**WILL FORM MOBILE  
MACHINE GUN UNIT**

Ottawa, Aug. 16—Colonel W. K. Walker, D. S. O., M. C., better known in the Canadian Expeditionary Force as "Tiny," who commanded first the cavalry brigade machine guns and later the Canadian motor machine guns and armored cars, is perfecting arrangements for the formation of a mobile machine gun unit of the permanent force. He has lately been in consultation with military authorities here and is now inspecting various eastern military districts with a view of reporting on the location of machine-gun sections. He will visit Montreal, Kingston, Hamilton and Toronto, and he has already put in his report on western districts.

It will be remembered that in the dark days of March, 1918, when the Fifth Army fell perilously back on Amiens, Field Marshal Haig paid a great tribute to the Canadian armored cars and machine-gun batteries and in his report declared "they saved Amiens."

Colonel Walker was then in command of the force, which was made up of the Eaton, Borden, Sifton and Yukon batteries. Their casualties were not light, but they showed down the Germans until a new line could be dug in front of Amiens.

In the victorious advance just a year ago they fought back victoriously over the same ground, holding the right of the Canadian flank. The brigade then was called the Independent Force, and was under the command of Brigadier-General Bruntin, Colonel Walker having command of the First brigade.

It is with a view of collecting as many of the old machine gunners who will join the permanent force as soon as possible that Colonel Walker is now visiting eastern military centres.

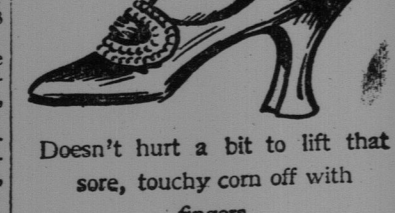

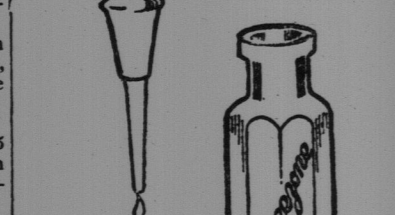

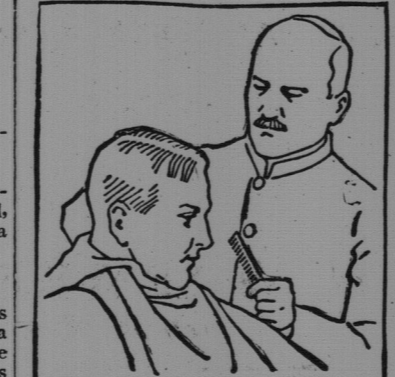

**WOULD HAVE IRISH  
ATTEND AT HOUSE**

Joseph Devlin Makes an Appeal  
For the Old Nationalist Policy

London, Aug. 16—Joseph Devlin, Nationalist M. P. for Belfast, addressing a meeting of Nationalists yesterday at Black Rock, Ireland, made an appeal for the old Nationalist policy as against the Sinn Fein policy in the matter of abstention from attendance upon the sessions of parliament. Mr. Devlin contended that the presence of the eighty Irish members at Westminster during the peace conference would have changed Ireland's fate because every voice raised for freedom in the House of Commons "resounded through two hemispheres." The Nationalists, Mr. Devlin continued, had given the Sinn Fein fair play, but the future must show whether the old policy, so fruitful of results, or the new policy, so prolific in promises, was the better for Ireland.

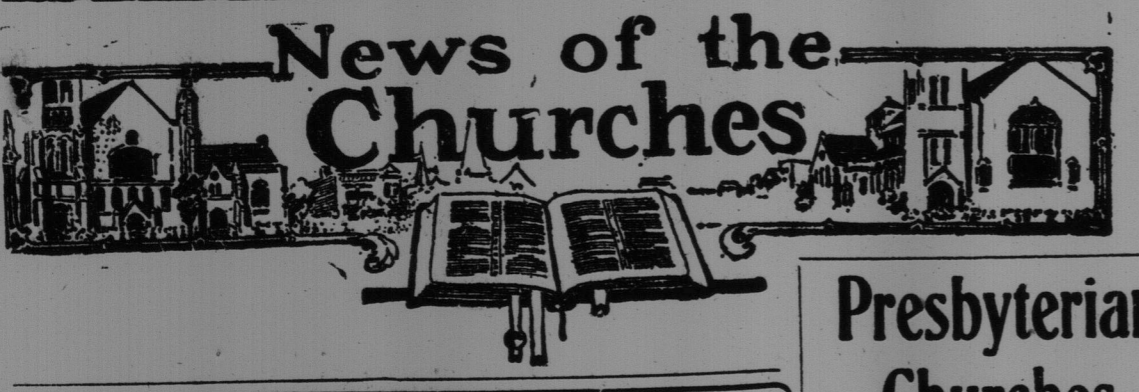

### BAD NAUHEIM COULDN'T BE MUCH WORSE

Gambling in Germany is Reported Eating into "Plunger" Stage Now

Frankfurt-on-Main, Aug. 16—Gambling is on the increase throughout Germany to an alarming extent, according to German newspapers. This is said to be due partly to the high living of individuals who made fortunes during the war by government contracts or otherwise. At Bad Nauheim three gambling houses have been running day and night for some time and the German newspapers refer to the place as a second Monte Carlo.  
The Frankfurter Zeitung says:—  
"The demoralizing effect of the three gambling resorts erected in Bad Nauheim during the period of the soldiers' council is now seen in its grossest form. Following the scene of a week ago when a summer guest threw his revolver in the centre of the gambling hall at the Villa Heinenmann after losing 80,000 marks in an hour, another guest said to be from Frankfurt, was found murdered in one of the parks. The investigating committee summoned from Gieszen ascertained that the murder had been committed by a thief; the murderer had won 70,000 marks at the "Club 1919" in the Grand Hotel on the night he was killed. On the way to his quarters he was shot in the back and all his money stolen.  
"At the Bristol hotel it is said that a German woman recently lost 85,000 marks by gambling, and could not pay her hotel bill, so she was obliged to auction her clothing and valuables. Another man from Frankfurt lost fifty thousand marks one Sunday afternoon at the Villa Heinenmann, and a few days before another guest lost as much as 700,000 marks."

### BRINGS ROBES OF PRIEST OF THEBES

Egyptian Relics Dating Back 700 B. C. Given to New York Museum

New York, August 16—Some of the personal effects of Pudu Bost, mayor and chief priest of Thebes, Egypt, about 700 B. C., arrived today on the Duca d'Aosta, consigned to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The jewelry and robes of this ancient Egyptian were uncovered by Ambrose Lansing of 153 East Eighty-eighth street, who is associated with the Egyptian Art Department of the Museum, and who has been excavating for more than a year.  
Mr. Lansing returned on the ship. He said he had brought only a few of the things for the Egyptian collection which he found. Most of the relics were left in Italy until arrangements can be made to bring them to the United States.  
Mr. Lansing said an interesting discovery of his excavations was that of a more modern tomb, when he uncovered the grave of Pudu Bost, at a depth of forty feet, he found evidences that grave robbers had broken into the tomb, apparently soon after the death of the Theban official, and had carried away some of his jewels and robes of office.  
"I imagine they were frightened off before they were through, as we found many rare relics," Mr. Lansing said.  
"The excavating in Thebes, which is now known as Luxor, was most interesting. We found from inscriptions on the mayor's tomb which we deciphered that Amneris, whom opera lovers recognize as the queen in Aida, was the real queen of Upper Egypt when Mayor Pudu Bost died."

### MENNONITES MUST OBEY SCHOOL LAW

Manitoba Court Declares Sect Has No Special Rights—Province is Supreme

Winnipeg, Aug. 16—Mennonites in the province of Manitoba have no educational privileges not extended to all citizens, according to a judgment handed down today by the Manitoba court of appeal.  
The rights which the Mennonites have heretofore claimed, to educate their children as they pleased, are based on "authority" from the federal government given in 1873, which the court declares are beyond the power of parliament to confer.  
The court refused an application for permission to carry an appeal from this decision over the supreme court of Canada to the privy council, holding that the matter was so clear to the minds of the members of the court that they did not feel that they should interfere with the usual course of appeal. The matter came before the court by way of appeal from a conviction of John Hildebrand and Dedrick Doerkson, by Magistrate Milne at Morden on July 17.  
By the judgment the court decides that the government intended to give the Mennonites, as they claim, the right to their own schools, but that even if this had been done the dominion government would have no such power, as the province of Manitoba has the exclusive right to deal with matters pertaining to education. It is therefore held that the government of Manitoba had the right to pass the school attendance act.  
It is further decided by the judgment that the school attendance act is binding on the Mennonites and that they must attend the schools in accordance with the terms of the law. The court, by its judgment, further holds that even if the dominion government had passed a statute giving the Mennonites the right that they claim, that such an act would be beyond the power of the parliament, and in no way interfere with the rights of the province of Manitoba to deal with educational matters as it had done.



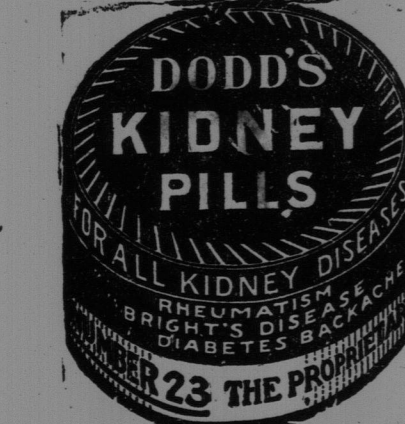

AMERONGEN DIZZY WITH EXCITEMENT

Skittles the Only Thriller Before the ex-Kaiser Came—Now Obsessed With Mesace of the Bolshevik

London, July 28.—(Correspondence)—Before the ex-Kaiser and the Bolsheviks came to Holland, writes the Daily Mail correspondent at Amerongen, skittles were the only distraction there. Nowing more excitement than is good for it. The local tobacco planters and rose-growers have been drawn into the vortex of high politics, for does not the village barber visit the castle every morning to brush the hair and trim the beard of Wilhelm, late German emperor, now prisoner in the hands of the anti-Bolshevik guard of Europe? And a most excellent barber he is. The coming of the Kaiser to Castle Bentinck caused a political eruption among the 1400 villagers who for the first time elected the first woman, who was also the first Socialist to the municipal council. Then came whispers of Bolshevism, and the villagers produced the Burgerwacht, or civic guard.

We are very proud of our Burgerwacht in Amerongen. Commanded by the town clerk, a mighty skittles player who stands 6 ft. 4 in. in his socks, with his brother, a still mightier skittles player of the same height, as second in command, the anti-Bolshevik guard is some ninety strong, and its members are proof against propaganda and intimidation.

Armed with rifles and wearing orange brassards, they drill religiously every Thursday, marching through the village to the tap of the drum, admired by the girls and lauded by the boys. It is said that the ex-Kaiser in his moated castle

has shuddered at the tramp of the Amerongen Burgerwacht.

Dominate Problems. But the two dominating world problems—the ex-Kaiser and Bolshevikism—cannot distract Amerongen from skittles. Skittles as played in this village is not so much a game as an achievement. We have nothing like it in England, though I understand there are feeble imitations in Germany.

Imagine a long, narrow shed, with a polished plank about fifteen yards long and a foot wide, run-down the centre. The object is to roll bowls weighing fourteen pounds each and equipped with a hole for the thumb along the plank, and thus knock down all or some of eight skittles, and the difficulty is to keep the bowl on the plank. A novice may play for hours without achieving more than a dislocated thumb and a swollen forearm, but an expert like our gigantic town clerk can work wonders with spin and bias. Like all good and ancient games, skittles has a ritual of its own. There is the solemn witting of the right hand on a sponge, the gentle drying on a towel, there is the importance of the studied posture, the swift spring, and the correcting contortion of the body as the heavy bowl rumbles to the skittles, which are replaced by an attendant who risks death and maiming for 2s. a night.

Rhine village, fancy themselves at the game, but so long as our town clerk and his colossal brother retain their form Amerongen will be known as the champion skittles village of the province of Utrecht.

Bored and Tired. Meanwhile, playing at emperors in the moated castle, the ex-Kaiser is a bored and tired man. His chief ambition at present is to saw 10,000 trees into presentation logs. He shows as much pleasure in counting, arranging and inscribing these logs as a boy with a bag of new marbles, but the rest of the household do not share his enthusiasm. A log of wood is an embarrassing gift to treasure with any degree of sustained sentiment.

On fine afternoons he walks in the garden, where he has seen the roses bloom, the beautiful roses of Amerongen, blood-red now, but soon to fade and wither even as the ambitions of unworthy kings.

"What ails the car?" "From what father mutters, I gather that something is wrong with the blanket-blank."

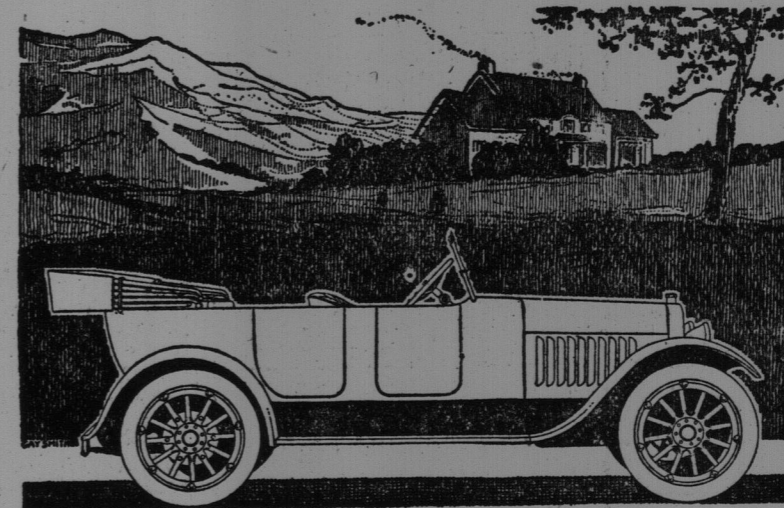

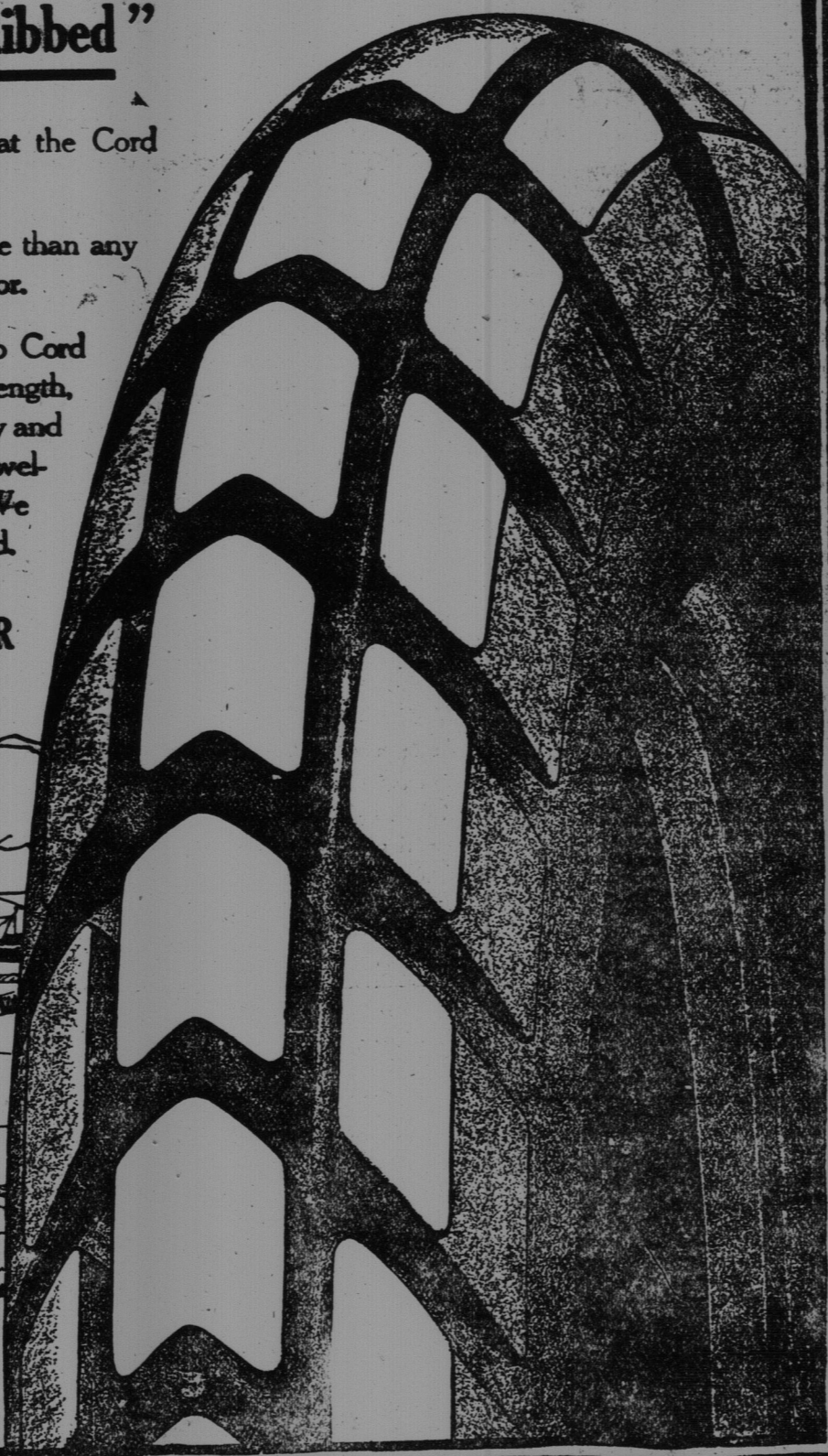

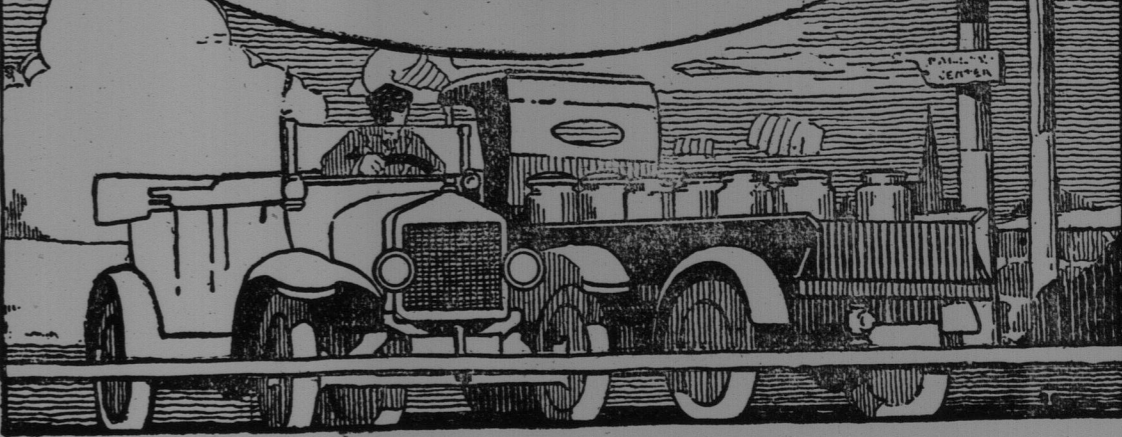

**TIMBERLANDS IN GOOD SHAPE**

Forest Fires Have Done Comparatively Little Damage in Maine.

Augusta, Me., Aug. 16—Forest fires have done comparatively little damage to Maine timberlands this year, due to the efficiency of the warden service and fairly favorable conditions. The telephone connections of the Maine forestry district now include about 900 miles,

some 150 miles of new telephone wire having been added this year. About \$100,000 worth of equipment is used in the forestry department for fighting fires.

According to the plans of the race, it will start on October 14, and will continue for five days. It is for the purpose of stimulating interest in the breeding of cavalry horses throughout the country and also to determine the performances of various types of horses under the severe conditions of a forced march. The race is open to all who will comply with the conditions, which subject to modification by the judges, are in brief as follows:

The distance, approximately three hundred miles, is to be covered at the rate of sixty miles a day for five consecutive days, rain or shine, each horse carrying 200 pounds, inclusive of rider and equipment. Equipment will be optional.




