Germany Threatened With Financial Ruin

Workmen's and Sidiers' Councils Squandering Money at Kapid Rate and Difficulties Repuplic's Tribute To BRITAIN'S DAY IN THE UNITED STATES are Growing More Acute; Conference on Possible Occupation of Berlin

Munich, Dec. 6, via Geneva-(By the Associated Press)-Anxiety is being shown by the German, especially the Bavarian, press over the financial stability, and even the honesty, of many of the hundreds of workmen's and soldiers' councils now conducting affairs in this country. Reliable reports say that the disbursements of these councils for the last two weeks have totalled 800,000,-000 marks. If this rate of expense continues to be the usual cost of operating the government, it will exceed the total German budget, with its enormous outlay for military upkeep, by several times.

The Bavarian Gazette says that the money difficulties of the councils are edustantly growing more acute. The financial problem was simple in the beheated and lighted by the old staff and requisitioned state automobiles.

Coal Handlers Work For All But Dominion Co.

By arrangement with the British admiralty the Coal Handlers, who have been holding out for a wage schedule of seventy cents an hour, will resume work at the new rate, but they are still at odds with the Dominion Coal Co. and R. P. & W. F. Starr Coal Co., who at a meeting yesterday offered them sixty cents per hour which the men declined.

At a meeting last night between a delegation from the Coal Handlers' Union and Sir Arthur Harris, minister of shipping for the imperial government, Sir Arthur met the demands of the union of seventy cents an hour on behalf of the British admiralty. The meeting took place on board Sir Arthur's private car at the depot as he had wired R. H. Blennerhasset to arrange it. The offer made by Sir Arthur was for seventy cents per hour and a signed agreement for twelve months, starting from the first of December, was stipulated.

A meeting of the Coal Handlers' Union was held last night at their rooms to decide on Sir Arthur's offer. The matter was decided favorably and it was agreed to have the same delegation, consisting of President F. Freestone, P. McKinnis, W. Doherty, and W. McAnulty, with Mr. Blennerhasset, meet Mayor Hayes this morning at 9 o'clock and give him their decision of acceptance of the offer which the mayor will wire to Sir Arthur.

The Coal Handlers' delegation had a conference yesterday with Mr. McKenzie, traveling superintendent of the Dominion Coal Co., and Mr. McIsaac, first vice-president of the same company, in reference to the new wage schedule. Acting on behalf of the Dominion Coal Co. they turned the offer down but stated that they would pay the men at the rate of sixty cents per hour. This was not acceptable to the men, and at the meeting last night they decided not to work for the Dominion Coal Co. or R. P. & W. F. Starr's Coal Co. until the demands of the men for seventy cents an hour rate are met and a twelve months' agreement signed.

Charles Swanton, of Swanton Bros, was in attendance at the meeting last night and hired most of the men available to carry on the work on the West Side of coaling the steamers so that they will not be detained. Some of the men returned to work last night, and it is expected that they will all be working today.


