


ance in all the schools was 23,129, in the kindergarten classes 1917, an in-crease of 245 over 1894. Average monthly registered number was 26,238, an increase of 302 over 1894. There were 499 teachers and 107 kindergartens not including special teachers. Three new kindergarten classes were opened during the year, making 40 in all, which cost during the year for salarles and supplies \$29,763. The cost of free text books amounted to \$4917, and of general supplies \$6208. The total expenditure of the schools for the year amounted to \$414,832. Of this \$329,599 was paid out in salarles of teachers, officers and carctakers. Over \$57,600 was expended in new buildings. The city contributed \$371,518. The Goy-ernment grants amounted to over \$22,-000. Night schools cost \$4703. Fuel for the schools and offices amounted to \$20,584. The schools to which new rooms were added were Dewson, Fern-avenue, Givens, Morse, Palmerston, Queen Victoria and Rosedale. Repairs, alterations and improvements to 'the various schools cost \$17,768. The 20 rented rooms cost \$41496. The board has 49 buildings. The value of the school property is estimated at \$1,536,-808, the buildings being worth \$960,503, school sites \$523,333, and school furni-ture \$52,912.

Largest Astronomical Observatory Will Have Largest Telescope.

Have Largest Telescope: Have Largest Telescope: Chicago, April 15.—A. H. Isham of San Francisco, second vice-president of the World's Proctor Memorial As-sociation, is on his way to Belfast, Ire-land, to confer with Mrs. Proctor, widow of the astronomer, Richard A. Proctor, in the interest of the great project of erecting the largest astro-nomical observatory in the world on the summit of Mount, San Miguel, near San Diego, Cal. The observatory is to be fitted out with the largest telescopes that have ever been constructed and they are two in number. The first is to have a lense five times the size of that of the Lick and four times the size of the Terkes. Ever since the death of the great as-tronomer, Sir Richard A. Proctor, Mrs. Proctor has been desirous of founding a memorial in his honor. In seeking a site for the proposed me-morial, she went to California, and her desire met a response in A. H. Only a fairly, active inquiry con-tinues to rule, and business is confined al-most, exclusively to the meeting of local requirements, there being practically no-thing doing on export account. 

ADVANCE IN WATER FREIGHTS. The Board of Marine Underwriters have decided to advance rates on grain cargoes. The rate to Montreal is ten cents higher all round on all classes. By the new classi-fication the standard rate is 30 cents and vessels of a lower grade will be compelled to make up to shippers all insurance paid on their cargoes in excess of the standard rate. Vesselmen say that the effect of this will be to drive A2 boats out of the grain trade after October 1st, which would, of course, affect grain fre ghts after that date.
