### PREPARATORY MEETING.

The Annual Preparatory Meeting to the Anniversary Assembly was held at the home on Thursday, 4th November 1897, at eight o'clock p.m.

The following letter from Mr. Ewan McLennan was then read:

JOHN OGILVY, Esq.

Hon. Sec'y St. Andrew's Society, Montreal.

DEAR SIR.—Owing to ill health I cannot be with you at the Annual Preparatory Meeting. I regret this as it will be the first meeting in many years at which I failed to be present. Should my name be submitted for re election to the Committee of Management, please say to the members, I cannot serve as I intend being absent from the city for some time. I have been closely identified with the Society and the working of the home for over forty years and during all those years I have been associated with Ladies and Gentlemen whose great aim was to carry out the Motto of the Society. "Relieve the distressed."

How well this work has been done; thousands scattered all over Canada can testify.

To me the work has been pleasant and agreeable, and the friendships formed during so long a period will ever remain fresh in my memory.

In dispensing the bounty of the Society, the Committee granted relief according to the wants of the applicants, relying on the Treasurer to supply the funds. It is pleasant to say that in this, the Society never failed, always responding to the calls of the Chairman, in a noble spirit, thus doing honor to their nationality as well as carrying on the objects for which the Society was organised.

Under the able management of the late Mrs. Campbell and her husband, the "Home" obtained an enviable reputation.

This high reputation they bequeathed to their daughter Mrs. Black, who having been trained to the work by her mother, is thoroughly competent to perform the duties of Matron, and so long as the Society is fortunate enough to retain her services, the "Home" will, as in the past, continue to reflect credit upon the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal.

Drysdale, Mr. James A Ogilvy, Mr. James Wright, Rev. James Patterson, Rev. Mr. Heine. Mr. John McDonald and the President spoke in feeling words,

Moved by Rev. Dr. Barclay, seconded by Mr. James Tasker, that in recognition of the invaluable services rendered for many years to the St. Andrew's Society and to Scotchmen, that Mr. MacLennan be elected an Honorary Member of the Society. Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. McDonald and seconded by Mr. John Allan, that a committee be appointed, consisting of the President, Rev. Dr. Barclay, and Mr. W. W. Ogilvie, with power to add to their number, to give effect to the above resolution and convey to Mr. Maclennan, in the most heartfelt way the Society's regret for his illness and its appreciation of his services, his character and life.

Both these motions being put were passed by an unanimous standing vote.

In the absence of Mr. Ewen MacLennan, Mr. James Tasker read the report of the Chairman of the Charitable Committee.

Annual Report of Charitable Committee, 1896-97.

The Committee has to report on the discharge of its responsibilities as the Almoners of the Society from the period November 1st 1896 to November 1st 1897 and would preface the report by recording its thanks and obligations to the few, but faithful members of the Ladies' Committee, who have greatly aided by attendance at the weekly meetings of the Committee and household visitation of all doubtful applicants for relief.

There is a further decrease in the number of inmates of the "Home", those receiving its friendly shelter during the past year, numbering 81 as against 93 the previous year; but, although the number admitted is less, the number seeking admission, we believe to have been greater than for many years. The applicants refused were all of the tramp class, principally from the United States, who had been attracted to Canada by reports of better times and the appearance and accent of most of them, as strongly belied their claims to our nationality as their actions belied their claims to be looking for work. A good many meals were nevertheless given to the most deserving of these wanderers. Those admitted to the Home were principally laborers and clerks unsuccessful at home and utter failures in this country.

The few respectable mechanics and others of various occupations easily found work. The "Home" has been maintained in good condition, both inside and out, and bids fair to stand long as a monument to the generosity and patriotism of Montreal Scotchmen, and a haven where the distressed of our nationality can look for advice and succor in their troubles. As a centre of Scottish charity it is now well established and well known, and no deserving Scottish man or woman, need look elsewhere for assistance. Those who do not desire to help the intemperate or indolent need have no scruples in referring all Scotch people who seek their assistance to the St. Andrew's Home and thus avoid imposition. A case in point was a man named Quosbarth, a son of a former German Consul at Dundee, who was recommer ded to the Home by a member as a Scotch Gentleman of good descent, in temporary difficulties, and for a while he was assisted by giving him his meals. It was not long however before we were satisfied that the assistance we were giving him was not what he cared for, and further investigation revealed the fact that the man was a professional begging-letter writer. Some half dozen of our members who received letters from him were cautious enough to inquire at the Home and were informed of the man's real worth.

We have also to render our usual meed of thanks to the kind friends whose gifts are specified in the attached list, to the Allan Line for reduced fares, to the Bell Telephone Co'y and the City Ice Co. for half rates, to Dr. Stewart of New-York for a copy of the Scottish American Journal, to our Physicians and Chaplains, and to the Rev. Mr. Patterson and Rev. Mr. McManus, whose intimate knowledge of the work of other local charities rendered their presence at the meetings of great practical value.

It was unanimously agreed that the Rev. J. E. Hill, Mr. J. Wright, D. Macmaster be appointed a committee to look into the by-laws, etc., and to report at a special meeting three weeks from to night, if any alteration or change which they might suggest should be made in the interest of the Society.

The meeting then adjourned.

### THE ANNUAL SERMON.

The annual sermon to the members of the Society was preached on Sunday, November 28th, in St. Paul's Church, by the Rev. Jas. Barclay, D·D, one of the chaplains. The service began at four o'clock, promptly at which hour, the vice-president and officers of the Society as well as the president and officers of the Caledonian Society entered the church and took seats in the front of the nave. Among those present were Messrs. MacMaster, S. S. Bain, Dr James Stewart, F. S. McLennan, James Wright, J. M. Campbell, W. B. T Macaulay, E H. Copland, John Ogilvy, Jno. Allan, J. T. Mitchell, Andrew McAllister, J. H. Stewart, J. C. MacDiarmid, Lt.-Col. A. A. Stevenson, Lt.-Col. R. Gardner, Lt.-Col. Geo. R. Starke. Major David Seath, and many other officers, ex-officers and members of the societies.

The sermon was an eloquent panegyric on the life of Thomas Carlyle, one of the most prominent figures in Scottish literature.

The text was the sixth verse of the eighty seventh Psalm:
"The Lord shall count when he writeth up the people that
this man was born there"

After the service the reverend gentleman was formally thanked for his discourse.

St. Andrew's Day is the synonym for joy and gladness, mirth and happiness the world over, wherever Scotchmen are found. There are no people so clannish or so tenacious in their loyalty to their "ain countree" and to each other, and this "day of days" intensifies these traits and renews each year the 'ties that bind."

St. Andrew, the patron saint of Scotland, was the son of Jonas, a fisherman of Bethosaida, in Galilee. His character was Christ-like, and we are told that no nearer approach to perfect manhood ever walked the earth. St. Andrew is the Scotsmen's ideal of a man, and there are certain points of resemblance even to-day between the typical Scotsman and his patron saint (although differing in degree).

St. Andrew was a cautious, prudent, practical man, who did not despise the day of small things, and he was careful of "left overs," even as they are to-day.

There are many legends about St. Andrew. One is that many many years after he had been crucified and buried, a pous Greek monk named Regulus took his body and carried it to Scotland and buried it on the east coast of Fife, where he built a church.

Afterwards it became the site of the renowned cathedral and town of St. Andrews, the home of golf. Another legend is interesting as showing how this holy man of peace became the patron saint of war. "A St. Andrew's cro-s appeared in the heavens to Achaius, King of the Scots, and Hungus, King of the Picts, the national emblem." Since then a banner with the same emblem has been rallied around by Scotland's sons on many a field of battle, and it is the Scotsmen's boast that if it does not always ensure victory it has never knowingly been set up in the cause of wrong.

St. Andrew's night suggests St. Andrew's ball, and in that suggestion lies magic; Scotch music. Scotch heather and pipes with their shirling and the stalwart Highlanders bearing the haggis, and bonnie lads and bonnier lassies all comes to one's mind. There is no ball the whole year around of so much interest to everybody as St. Andrew's. It is looked forward to by young and old, and is the debutante's ball par excellence. No other place does the Scotchman show to more advantage from the social point of view; he is in good humor, expansive, self-satisfied. "Here's tae us, Wha's like us?" That expresses his feelings entirely.

The St. Andrew's ball last night was a noteworthy success. The retiring president and his assistants were untiring in their efforts to make it so, and are to be congratulated on the result of those efforts.

Mrs. Donald Macmaster, wife of the retiring president, and Mrs. A. F. Riddell, wife of the second vice-president received the guests in the drawing room off the corridor. A gay crowd was gathered for upwards of an hour when the pipes were heard in the distance, and presently Pipe-Major Mathieson and six of his men appeared ready to play the procession to the dancing room in time honored fashion.

### THE DECORATIONS.

The floral decorations were on a magnificent scale last night. Other years there have been flags and banners, standards and trophies and escutcheons. This year everything in the shape of bunting is banished, except the banners bearing the St. Andrew's Cross, belonging to the Society. It can be said truly that never was more effective work done in the way of decoration. From above the massive centre chandelier was hung laurel wreathing, which was carried from pillar to pillar, and ingeniously arranged in the form of a St. Andrew's Cross over each window. Festoons of laurel encircled the side chandeliers and the window sills. The windows themselves were massed with plants whose colors blend and harmonise with a grace which is beauty itself. The side lights were draped with smilax in a most artistic fashion, whilst from each was hung a basket of "Love in a Tangle" (a poetical and at the same time realistic touch of Nature appropriate to the occasion). White and yellow chrysanthemums were also used. This treatment was carried out around the hall. The front of the gallery was a piece of very graceful wreathing, which was done by looping the laurel in half circles; from the centre of the loop was hung a straight piece of laurel which came a little below the balcony and terminated in a ball. The flags used were from Mr. Sonne's.

The three centre gasaliers were wreathed all about with laurel in such a fashion that the electric light glistened through the green, and from each point was suspended a huge ball of flowers, a really magnificent pendant of chrysanthemums, roses and carnations.

The band stand was a work of art, while Mr. Quivron and his men were completely hidden from view by drapery and large palms, through which the music rose and swelled with sweetness, and anon with a gaiety, an abandon peculiar to the music of the time and place. Hearts thrilled with the glamor of the dear old Scotch tunes; and whether they be glad or sad, they thrill one all the same. Banks of tropical plants were grouped around Above the mantelpiece was placed a huge St. Andrew's Cross made of holly berries, which reminded one of the symbol carried aloft in days of old to rouse the clans in time of war.

That "Fiery Cross glancing like meteor along, The fatal sign of fire and sword; Held forth, and spake the appointed word."

And now in spite of the beautiful floral bedecked room, which reflects so much credit on Mr. S. S. Bain and his staff, and in spite of the entrancing strains from the mysteriously concealed musicians, the ball-room is deserted for more material pleasures. The dining-room is the next point of interest.

### THE SUPPER.

The pipers again headed the procession, which was formed in the same manner as before. Tables were provided for all the guests in the dining-room where a very fine supper was served. Shortly after it began the haggis was brought in and carried around the room as ususal with pipers and highland bearers. The centre table was handsomely decorated with fine works of art in sugar. A clock and tower with turrets were very fine. Fairy lamps of different colors added to the general effect of light and brightness. The following is the menu:

A large number of this year's debutantes were present, who have already made their initial bow to society, besides those who made their debut last night.
