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WAR SUMMARY

THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

ONE of the delusions persistently clung to by a class of military observers, some even instructed, is the belief that by selecting a point for attack and by breaking the German lines and sending a force of cavalry thru the gap, a decisive victory could be immediately won and it would be all over with the Germans. So when the successes of Neuve Chapelle and Loos were not followed up in this manner great blame was heaped by a few on the British generals. The successes at Neuve Chapelle and Loos, real the cost, but were perverted in popular imagination into disastrous reverses.

But this method of liberating France and Belgium from the iron heels of the invader is not the method adopted by the British and the French. Rather they are setting about the creating of a big bulge in the German lines and of enlarging this bulge in depth and breadth by gradually pushing the enemy backward until he is shoved off some vital points in his communications. He will then have to retreat to new regions where trench warfare can be renewed if the allies give him time to stop. In the offensive along the valley of the Somme the French have pushed their lines forward as far as it is safe for them to venture at the present stage of the operations and the British are taking up the task of enlarging the bulge.

By the exertion of powerful pressure on the remains of the German line confronting them the British yesterday morning gained

LONDON, July 7.—The British troops, in their new advance, have gained several important successes among which are the capture of further portions of an immensely strong position known as the Leipzig redoubt, according to the official statement issued by the London war office tonight.

"An attempt by the Prussian Guards to stem the advance east of Contalmaison, was crushed by the British fire and 700 prisoners of various regiments were taken. Contalmaison was stormed, but was retaken by the Germans in a strong counter-attack.

"The text of this statement follows: "8.44 p.m.—Despite stubborn resistance on the part of the enemy, our infantry, well assisted by our artillery, have pushed their advance with the utmost gallantry throughout this morning and gained several important successes.

Win South of Thiepval.

"South of Thiepval, after a fierce preliminary bombardment, a further portion of the immensely strong work known as the Leipzig redoubt was carried by assault. This redoubt is situated in a salient of the German line, and the enemy has exerted all its ingenuity over its fortifications during the last twenty months.

"Further south one of our brigades, attacking from the west, forced its way across 600 yards of the German front line trenches into the enemy's defences in Ovillers. Fierce fighting is now in progress for possession of the village.

"Following our successes last night to the east of LaBoisselle, we advanced our line over a mass of German trenches on a front of nearly 2,000 yards to a depth of 500 yards.

"North of Fricourt, linking up with the above attack, we drove the enemy from two woods and three lines of trenches.

Beat Prussian Guards.

"About 10.00 a.m. the Prussian Guards were thrown into the fight east of Contalmaison in a desperate effort to force us back. This attack was crushed by our fire. The enemy subsequently fell back to the north, leaving 100 prisoners of various regiments in our hands. About noon our infantry carried the Village of Contalmaison, after a storm, but were subsequently forced out again by a strong counter-attack.

"The enemy's casualties today must have been very severe. Large numbers of troops retiring over the open, were caught by our artillery, and the Village of Basantia le Petit was heavily shelled at a time when it was seen to be full of German reserves.

"Heavy rain has been falling throughout the day and the sodden ground and flooded state of the trenches added to the difficulty experienced by our troops."

Bert Angeles, manager of the Vandenberg Opera Company, which recently resolved after a run at the Grand Opera House, and who was charged with non-payment of one week's salary by six members of the chorus in yesterday afternoon's police court, has disappeared after leaving his account at the Hotel Chateau, where he was quartered.

CANADIAN FRONT HEAVILY SHELLED

German Infantry Attack Was Awaited, But Failed to Come.

MORTARS' GOOD WORK

Canadian Guns Prove Superiority—Dashing Raid by New Brunswickers.

OTTAWA, July 7.—Major-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes, minister of militia, has received the following communiqué from the general Canadian representative at the front:

Canadian Army Corps Headquarters, via London, July 7.—Artillery duels were frequent during the past week on the Canadian front. At times our positions were so heavily bombarded that it was necessary to evacuate our trenches. On these occasions the enemy trenches and batteries were subjected to an intense retaliatory fire from our guns.

During the course of one night the Germans repeatedly shelled a section of the area recently taken over by our troops, and subsequently a hostile reconnoitering party endeavored to approach our lines. It was at once detected and driven off by our rifle and machine gun fire.

French Mortars Superior. In trench and counter trench battles maintained the upper hand, returning approximately six shells for every one thrown by the Germans. In many places the hostile trenches and entanglements were severely damaged by our mortar shells.

With finer weather rapid progress was made on the consolidation of our new positions and the construction of other works. A large amount of enemy small arms ammunition was discovered in some old German trenches. In some cases the bullets were found to have reversed.

Patrols Are Busy. Great activity was displayed by our patrols. Every night reconnoissances of German lines were made all along our front. The enemy was found everywhere on the alert and busily engaged in strengthening his wire and trenches.

Numerous hostile working parties were located and dispersed by our fire. A patrol of four men belonging to a Montreal battalion encountered a party of 20 Germans advancing in open order. Our patrol opened fire with bombs and rifles. The enemy withdrew hurriedly.

A Dashing Raid. A raid on the trenches on its front was carried out by a New Brunswick battalion. The raiding party was led by Capt. W. J. Wilson, assisted by Sgt. Fleming and Company Sgt.-Major A. G. Gunn. A passage thru the outer wire entanglements was cut by hand.

On the 18th inst. the 29 officers now in the 18th inst. were made all along the front. The enemy was found everywhere on the alert and busily engaged in strengthening his wire and trenches.

On the whole the Germans and Austrians are now suffering from a combination of the most formidable attacks yet experienced in this war, and the natural question is, what will the German staff do about it? In the meantime the Germans are still hammering at Verdun and they took some trenches from the French by the Thiépval work. Paucity of ideas seems still to be the great drawback of the German high command.

On the whole the British army did a satisfactory day's work. With the Germans confronting it in large force and throwing against it the best troops in their service that army broke down all opposition and forged ahead. The German stamina was tested to the utmost and it was found wanting. It is not surprising that the German high command and the British Empire greater than they hate and fear the French or Russians.

On the eastern front the Russians appear to have started the Germans and Austrians on a rapid descent from their previous high mark. General Brusiloff is enlarging the bulge that extends towards Kovel and Vladimir-Volynsk by striking the enemy so hard in front of Czartorysk that he has been compelled to retreat hastily to a line beyond the branch railway which connects with the Sarny-Kovel line, yielding to the Russians the railway station at Manerchiel, and two villages. Cossacks are riding on ahead of Brusiloff, charging batteries here and sabring battalions there and terrifying the Teutons everywhere. If Brusiloff keeps on with this sharp and direct sabre thrust he will soon have turned both flanks of the Austro-German groups of armies between the Pripiet marshes and the Volhynian frontier. Then will come the time for one vigorous general shove to send them reeling and scattering backward to the countries whence they came. Under each heavy blow the enemy is becoming visibly weaker.

On the Russian northern front, Kuropatkin's artillery has begun to roar and the fighting with Von Hindenburg's troops is beginning to warm up. At Baranovichi the Russian hammer blows are threatening to turn the southern flank of the Von Hindenburg group of armies. Next will come envelopment, and next hasty retreat or destruction.

Diabolical the Austrians from mountain positions to which they cling like crabs, the Italians continue to report further progress. Renewing the attack on the strongly fortified line of the enemy between Monte Interotto and Monte Campioletto; on the Sette Comuni Plateau, they wrested from the Austrians two important points in their defences near Casera Zibonè and Malza Pozza, taking 359 prisoners. They then drove off violent attacks from those positions. They also continued to clear Austrian detachments from the slopes east of the Majo, taking 103 prisoners. The Austrians are fiercely resisting the advance on the front between the Adige and the Astico by directing a violent artillery fire against all the approaches and bombarding the slopes of Monte Majo.

PREDICTS EUROPE WILL BE BANKRUPT

Francis W. Hirst Issues Warning in Regard to War.

WANTS PEACE AT ONCE

Retires from Editorship of Economist Owing to Pacifist Views.

LONDON, July 7, 11.40 p.m.—Francis W. Hirst, the prominent financial writer, in his valedictory resignation of the editorship of the Economist after a tenure of nine years, says: "In my view the financial fabric of Western Europe is in imminent peril, and in a few more months it will no longer be possible to disguise the bankrupt condition of several great nations. Civilization, as we have known it, and representative institutions are doomed unless thru the exertions of individuals the rights, without which an Englishman, at any rate, will hardly care to live, are speedily restored. To this end freedom and independence must somehow be won back for parliament and the press."

Mr. Hirst has been an opponent of the restrictions enforced by the Defence of the Realm Act and "secret diplomacy." Replying to The Times, which has just published his resignation, he says: "I am a pacifist. I am accused of being a pacifist. The accusation is not distressing to me. I plead guilty to it. It has been my principal object during the past year to prepare the public mind for peace by separating passion and fiction from truth and fact. I could believe I had hastened it advent by one day and saved the precious lives and limbs lost in twenty-four hours should feel myself to have done a work worth all the titles that emperors shower on their favorites and ministers on their supporters."

Wants Peace Now. "That the negotiation of peace is a difficult task I admit. That the attainment of it is a task of the highest importance I do not deny. That the present situation is beyond the region of competent diplomacy I deny. That peace is desirable by all belligerent nations I feel certain, and the fact that the publication of The Economist has touched its height during the last few weeks amply illustrates the feeling of our business men."

Hartley Withers, financial adviser to the Treasury, succeeds Mr. Hirst as editor of The Economist. It is understood that the proprietors of the paper disagreed with Mr. Hirst's editorial policy.

GERMAN STAFF IS AT ITS WITS' END

Strategy of Allies Has Proved It With Perplexing Problem.

DOUBLE OFFENSIVE

Russians Are Victorious in East, and British Resume Advance in West.

LONDON, July 7, 9.35 p.m.—The head of the German staff must be faced with difficult and perplexing problems at the present moment. He must decide how to meet the new co-ordinated strategy of the allies and how best to utilize Germany's available military resources.

Never before in the history of the war has Germany been called upon to meet a strong double offensive on both the western and eastern fronts. Gen. Haig's "we resumed a vigorous offensive at dawn," coming on top of the opening of a new offensive against Darmstadt, and the Russian advance, a new experience for the German staff. Gen. Haig's attack is being made on a hundred-mile front running roughly from the Vire line north to Baranovichi in the south. The seriousness of the crisis is reflected in the paucity of information given by the German press in Berlin's official communications, which, however, at last admit the loss of Hen and Belloy on the western front.

Until more is known of the progress of the second phase of the Somme battle, the chief interest still lies with the Russian operations. There is no confirmation of the report from Rome that the whole German line on the eastern front is retiring, but the Russians continue to report success after success. The latest official statement issued by Berlin admits a retirement from a salient in the Czartorysk region, and the Russian statement tonight announces that the Russian cavalry has captured Mamewitchie, which is only some 50 miles from Kovel.

IRISH RANGERS GIVEN BIG RECRUITING FIELD

Montreal Battalion Can Draw Men From Two Provinces.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Ont., July 7.—Sir Sam Hughes has issued an order permitting the Irish Rangers of Montreal to recruit in any part of Ontario and Quebec. He regards the battalion as an exceptionally good one and says its ranks should be filled. "It is a mistake," he said, "to suppose that all Roman Catholics. Protestants are just as well come. The orange and green should stand shoulder to shoulder."

The minister of militia is considering an order for the deduction of part of the pay or pension of soldiers becoming incapacitated thru their own action or neglect.

Hay Not an Abstainer. The Stratford Herald, the local Conservative paper, this afternoon published from The Toronto News an interview with Wellington Hay, the Liberal candidate. In this interview he is quoted as saying that he is not familiar with the provisions of the Ontario Temperance Act, and therefore cannot say whether he is for or against it.

Conservatives More Hopeful. The interview was hailed with delight by the Conservative managers, who claim that it signs the warrant of the Liberal candidate. They now claim that the liquor issue will be the one issue at Monday's election, and a large number of temperance Liberals will be compelled to come out to the support of the Hearst government.

The Liberals have a flag displayed at their headquarters, but neither of the two buildings occupied by the Conservative committee has been adorned at any time by the Union Jack. None of these cases are serious, the majority of them being climatic complaints. Early yesterday morning the 170th Mississauga Battalion left the Davenport Barracks and went north to Camp Borden. The 201st is leaving on Sunday morning. Will Be Fine Hospital. A great deal of work is being done at the old General Hospital by the engineers to fix up the building and put it in shape as a military base hospital. The work is under Lieut.-Col. S. P. Biggs, who has been promoted since taking charge of the work. Lieut. A. McAllister is in charge of all the engineering work of the militia in Toronto. About \$12,000 will be spent on material alone, and by the time they turn the hospital over it will be almost entirely remodeled inside, and will compare favorably with any hospital building on the Continent of America. Lieut.-Col. T. B. Richardson, officer commanding the second depot company of the C.A.M.C., which has charge of the medical work in this district, is at the hospital daily and W. L. Symons, the well-known architect, is in consultation with the military authorities.

Commissioner Harris stated to The World last night that the work of lowering the grade of the Yonge street hill north of the C.P.R. station will be started this morning and will be rushed forward without delay. This is preparatory to the work of filling the "gap" at Farnham avenue, the city putting down the foundation and the Toronto Street Railway Company following with the ties and rails. The company, Mr. Harris stated, had agreed to go right ahead with the laying of tracks, assurances to this effect having been received by the city. At Monday's meeting of the city council a bylaw will be passed appropriating the money for the work of grading, but it is doubtful if the bylaws for the paving of Yonge street will be put thru in time for the completion of the work this fall. The track allowance will, however, be paved and the sides placed in good condition for vehicular traffic.

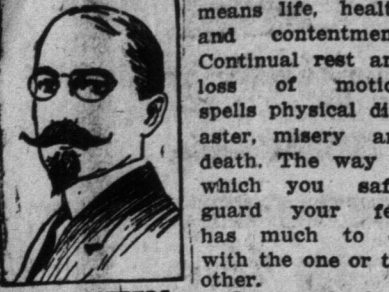
The Germans admit sustaining a reverse in Volhynia at the hands of the Russians. After the war, should he retain his usual shrewdness and force, he will easily be the central figure in British politics. Mr. Asquith may continue to be leader and welder of schisms, and his colleague has no jealousy, but has shown perfect loyalty thru-out.

Mr. Lloyd George has made a sacrifice which will not be readily understood on this side of the water. He is essentially a democrat, and to be kicked upstairs, and to permit himself to be kicked, is an instance of rare self-abnegation.

The world agrees with our New York namesake. But we go farther: the Hohenzollern dynasty and the Prussian military autocracy must go now and not in the next "similar bloody experience."

It is also necessary that our brave British allies, on their side of the battle front, shall come to a level with us. They are holding with force all the positions which they have conquered, and we steadily scout new conquests by a regrouping of their forces.

GAUGING FOE LOSSES IN JUTLAND FIGHT

British Naval Experts Do Not Entirely Agree in Estimates.

LONDON, July 7.—Two estimates of the total tonnage lost by the German fleet in the Jutland battle have been made by British officials. The more conservative one, who included in his list only vessels "seen to sink," and based his estimate on the theory that the battleships sunk were the oldest dreadnought type, gives the German tonnage lost at 18,000 tons.

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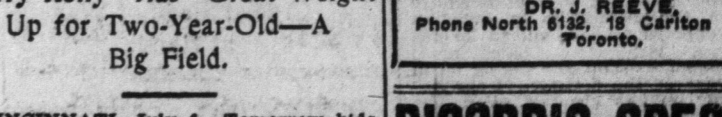
