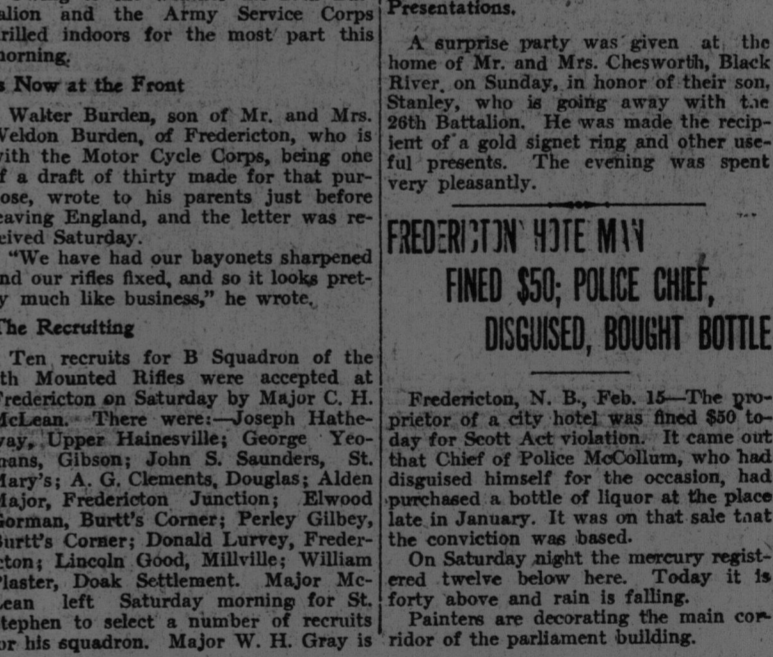

AIRSHIPS MAY HAVE BEEN BUT FIRE BALLOONS

Young Men Admit Sending Up Three on American Side of Border and They Exploded Over Brockville

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Two aeroplanes equipped with powerful searchlights flew over the town of Brockville last night, coming from the direction of Morrisville, N. Y., and heading in the direction of Ottawa, but they have not been reported as seen anywhere near Ottawa. All lights were extinguished around the parliament buildings and government houses.

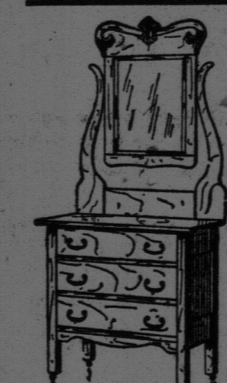

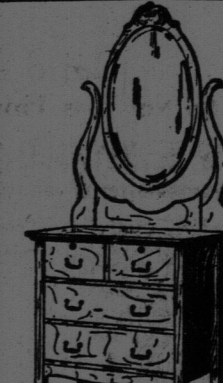

NO NEED FOR EXTRA CENT ON LETTERS YET THOUGH SOME PAY IT Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 15.—A misapprehension apparently exists as to operation of the new stamps taxes, for people are already posting letters with three cents postage and postal cards with two cents. The extra stamps are not to be called for until about the middle of March.

They are now being engraved. The color will be gold with a picture of King George and the words "Inland Revenue War Tax." The stamp will be used on checks, etc., but whether the same design will be utilized for letters or a special one will be gotten up by the post office department is not yet decided. The denominations will range from one to fifty cents.

**SAYS WERNER HORN ONCE WAS OFFICER IN GERMAN ARMY**

**His Lawyer Hopes to Establish Contention For Use in Defence—Horn Not a Crank, He Says**  
New York, Feb. 15.—Daniel O'Connell, of Boston, lawyer for Werner Horn, who is in prison in Maine and awaiting extradition for attempting to blow up the bridge across the St. Croix river on the Canadian border, says that there were in Horn's letters which showed that Horn was once a German army officer and these probably will be presented to establish the defence that Horn, as a member of the German army, committed an act of war against an enemy nation.  
Mr. O'Connell said that there were numerous incidents of a similar character in relation to this with Mexico and with Great Britain, but he always held, he said, that a man could not be extradited from this country for a political act against another country, and the word "political" had a wide range, including acts of war, such as the blowing up of a bridge.  
"If this defence protects Horn against extradition what defence will you make against any charge that the country may bring against him?" was asked. "That depends largely on the attitude of the government," Mr. O'Connell said. "There may be reasons why it will not care to press her case. At any rate it is a question for us to consider later." "I blow up the bridge," Mr. O'Connell said that the papers in Horn's trunk bore out his story that he was thirty-three years old, that he had been nine years in the German army, that his rank was that of a lieutenant, that he had lived for three years on a coffee plantation in Guatemala, that he had tried to get back to Germany but had come to this country when he saw that German reservists were almost certain to be captured on their way home.  
He was quite certain, Mr. O'Connell said, that his client had no hand in the burning of the Rocking plant at Trenton, where several buildings were destroyed in which supplies for the Allies were being manufactured. The papers in Horn's trunk, he said, have no hint that there were others acting in concert with him.  
"The man is not a crank," said Mr. O'Connell. "He wanted to do something for his country, but you can be assured that there is no foundation for the many wild stories concerning his adventures."  
Mr. O'Connell refused to say who was employing him as counsel for Horn. He said that, after he had seen an interview about the law on the case in a Boston newspaper, certain individuals whom he would not describe called upon him and employed him to defend Horn.

THE WAR NEWS.

The press of Germany shows resentment toward the United States because the government of the latter country has intimated that it would not be wise for the Germans to sink an American ship in British waters without first making inquiry concerning the vessel and the character of her cargo.

There are 600,000 less people in Belgium than before the war began, and the whole 7,000,000 of the population are in serious want, with hundreds of thousands utterly destitute.

Having previously expropriated all stocks of corn, wheat and flour, the German Bundestaat has now expropriated the stock of oats, and has also ordered the breweries to reduce their production.

UNIFORM PROVINCIAL LAWS

Uniformity in provincial legislation in Canada is greatly desired by all who have business transactions in different provinces, and also lawyers, who now find it necessary to have a knowledge of the laws of all provinces, as well as of the Dominion.

An address on this subject, delivered by Sir James Aikins, president of the Canadian Bar Association, in Winnipeg, in December last, and is being distributed by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, which is asking the re-organization of the principal boards of trade and other public bodies in each province.

A precedent has been established in the United States. Twenty-five years ago the American Bar Association began an agitation which resulted in the enactment of a Board of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, appointed by the governments of the respective states, to make a study of the comparative laws of each state, and to make recommendations. This board has not only gathered information, but has had standard forms of acts relating to the several subjects on which uniformity is desired drafted by experts.

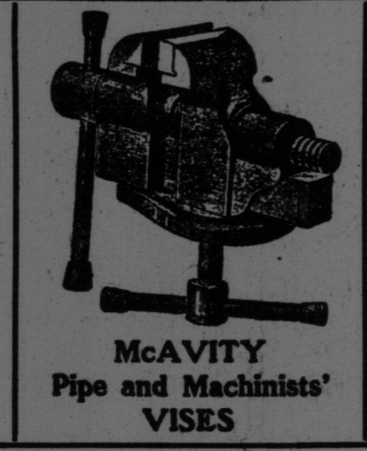

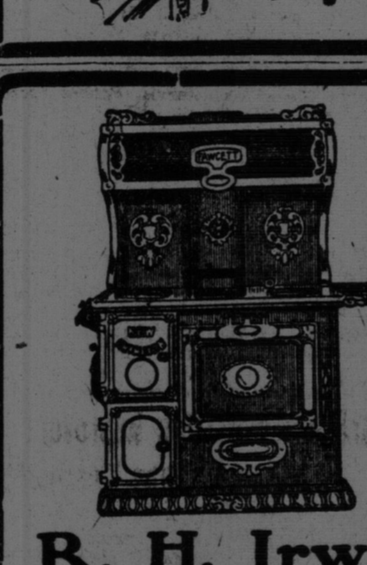

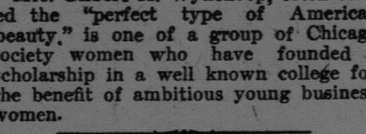

**PASTORAL LETTER READ YESTERDAY**

The Lenten pastoral letter of His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc was read in the different churches throughout the diocese yesterday. He urged the faithful to abstain from intoxicating liquor and appealed for a frequent attendance at the sacraments of the church, particularly during the season of Lent. Sin, he said, was not merely an evil, but an enemy of the soul. The following are excerpts from the letter:

So essentially opposed is it to the sanctity of God that nothing can ever justify its commission. Even though a man could secure, by one sin, every possible advantage to himself or to society, or save himself, his family and friends from the loss of everything they hold most dear, no power on earth could sanction or permit its commission.

"We would again strongly recommend our people to abstain from intoxicating liquor at all times, particularly during the penitential season of Lent. There is no habit more easily contracted, or more difficult to eradicate when acquired, than that of drinking liquor; nor is there one more productive of dire consequences to the individual, to the family and to society. At the present time, when owing to the war, many find it difficult to secure employment, and others are working on short hours and money is scarce, it is doubly incumbent upon us to remove the cause—correct the condition that keeps you from looking as you ought. We will have a collection for the maintenance of their wives and families."

"Out of all the evil in the world today, let us hope that the greatest is the sin of drinking liquor. It is undoubtedly a chastisement from God for the sins of men. Only by humbling ourselves under His all-wise hand, acknowledging that we deserve His punishments, and by amending our evil ways, may we expect Him to bestow the blessing of peace on suffering humanity."

While we were advancing to drive the Germans out of some trenches they had taken from us, Major Powell brought a chair out of the house and carried it with him, using it occasionally to sit upon. We advanced in short rushes, and every time we advanced and got down under cover Major Powell would put down his chair and sit upon it to rest his foot. All the time shells and bullets were flying round, but Major Powell took his chair to within 200 yards of the enemy's trenches, conducting the operations all the way until he got hit, but I am glad to say he was not very seriously hurt.

**DRIVEN TO THE SLAUGHTER BY THEIR OFFICERS**

**German Deserters Say it Was Certain Death at the Year—Tired of it All**

(Manchester Guardian.)

St. John, Dec. 29.—When I saw before me a civilian with a blue Jersey, and a suit which evidently was not made for him, and with a face not usual in these parts of the country but of rather a German type, I understood that I was facing a deserter. "I said to him, 'Are you tired of the war?'"

"As far as this," he answered, holding his hand above his head. He had had more than enough. "Yes," he added, feeling that he was safe on Dutch territory, "I am tired of it, tired of being driven to the slaughter like one of a herd of cattle. I am tired of being snubbed by young officers, who must think that we have no human feeling left, or no love for wife and children." There was hate in his eye when he spoke of his officers.

"The Year," he continued, "this makes most of us shiver. It is not a fight, but the slaughter of masses. And what business have we in Belgium after all? Why must we Germans bring this good-natured people to ruin and misery? I won't do it any longer. To desert is a decision which counts for one's life. It means saying good-bye to your country and your welfare. But I have strong arms, and can work."

"Explaining why he deserted, my informant said: 'I was quartered in a house near Blankenberge, where a mother and daughter lived. One night I heard a terrible noise. A sergeant and a soldier had forced an entrance to the home under pretext that there was light, and the women woke me by their screaming. Jumped out of bed and rushed upstairs, asking the men what they wanted there. The sergeant was maddened by my interference, and promised me a punishment. This made me mad, also, and I knocked him down the stairs. This was enough for the older man as well. But the next day I received an order to appear before the court. I thought, 'No fear,' and I deserted. Now, I feel myself another man, and not an instrument of murder. I shall go to America and try my chances there."

A few days before I had met another deserter, who had just crossed the frontier. He was of a much more sympathetic type. He deserted, he avowed, because he did not want to die. "At the Year," he said, "there awaits us nothing but certain death. The officers force us into the enemy's fire over the dead and wounded."

"But," I asked, "if you had to explain your presence in Holland, how could you do it?"

"I shall say that I was menaced by civilians wanting to kill me. They can never deny this, there have been so many franc-tireurs, it is said."

This explains one of the legends of Belgian civilians shooting Germans. A simple tale is exaggerated into a menace by civilians with scythes, spades, and axes, as all the rifles have been given in.

**ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE CHARGE AGAINST WOMAN**

Police Court Proceedings Follow Britain Street Revolver Shooting

A preliminary hearing in the case against Mrs. Margaret White for attempting to commit suicide by shooting herself with a 22-calibre revolver about six weeks ago, in her home in Britain street, was begun in the police court this morning.

The first witness called was Mrs. Dora Hayward, who resides at 104 Britain street. She testified that she knew Mrs. White, who resided in the same house. She said she remembered the day when the shooting took place. The defendant, she said, called at her door about 8:30 o'clock on that morning and said that "she was going to do it." She said she did not feel well. About an hour later she returned and put her head in the foot of the stairs with a revolver in her hands. Mrs. White, she said, started up stairs and the witness said the report of the revolver was soon heard. Later the witness went up-stairs and saw Mrs. White lying on a bed. She saw blood on her waist. In the meanwhile a doctor and the ambulance had been summoned. The revolver was produced in court and identified. Mrs. White was then remanded.

The magistrate ordered that she have special care while held in custody as she appeared to be in poor health.

When she was brought into court Matron Ross was in attendance and cared for her during the proceedings.

**LOCAL WHITE PLAGUE FIGHT**

The January report of Miss Agnes Sutherland, nurse to the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, shows nineteen children and fifty-nine adults on the list on January 15. The necessary was open on five days for children and nine for adults. The attendance was seven children and thirty-nine adults. Five prescriptions were filled for children and thirty for adults, and one prescription was given a child. New patients numbered two children and seven adults. The phthisis pulmonary patients number four children and forty-four adults. There have been children and fifteen adults under observation. Three children and five adults were discharged and three adults died. There were 109 visits to old patients and nineteen to new. Two patients were receiving milk.

**MORMONS TO LEAVE THE CITY**

Woman Makes Scene as They Are Fined

IS PUT OUT OF COURT

Turmoil For a While—Forty Dollar Fine or Twenty Days in Jail For Six Young "Latter Day Saints," But Will Leave Town

Scenes enacted in the time of the late Carry Nation and the present-day sensationalist, Sylvia Pankhurst, were witnessed in the police court this morning when a woman sympathizer of six young Mormons created a disturbance after Magistrate Ritchie passed judgment on the young religious enthusiasts. After hearing a statement from the spokesman of the Mormons, the magistrate said that he could do nothing less than see that the law was observed, and therefore had to fine them \$40 each or twenty days in jail.

At this juncture one of the defendants remarked that they would not be the first ones to suffer while in, and endeavor to teach their doctrine, and immediately the female voice chimed in— "Yes, Go to Jail and the Lord Will Deliver You!"

The magistrate ordered Sergeant Hastings to eject the disturber, whereupon she loudly protested and took a defiant stand, saying that she would have him put out of Canada.

The magistrate said that if she did not get out he would send her to jail for seven days for interfering with the court proceedings. After considerable haranguing, the door was closed upon her, and the magistrate antipathetically complimented Sergeant Hastings for the nerve he displayed during the encounter.

When asked to make a statement regarding their profession, the president of the organization said he did not consider it as such, as they did not take a special course in any seminary, received no pay for their labors and took up no collections at their religious meetings. These he said, were against their belief. He said they were here merely as servants of the Lord to preach the Gospel for the uplift of humanity. He could not understand why any objection should be made to their labors in St. John, as they were allowed in other parts of the dominion, where he said they had more than 15,000 members of their belief.

When the magistrate struck the fine, he gave them an option in default of their paying it, going to jail for the time or else to leave the city in a specified time. After discussing the matter among themselves, they decided to leave the city at once for forty hours' time to do so. Their request was granted.
