

Mexico City, July 30—Francisco Mendosa, archbishop of Durango, and one of Mexico's most prominent church dignitaries, is dead at Durango City, according to advices received here.

Archbishop Mendosa recently won prominence with a pastoral letter described by a genuine Rhenish assembly.
