

Chairman of Parliamentary Committee Gives Particulars to Canadian Club.

"Excepting the United States, Canada leads very distinctly in its payments to disabled soldiers and their dependents," said Major Hume Cronyn, M.P., chairman of the parliamentary pensions committee during the last session, before the Canadian Club, at the King Edward yesterday. Canada paid a greater pension, he said, than the United States when the bonuses were considered, but under

country, the disabled soldier or his widow got further allowances. Before the war, said Mr. Cronyn. Private in Canada received \$150 per year, if totally disabled, and his widow a like amount. In 1915 the amount was raised to \$264 and in 1916 a totally disabled man received \$480, widows \$382. A parliamentary committee was appointed, and as a result of their advice, disabled sol-diers received \$600 and widows \$480.

URGE MORE FACILITIES FOR TORONTO VARSITY

President of Alumni Association Places Case Before Royal Commission-Must Meet Increased Demands of New Era of Education-Better Salaries for Staff-Starved and Hampered for Lack of Financial Aid and Accommodation, Sir Robert Falconer Says.

At the afternoon session of the 1914, suddenly cut off a large portion of university fintion of the university revenue by nees yesterday, the Hon. Mr. Justice curtailing its share from the succes-Masten, president of the Alumni Association of the University of Tor-Sir Robert also shows how the desociation of the University of Tor-onto, made representations on behalf of that body, which, he explained, postgraduate and research work and of that body, which, he explained, included in its membership, 25,000 graduates and former students of the university 18,000 of whom were resident in the Province of Ontario.

Mr. Justice Masten referred briefly to four points which had been mentioned in President Falconer's memtioned in President Falconer's memtioned in President Falconer's memorandum. The first was the funda-mental need of increased facilities so

that the development of the provincial university, as demanded by the people, might not be stayed. The alumni, deeply concerned as they were in all matters of education and progress, felt, he said, that a very grave crisis faced their alma mater when only pre greatly increased demands of the new era in education. The second point emphasized was that lest the "quality of education be lost to sheer "quanbetter facilities for post-graduate and research work should be pro-vided and the university must be developed at the top. The third was that if the standards of the university to be maintained, salaries for the staff commensurate with those paid in similar walks of life, must be pro-vided. The fourth was to express full accord with the position asserted by

the Federated Colleges.

War Memorial Fund. In proof of his statement that it was in the interests of the province that organization of the alumni be facilitated, Justice Masten instanced what the association had done in the past two years toward indirect man-cial assistance to the provincial university. A war memorial fund, which now totalled \$336.457, had been raised and part of this was now being used for loaning without interest to students who had returned from the war unable to complete their courses without financial assistance. Last year \$37,447 had been loaned to 152 students, and this year already \$42,-426 had been advanced to 188 students. When the need for assisting soldier-students had passed, the fund would be used for scholarhips and

The parade will form at Queen's' Park at 12 o'clock noon and proceed to the parliament buildings, where the menbers of the provincial government will be asked to receive a deputation. The amount involved, to be paid over to the men so commuting their pensions, would be in the neighbor hood of \$5,100,000.
