of the street railway company must be

attacked in its only vulnerable part.

Crowl Attorney Drayton has done good work

along this line, and he should persevere

in it. Lord Rosbery once said of the

interest in Britain in the

conduct of the street railway, the com-

pany would be itself controlled. That

describes the position of Toronto and

its street railway company today.

The company must be compelled to

live up to the letter of its legal obli-

gations.

A GIGANTIC GRAB.

The New York State Legislature has

refused to pass a bill, the purpose of

which was to authorize the company to

take 40,000 horse-power from the Ni-

agara River above the falls. While this

measure was before the legislature it

was freely charged that bribery was

being resorted to to procure its pas-

sage. It was alleged, being paid for

votes in favor of the bill, and 300

members who would abstain from

voting. Commenting on this, Collier's

Weekly said: "It is always hard

enough to prove bribery by direct

evidence, but the fact that there is no

legitimate argument for the Niagara

grab makes it evident that any votes

for it must have been secured by in-

vestigation means." This attempted "grab"

involved only 40,000 horse-power, while

the "grab" which the pack commission

and the Ros administration at-tempted

just prior to the general election in-

volved 125,000, more than three times

as much. Collier's reasoning is

sound, and its soundness does not

cease at the boundary line. Even if it

is granted that when the Mackenzie-

Nicholls-Pellatt Company shall have

a demand and a market for more than

the 125,000 horse-power they now have a

right to develop, it will be in the in-

terest of public policy to give them a

right to do so. What legitimate argu-

ments can there be for giving them that

right before they give up the right to

develop? The World believes it will

draw the coercive clauses of the auto-

nomny bill. If the government has any

doubt as to the wisdom of such a course,

that doubt can quickly be dispelled by

putting up a vigorous and persistent

fight at Ottawa. Obstruction defeated

How does this compare with farming profits in this country?

Soil

EARL SENDS CONDOLENCE TO DEAD VETERAN'S FAMILY

Plants a Maple Sapling at "The Grange" and Presents Cup to Galedonia Club.

Earl Grey will conclude his visit to Toronto to-day. At 9 a.m. he leaves for Niagara Falls in his private car Victoria, and will return in the evening, proceeding to Ottawa at 10 o'clock. Yesterday he attended to some private matters and made a few personal calls. He sent a personal letter of condolence to the family of the late George Allen Payne, the Army and Navy Veteran who was stricken suddenly at the Kings Edward on Thursday, while waiting with his comrades to be presented to the governor-general. He also visited "The Grange," the residence of Prof. Goldwin Smith, and planted a maple sapling on the lawn.

His excellency was up early, and with Capt. Newton walked to the city hall, where he met by Mayor Urquhart and Ald. Graham and taken into the tower for a bird's-eye view of the city. Unfortunately the air was heavy with soft coal smoke and fog and only the outlines of nearby buildings were visible.

The governor-general's only official act in the morning was a visit to the Victoria Club, where he was presented with an address by the Ontario Curling Association, and presented the governor-general's cup to the Galedonia Club.

The address was read by W. B. McMurrich, and assured his excellency that curling had taken a first place as one of our national sports. In reply, the governor-general said he was not a curler, but he hoped to make up this deficiency in his education during his stay this winter. None was more convinced of the great future of Canada than he, and he thoroughly agreed that athletics made for bodily health. Earl Grey suggested a curling challenge competition open to the world.

The silver cup was received by T. Remond, one of the skips of the Galedonia Club.

Lady Grey paid a visit to the Home for Incubators, and at 1 o'clock Earl Grey lunched at the Toronto Club.

Premier Whitney and Hon. Speaker St. John escorted Earl Grey and his A.D.C., Capt. Newton, thru the parliament building at noon. His excellency evinced much interest in the paintings and maps exhibited on the walls. All the cabinet ministers except Hon. Adam Beck were present and were introduced to the governor-general.

IF FREED, Will Nurse Lepers.

Trenton, April 28. — Libbie Garabrandt, who entered the state prison thirty years ago as a beautiful girl, and who is now an aged and feeble old woman, having been imprisoned for the murder of her husband, will know tomorrow whether she is to spend the rest of her life within the gloomy walls of the state prison.

The pardons board will meet tomorrow and the first case to be heard will be hers. The board has been urged to pardon her on the promise of Mrs. Mary Ryerson, a foreign missionary, to take her to Jerusalem to nurse leprosy.

They say it would not have spoiled the arrangement of decorations, but would have added to the attractiveness of the building. Moreover, they regard the refusal as prompted by jealousy of their efforts.

WANTS BOTH BANKS OF THE DON.

City Opposes Application of C.P.R. for Track Allowance on East Side.

The railway commission was called upon Thursday to listen to arguments advanced by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and the city on the question of the right of the company to lay a single industrial track on the east side of the Don, south of Winchester-street bridge. The application of the C.P.R. to lay similar tracks on both west bank was not opposed, but it was contended by H. P. Drayton and W. C. Chisholm, on behalf of the city, that the contract made with the company under the Don Valley Improvement scheme was carried out did not give the company the right to ask for an expansion of its tracks.

Angus MacMurtry, C.P.R. solicitor, explained that the company did not propose track construction until the date of the termination of the agreement by which the C.P.R. undertook to bear a share of the cost and maintenance of a high level bridge, including land damages. Supt. C. J. Murphy and J. W. Leonard of the executive staff both gave evidence of the need of the trackage designated in order to give proper facilities to adjacent factories.

G. G. Ruel appeared for the James Bay Railway and pointed out that the project would cause some overlapping of the respective lines. Chairman Kilham gave an assurance that the commission's engineer would confer with the engineers of the two roads on the matter.

LIQUOR INFORMER KIDNAPPED.

Lured Away and Intoxicated to Prevent Testifying—Now is Dead.

Ottawa, April 28.—(Special.)—The unscrupulous tactics of some hotelmen to evade the law were shown in a corner inquest here last night on Victor Sobers, who had been in city hospital under peculiar circumstances.

A couple of weeks ago three hotelmen were charged with the abduction of the liquor act, and Sobers was summoned as witness for the prosecution. He could not be found when the trial came on and adjournment was made. A couple of days later he was arrested at his home in the city, and taken to a hospital, where he died.

At the inquest tonight, evidence was given to show that friends of the hotelmen had got him intoxicated and had him removed to Gaiety Point, where he was held until he was taken to the trial. He got away, but was later taken again in tow and was apparently the victim of a plot to keep him until after the inquest was adjourned to allow the gathering of further evidence.

St. Alban's Navy League.

The meeting of the St. Alban's school branch of the Navy League, Thursday night, held in the crypt of the cathedral, was addressed by Rev. H. P. Duckworth, Dean of Trinity College; P. E. Hooper, acting secretary of the Toronto branch, and Mr. Dash, who showed an interesting series of slides, and impressed on his hearers that the inculting of imperial ideas in the minds of the boys was the best way of assuring the realization of imperial duties not only in the present but in the future citizenship of Canada. He also dwelt on the words of Earl Grey, in which he pointed out that the Canadian trade was protected by the English navy which Canada contributed to support.

The St. Alban's branch numbers 119 boys in its membership, and two more lectures will be given shortly.

East York.

Railwaymen in Wreck.

Stratford, April 28.—Three miles north of Stratford a serious accident took place yesterday afternoon. A mixed train, bound for Durham was passing here when it struck a freight train, threw a heavy coal car and a combination car off the track, the latter turning over completely.

Conductor John Collison of this city and Brakeman W. G. Armstrong, also of Stratford, were pinned beneath heavy baggage. Of the five passengers three were hurt.

WARM FIGHTING IN ARABIA.

Hodeida, Yemen Province, Arabia, April 28.—Sanaa, the capital city of Yemen Province, capitulated to the insurgents during the night of April 26. The revolutionaries are now proceeding to besiege Manakha. The latter has a garrison of 5000 men, but the troops are mutinous. Jews who left Sanaa before the surrender and who have arrived at Hodeida say the town was subjected to constant night attacks, the garrison was hard pressed and provisions were exhausted.

Fireman Suffocated.

Rochester, N.Y., April 28.—Lieut. Fitzgerald of the fire department lost his life last night in a fire at the Higginson-Olmstead Electrical Works. The fire caused a dense smoke, and Lieut. Fitzgerald was suffocated. Two other firemen are in a serious condition. It is estimated that the fire caused a loss of \$25,000.
