

It was two years ago that he fell upon the adventure which has made his fortune and given Toronto a notable benefaction. Kidd had gone to Chicago to visit his brother, Arthur S. Kidd, and after spending a few days in the city he started down town to see the sights. As he was roaming to see the sights. As he was roaming about the city, it occurred to him to look up the Chicago headquarters of the Order of Chosen Friends. He is a member of the Canadian section. He started for a directory and first sought out Started Cooper's departmental store. out Siegel Cooper's departmental store.
After an exasperating quarter of an hour seeking the office where he might find the desired book, he turned to the street door determined to look elsewhere. Breakfast was served the next morning as the train was speeding north ing as the train was speeding north of Sudbury to Sellwood, where the Moose Mountain iron mines are being developed. There a long line of freight cars loaded with supplies for Gowganda was standing on the siding. Two stages hitched to splendid horses

Two stages hitched to splendid horses stood awaiting the passengers for the new mining camp. There were racks behind for the hand baggage and the seats were covered with a profusion of fur robes, There was no particular necessity for these on the day of our arrival, for the sky was bright and clear and the temperature moderate. clear and the temperature moderate.

In less than a minute everyone was seated and the driver cracked the whip in the air over the horses' backs. The animals responded by taking up a lively trot. We passed quickly thru the little Town of Sellwood and in a few is "Big Archie," or A. C. Mackenzie, president of the Northern Construction Company.

These men, acting separately, have constructed hundreds of miles of the Canadian Northern Railway System, and have produced millions of the ties which rest under the steel of that ever expanding enterprise.

These men regard the building of the Canadian Northern sleigh road as one of the least of their undertakings. They have so many horses in the west that it takes 1500 bushels of oats a day to feed them. They can ride for days over western railroads which they have constructed. Their personal fortunes run into several hundred thousand dollars and their credit runs into millions. These big men are used to large undertakings and are disposed to regard the building of 68 miles of sleigh road thru forest, unbroken only by lakes and rivers, as one of the smallest of their accomplishments.




