ASSEMBLY INCLUDES CLAUSE FAVORING OPEN DIPLOMACY

Weimar, Feb. 11.—The national assembly unanimously adopted a provisional constitution at 10 o'clock this evening, after a three-hour wrangle between the Independent Socialists on one hand, and all the rest of the house on the other, over one single point—the question of secret agreements.

Want to Bind Germany. The independents sought to have this clause altered so that Germany might unequivocally go on record as legally bound to enter into no secret agreements, regardless of what other states may do in the future.

Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau assured Dr. Haase that he would never make a secret treaty or agreement, but Dr. Haase replied that there was no assurance how long he would be in power.

WILL FIGHT PRUSSIANISM IN THE INDUSTRIAL WORLD

Lloyd George Declares That No Section Shall Be Allowed to Hold Up Entire Nation--Plenty of Employment if Confidence Given to Those Who Will Start New Industries.

London, Feb. 11.—The King opened parliament in semi-state today. Much of the usual ceremonial was dispensed with, because the court is in mourning for Prince John.

Both houses of parliament, with peers and state officials assembled in the house of lords, where the King read his address from the throne, but only military uniforms and civilian clothes were worn by the peers and peeresses, without robes.

After the members of the house of commons debated the address, William Adamson, leader of the Labor party, spoke in behalf of that party on the industrial situation, which he declared was almost as menacing and dangerous as war itself.

War Conditions Responsible. If industrial unrest continues, the consequences will be grave to trade and industry, Premier Lloyd George declared.

Special war conditions, the premier thought, had contributed to the unrest. Among these conditions were the strain of four years of war and the fear of unemployment.

Before the war, the premier said, introduced next week dealing with housing, health, the revival of rural life, land settlement for soldiers, and reclamation and afforestation.

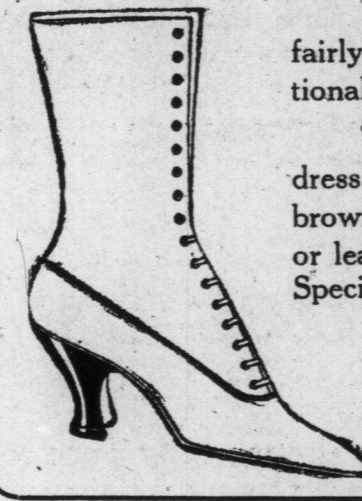

TERRORISM REIGNED IN SOUTH CAYUGA

Canadian-Born Citizens Were Subjected to Gross Indignities.

OFFICIAL ACTION SLOW

Farmers of Haldimand District Satisfied With Dilatory Measures Taken.

That conditions bordering on public terrorism have been permitted to prevail in South Cayuga; that at Fisherville the people had to remove their wives and children to the woods and mount guard over them with arms in their hands; that the local administration of justice is as idle as a painted ship upon a painted ocean, and that threats have been made to the effect that any individual looking for redress will find retaliation instead, are representations made to Attorney-General Lucas in behalf of some prominent residents of Haldimand County, whose names have a cousin-German, or alien, look.

The principles of these complaints are Rev. George L. Gross of South Cayuga and S. A. Beck of the same place. The family of Gross, an Evangelical Methodist minister, and received his theological training in the college of that denomination in Illinois. He has had more than six years' experience in the ministry. Mr. Beck is of the Pennsylvania Dutch stock. Both men took an active part in the war work of the people of Haldimand, and say they had no reason to consider themselves suspect upon any account whatever.

On the night of November 17, Gross, who is married, and has two children, was sleeping in the room of the late and loyal citizen in his house in Cayuga; the room also covering his father, sister-in-law and brother, a schoolboy of twelve, and about half-past two in the morning he awoke to find a mob of about fifty men surrounding the house. Presently the dining-room window was broken, and in a moment the house was in the hands of the attacking mob.

Attorney-General Replies. Hon. Mr. Lucas has taken a long time to consider the responsibility in the premises, and in the meantime a better condition of things has come around. Mr. Lucas has been pressed to state the attitude of his department, and in a letter received by the parties he has taken the following position:

In the cases complained of, the charges can be laid by Mr. Gross or by Mr. Beck or by anyone who knows of the affair on information and belief; or otherwise, by facts and circumstances of the case would appear to justify. The charges may be laid either before the local police magistrate or before any other justice of the peace in the county. If the offence charged is an indictable offence and a prima facie case is made out, there should, of course, be a committal, and then the responsibility for further actions rests upon this department, and sim-ilar complaints are continually dealt with in this way, that is, by the attorney-general or his department instituting proceedings, but by the people aggrieved initiating their own complaint and so have their own proceedings, and so have their own proceedings locally. Not only are there many advantages in this method, but, as I have said, it is the one for which our criminal procedure in this province is designed.

ONTARIO POWER VS. TORONTO POWER CO.

After an adjournment of a week, the action brought by the Ontario Power Co., a subsidiary of the Hydro-Electric, against the Toronto Power Co., to restrain the Toronto concern from cutting off power from the Ontario company, was again resumed in Osgoode Hall yesterday. There is approximately \$150,000 in court awaiting the decision, before it will be paid over to one company or the other.

Later the Toronto Power Co. had reasons to believe that the power supplied to the Hydro for the maintenance of the Union Carbide Co. was being interrupted, and was not being delivered to that company at all. This suspicion led to a visit to Ottawa by Mr. Clarke, and another official of the Toronto Power Co., where they called upon Sir Harry, in the early part of November, and the telegram followed soon after.

MORE ARTICLES PLACED ON LIST FOR EXPORT

The British trade commissioners in Canada, G. T. Milne at Montreal and E. W. P. Pidd at Toronto, have received a cablegram from the department of overseas trade (development and intelligence) stating that the following headings have been removed from the list of articles prohibited from exportation from the United Kingdom, namely: Cable lead (sheathed), carbon cylinders for storing gases, fish, canned, except salmon, lead compound except white lead, linen rags and waste, ramie fibre, salt, varnishes, paint, except gold paint; polishes containing wax, canvas, old and cuttings; cotton rags, except to grass, fishing gear, natural hemp waste, jute wrappers and waste, mahogany and hardwoods, piping for stoves, metal strings and waste, tents, tin plates, anchors, arrowroot, banana meal, baramites, biscuits, cables, chain, cakes, caramel, castings, lard, celluloid, ordinary or non-inflammatory; cereal foods, corn flour, dextrine, farina, gas meters, ginger, ox horns, meat extract, potato flour, saccharine, saffron, sponges, spices, starch, tapioca, vegetables, preserved; wine, zinc.

MUST WEAR PATCH.

A small red distinguishing patch, two inches long and three-quarters of an inch wide, is to be worn by all warrant officers and men on duty in Canada, and not to be removed until he receives his discharge. This order was issued at headquarters yesterday.

AMILLIUS JARVIS CO. BUY HYDRO BONDS

Seventeen Firms Tender Showing Faith in Utilities.

Hydro-Electric 5 1/2 per cent. serial bonds, worth \$650,000, were disposed of to Amillius Jarvis & Co. yesterday by tender, at 100.85. These bonds run from one to twenty years, the money being required to pay for expenditures incurred on account of Hydro extensions connected with multiplex work. There were seventeen tenders altogether. Interest at the rate of 5.402 per cent. will be paid by the city on these bonds. One million dollars' worth of six-year 6 1/2 bonds were also bought by the same firm, yesterday from the City of Edmonton. These bonds bear 5 per cent. interest.

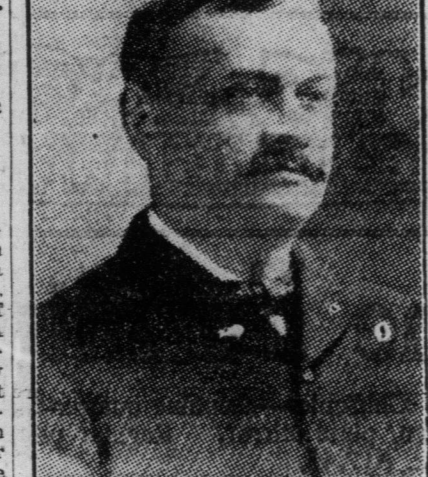
