school purposes, upwards

of \$3,500. The contributions to the Sabbath-school Aid and Extension Fund, though becoming more general, yet are not sufficiently large, in most instances, to be considered liberal. We note with pleasure, however, the sum of \$183.33 on this behalf. Your Committee recommend that the Superintendents of Circuits and Missions take up or provide for a collection in each school, in the month of August, or as early in the year as possible, in aid of this Fund. A pretty general uniformity is observed in the use of the International Lessons. Teachers' meetings for the study of the weekly lesson are reported to be only 32. We observe here room for improvement. From necessity, or some other cause, only a little more than one half of our schools are reported to be kept open during the year. This should be remedied to the greatest possible extent.

We express regret that full returns from two or three important Circuits are necessarily omitted in the Report, through the failure of those authorized to forward such. Had they been received, we doubtless could have presented a more favourable showing. On the whole, this department of our work gives much promise and hope, and will, we believe, if diligently and earnestly cultivated, yield results in an abundant harvest of souls being gathered into the Church, and finally into the Kingdom of Heaven.

Your Committee recommend the Conference to appoint Rev. W. Jolliffe as Secretary-Treasurer of the Annual Conference Sabbath School Committee for the ensuing year.

EXTRACTS.

ADDRESS BY REVS. DR. CARMAN AND DR. WILLIAMS, GENERAL SUPERINTENDENTS.

1. The Trust Relief Fund calls upon us for a prompt and generous effort in behalf of distressed brethren, and for a noble work of Christian unity, connexional loyalty, and Methodist unification. A presentation of this important business to the brethren at the Conference will enable them to take this demand into this year's work, and thus unite all the Circuits in one movement for the deliverance of brethren who, without such aid from abroad, must be crushed in fortune and spirits, and whose distress, unrelieved, will lead many to distrust our ecclesiastical enterprises and pledges.

3. We think it would be well to call the earnest attention of all the brethren to the following requirements in the management of our trusts:

(a) The Acts of Incorporation of the Methodist Church provide that the non-registration of a deed or conveyance executed before the passing of the Acts, shall not render the same void, but likewise provide that registration shall be made in such cases within twelve months of the passing of the Acts, so that while there is indemnity for past failures of registration, unregistered properties must henceforth stand in greater jeopardy.

(b) It is not required to register names of Trustees, or changes in Trust Boards, but it is required to keep full and exact record in Trustees' books.

(c) The Annual Conferences of 1885 will necessarily take steps preparatory to the Annual Conferences of 1886, to enable those bodies to meet the requirements of Discipline, page 58, paragraph 107, and page 140, paragraph 294, respecting statements, lists, descriptions, etc., of membership, property, institutions, etc., as called for from the several Annual Conferences by the General Conference.

 BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE EVANGELISTIC SOCIETY.

On motion it was *Resolved*,—That this Conference concur in the recommendation of the Stationing Committee to form an Evangelistic Society under the auspices of the Bay of Quinte Conference, and that the following be adopted as the Constitution of said Society:

CONSTITUTION.

1. The name of the Society shall be called, "The Bay of Quinte Conference Evangelistic Society."
2. The object shall be to promote revival work within the bounds of the Conference by means of the employment of evangelistic agencies—ministerial or lay—who shall be members of the Methodist Church.
3. Any minister or layman of our Church may become a member of the Society by agreeing to become responsible for an assessment not exceeding the sum of five dollars per annum.
4. The officers shall consist of a President and Secretary-Treasurer, to be elected by the members of the Association at the Annual Conference.

5. There shall be an Executive Committee, five in number, elected at the annual meeting, two of whom shall be officers of the Society.

6. It shall be required of the Agents employed that all collections and subscriptions (the regular Sabbath collections excepted) taken up in connection with the services shall be forwarded to the Secretary-Treasurer.

7. The Agents shall act invariably under the direction of the Executive Committee; they shall labour only on those Circuits that request their services, and no Circuit shall have a claim on their aid that is not represented by one or more of its membership in this Association.

8. The members of the Association must number not less than 100 before it shall be deemed advisable to employ an Evangelist.

9. It is recommended also that District Branch Associations be formed to facilitate the work of the General Association.
