



The joint capacity, then, of the milling trade in the west reaches, consequently, a total of 17,600 barrels a day, of which 14,600 may be produced in Manitoba and 3000 between that province and the Rockies.

To apply a practical test to the subject, the first point to arrive at is as to how much wheat this represents, and what proportion it bears to the crop of 1904, which is the year affected by this survey of the situation. Milling experts state that it takes five bushels of 1904 wheat to produce a barrel of flour weighing 200 pounds. Ordinarily, 41-2 bushels is the correct estimate; but last season, there was a good deal of tough wheat, which increased the quantity necessary to be reased the quantity necessary to be used.
