McDougall \$40,000 Short in His Accounts Is Now Under Surveillance of Detectives To Bring Strike to an End

Ontario Cabinet, Following Investigation by Auditors, Suspends Chief of the Succession Duties Department—Disastrous Speculations Given as the Cause of the Deficiency in the Funds.

Alfred McDougall, 44 Charles-street, solicitor of the Treasury Department of the Provincial government and head of the Succession Duties Department, formerly of the law firm of McDougall & Jones, and an ex-alderman of Toronto, aged 65 years, has been suspended by the cabinet pending an investigation of his accounts. He is said to be about \$40,000 short, this could not be verified by the official statement of the situation.

It was like a bolt out of a clear sky when the information to the public was given out. A cabinet council was held Tuesday morning, and the following statement was handed out, it being the limit of the information the Ministers would divulge:

"The accounts of Mr. Alfred McDougall, who has charge of the succession duties collections for the Province, have not proved satisfactory to the auditors who have been looking into them, and Mr. McDougall has been suspended pending a thorough and searching investigation. It is not certain whether there will be a heavy loss to the treasury or not."

Shadowed for Weeks.
The suspended official has been shadowed for some weeks, private detectives being at work around the office without the knowledge of the suspended party. Mr. McDougall first intimated to the cabinet meeting Tuesday morning and informed that he was under suspension. His movements are being closely watched.

It is stated on authority of one usually possessing reliable information that the shortage is in the neighborhood of \$40,000. The deficiency covers a period of several years, it being the usage of the department to allow the officials connected with the collection of succession dues considerable latitude.

Cabinet Holds Two Conferences—Governor Stone Must Ask Aid of Federal Troops.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The coal strike situation was the subject of a conference at the temporary White House today, in which the President, Attorney-General Knox, Secretary Moody, Postmaster-General Payne and Governor Crane of Massachusetts participated. Governor Crane connected with the conference was very reticent, but it is learned that the President is much concerned over the situation, the near approach of winter and the great scarcity of fuel. Just what action can be taken is not known.

The fact that a move has been made in the Massachusetts courts to have receivers appointed for the coal companies was discussed, but the legal view was that this was entirely inadequate and would not be likely to relieve the situation.

Root's New York Visit.
The impression prevails that the reason for the hurried visit of Secretary Root to New York was to discuss the situation with the leading business men of that city with a view to bringing the coal situation to a settlement.

The conference met again about 2 P.M. and are now in session in the President's room. The conference lasted less than an hour. The coal situation was further discussed, but the participants refused to make any statement when they came from the President's room.

Meat Again To-Day.
The conference will be resumed tomorrow, at which time Secretary Root will be present. It is understood that the present visit of Secretary Root to New York was for the purpose of consulting prominent business men on the subject. It has been intimated that the President would send for the managers of the coal properties, but this will not be done until after the conference tomorrow, and perhaps not then.

Son Planned to Get Rid of His Own Mother Strange Story by Insurance Agent J. Rose

Made a Statement to Crown Attorney Curry in the Presence of Col. Peck, Which he Refused to Sign, That a Collingwood Man Gave Him Money to Aid in the Contemplated Matricide.

The police authorities are investigating a statement filed with them accusing a citizen of Collingwood of having conspired to accomplish his mother's death. The motive for the proposed matricide was the possession of the insurance on the woman's life. The charge is made by John Rose, a Toronto insurance solicitor, who declares that he played detective, received an offer from the son of a part of the money if he would get rid of the woman, and was actually paid \$20 with which to take the woman out to the States and purchase poison.

In fact, Mr. Rose asserts that the conspiracy progressed to the point where he brought the intended victim to Toronto, while the unnatural son supposed he had been taken across the sea to be slain. He says that after listening to the plans of the would-be murderer for a month he concluded the time had come to expose the miserable scheme to the police.

Who Rose Is.
John Rose resides at 411 Yonge-street with his family. He is sixty years old and stands well among the insurance men of Toronto. Until Saturday Rose was employed as a traveling solicitor for the Continental Life Insurance Company. He was dismissed by George B. Woods, the manager of the company, as a result of the extraordinary circumstances revealed by an investigation of the case.

Manager Woods' attention was called to the affair by another agent of the Continental—John Waring of Thornbury, Saturday. Rose was then at Collingwood. He wired him to come in at once. Saturday evening the agent reached Toronto, and was told what had been reported about the case. Mr. Woods took exception to that part of the report that connected Rose with a demand on the would-be matricide that the efforts of the man who wished to kill his mother be kept secret.

Rose promptly admitted having received \$20 from the man with the understanding that it was to be used in furtherance of the scheme. He declared that he intended merely to ascertain just how far the son would go, and then expose him. He developed, however, and explained that the police of Collingwood all about the affair, and had had a conference with a lawyer who advised him not to discuss the case with anyone. The statement, however, was immediately sent to the Attorney-General, and the Solicitor-General was furnished a copy. Neither Mr. Curry nor the Attorney-General's deputy would discuss the affair, but the police no arrests had been made and premature publication might frustrate the ends of justice. It is evident that Rose is being carefully investigated by the authorities before action is taken, because of the amazing features of the alleged conspiracy.

CRUSHED TO DEATH.
Weyburn, N.W.T., Sept. 30.—While Walter Todd, aged 74, was engaged in hauling wheat, one of the horses wheeling, knocking him down, and he was crushed to death, causing instant death.

SUICIDE NEAR MONTREAL.
Montreal, Sept. 30.—Mrs. Joseph Audette, La Prairie, shot and killed herself this afternoon at her home with her husband's revolver. BINDING TIE WITH BRITAIN.
Archbishop of Canterbury Says U.S. and England are One Blood.
London, Sept. 30.—The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Temple, yesterday unveiled in the parish church of Cranbrook, Kent, a tablet and three windows erected by Mr. R. H. Eddy of Boston, Mass., to the memory of the Rev. W. Eddy, who was vicar of the parish from 1880 to 1900, and who was killed in the trenches of the Boer war. The tablet is inscribed with the words: "To Mr. C. H. Fiske, one of the Eddy trustees, who came from the United States especially to attend the ceremony of the unveiling, the Archbishop of Canterbury said: 'Among all the ties binding England to America, such a tie as this emphasizes the feeling that we are all of one blood, and that both peoples are constant of truths of the glorious Gospel.'"

BEER TRUST PAINTED SAUSAGES.
St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 30.—During the beef trust inquiry to-day the fact was developed that members of the packers' trust resorted to paint to make sausages look like beef. Instead of smoking the meat, it was dipped in a chemical solution and thus the blood red appearance was preserved.

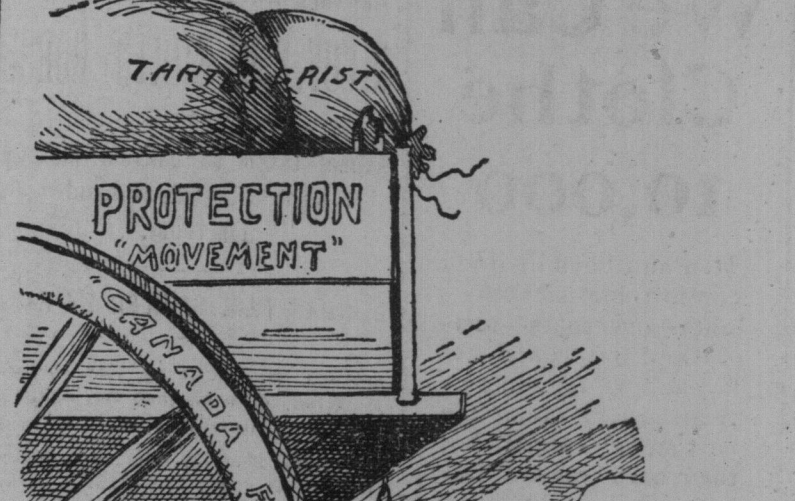
MEMORIAL FOR RHODES.

He said further that it was the purpose of the allied independent interests to gain an entrance into New York, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati and other cities.

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GIVES AWAY \$45,000,000 A YEAR.
Eight Carnegie Libraries a Day, With \$15,000 With Each.
London, Sept. 30.—Andrew Carnegie, according to his own computation, made a gift of \$45,000,000 a year, he averages nearly \$45,000,000 per annum. He averages that about eight libraries per day can be erected, giving an average of 2,900 libraries annually. He does not anticipate a cessation of his daily donations.

SOLDIERS BROKE WINDOWS.

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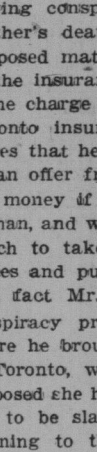

SPILT IN REPUBLICAN PARTY.

The Republican party of the United States seems to be as badly divided on the tariff question as is the Liberal party of Canada. This is the conclusion one comes to after a perusal of the Republican newspapers and after reading the declarations of recent party conventions. One section of the party stands for the maintenance of the present high tariff wall, and the other section demands a general revision and lowering of the tariff. It is strange that the party which has always stood for high tariff should divide on this issue; and the split appears to be largely due to the fact that the tariff is a theory that the tariff is the only weapon available for use against the trusts.

But while the rank and file of the party is thus divided, we find such leaders as President Roosevelt and Speaker Henderson of the House of Representatives standing firmly for the maintenance of high protection. The President, in his recent tour of the country, positively stated that the remedy against the trust evil was to be found in federal control of the capitalist combines, and not in any lowering of the tariff. In fact, he showed that in pulling down the protection wall the country would be cutting off its nose to spite its face.

Labor everywhere, both labor that is tipped and labor that never knows the feeling of extra silver in the palm, should be thankful that the London Standard has started an attack on the tipping system which may rise to the proportions of a general war against the practice. The London Standard's discussion of the question is aroused by the London paper's serious and emphatic attack on the tipping system, which both England and America will find it to their advantage to raise their voices in protest against.

There is something more than pathos in the spectacle of Sarah Bernhardt railing and walling because age is coming upon her. It contains a moral lesson as well. And it may be said, with no pretension to copy-book sapience, that the lesson is this:—

Any life that is devoted almost exclusively to Self must inevitably culminate in an unhappy end. Many may have been the specious pleasures of her earlier years. So it is that the French actress, approaching sixty, is beginning to learn that all triumphs and glories have given her life to Self, whether you call it art or vanity. Bernhardt has sacrificed home, love and all that life precious to the normal woman. She has had her "riches."

And now that she is growing old, she finds that the riches are worthless and the sacrifices are a curse. Her life has been above all things lonely, lonely as the years come on apace she has had no one to sympathize with, for that one touch of humanity, lacking which she has had no human life. In all the world there is no one left, having taken her best, is turning hard upon her. Too late has Bernhardt discovered that she is "but yet a woman."—Exchange.

For years, hogs have been higher in the Toronto market than in Chicago, ranging from 50 cents to \$2.00. What about the hog trust? One buyer buys for all the packing houses in Toronto. THE CITY SHOULD OWN THE GAS PLANT. The World has called on all those who have made open profession of their belief in public ownership to state whether they are on the question of municipalizing the gas plant of the city of Toronto, but so far not a voice has been heard. The Mayor is dumb, the aldermen are dumb, the city press are dumb, and yet the citizens of Toronto have declared by an overwhelming majority that they were in favor of the city municipalizing the gas plant. The law is clear that they are entitled to municipalize the gas plant. Municipal gas plants have proven a great success in Great Britain and Ireland wherever they have been tried. Not only have they greatly reduced the price of gas,

but they have improved the quality of the service and carried the supply to the houses of the very poor—in the cities of England, where the municipality controls the production of it a penny's worth of gas can be had.

But so far little has been said in Toronto in favor of this great reform, although everybody sees how big a part cheap gas would play in the present coal famine, and how far it would go toward preventing fuel going up in price because of transportation or other labor troubles in the United States. It is all very well for Sir William Mulock to say that he is in favor of public ownership, and for The Globe newspaper to say that it is in favor of public ownership, and for other newspapers and public men and aldermen to say that they would like to see the proposition tried, but as The Globe put it Tuesday morning in regard to another question, "deeds, not words, count," and men must be judged of their attitude on public ownership by their deeds, and not by their words.

Who has been blocking the way? Do I not see the gas company who do not want to see public ownership and control inaugurated in this city? In the meantime, let the people all remember that public ownership of the gas plant in Toronto means an abundance of gas for light, power and fuel purposes at less than 50 cents a thousand feet, or almost one-half what it costs now. The towns of Brockville, we are glad to see, owns its gas plant, and at a meeting of the commissioners the other day they were in a position to reduce the price of gas in view of the increase in the price of coal. One little instance of this kind goes a great deal further towards realizing public ownership in matters of this kind than a mere profession from public men or public newspapers that they believe in the principle. We believe in the application of it here and now in regard to the production of gas in the city of Toronto. Do you?
