COMMON LEADERS EULOGIZE THE LATE MEMBER.

The Minister of Justice introduces a Bill to prevent continuous race meetings and to prohibit the "Manufacture" of immoral literature in this country—No More Art Lectures.

Ottawa, April 16.—(Special)—By a strange coincidence a glint of sunshine shot over the beautiful wreath lying on the desk of the late Col. Denison in the Commons chamber when the leader of the House rose to say a few words with reference to the deceased.

The speeches delivered by Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. Laurier, Mr. Cochrane and Mr. Spence bearing tribute to the many excellent qualities of the late member for West Toronto.

Sir Charles on Col. Denison's Death. Sir Charles Tupper said the mournful duty developed upon him of calling attention to the loss which the country had sustained by the death of Col. Denison.

Mr. Laurier's Tribute. Mr. Laurier said Col. Denison did his duty as a member of the House and as a patriot of the Canadian Northwest or in the classical land of the Pharoahs.

Immortal Literature. The Minister of Justice introduced a Bill making it an offence to make or publish any obscene book, pamphlet or paper.

JOHN BULL'S POCKETBOOK
SEEMS TO BE WELL FILLED IN THIS TIME OF NEED.

The British Budget Laid before the Imperial House by the Chancellor of the Exchequer—Sir Mike Says Great Britain Could Raise a Thousand Million Dollars for War Purpose Without Taxation.

London, April 16.—At 4.52 o'clock Sir Michael Hicks Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, rose amid Conservative cheers to deliver the speech introducing the budget.

He began by saying that despite the fact that the expenditure of the last fiscal year had been larger than that of any year since the last great one, the surplus in the Treasury was the largest that had ever been known and the credit of the country was never so high.

The surplus of the year for 1914-15 was just about half what it was a century ago and a larger sum had been applied to the reduction of the national debt than had ever before been applied to that end within a similar period.

Bank Deposits. The deposits in savings banks and permanent accounts in ordinary banks had amounted to an unprecedented point and the production of gold throughout the world had been the largest since the war.

Position of the Working Classes. Continuing, Sir Michael said that the last year's advance in the value of produce stamps supplied the best possible measure of ascertaining that business transactions had never reached so great a volume.

He said, the past year had been a wonderful one. This season's triumph of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, he said, was when receipts and estimates equalled.

The figures of this year were remarkable in that the receipts were higher than the estimates. Everything, he declared, had been a triumph, especially during the latter half of the year.

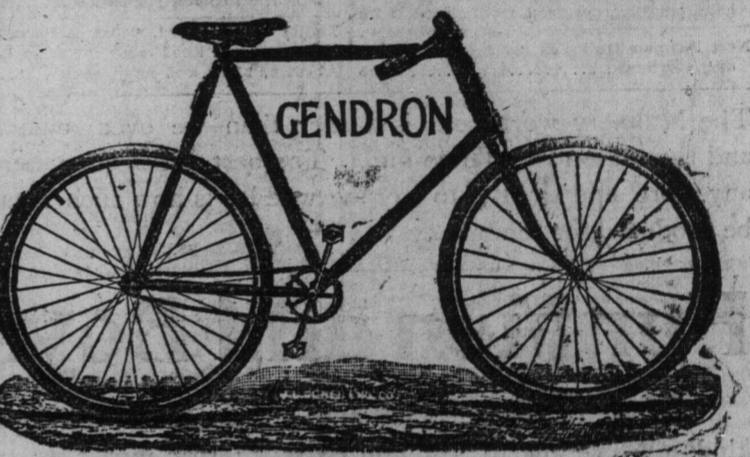
