London, July 31-Official announcement of the resumption of the "conversations" at St. Petersburg and Vienna, came at the moment when pessimism had taken entire possession of the whole of Europe, and the hope that it might lead to a peaceable solution was grasped with desperation, but the news was offset later in the day by the proclamation of martial law in Germany, which was regarded as a preliminary to mobilization of the German forces for war. Everybody then seemed to settle down to await the news that the European powers had decided to engage in a struggle for supremacy. There was nothing to give the public hope that a general war might be averted.

Today there is not a stock market in the whole world open. It was deciding this morning not to open the New York exchange, and soon afterwards came ouncement from the chief financial centres of the states to the effect that exchanges in these cities would be closed. Paris, July 31—The cost of a general war in Europe, involving seven of the mighty powers, would be \$19,755,625,000 a year, according to Dr. Charles Richart, statistician of the University of Paris.

If it lasts at least five years, as diplomats are certain it will do, the cost of the war, without indemnity claims, would reach the amazing total of \$98,773,-125,000.





PITY THE POOR DIPLOMAT

One Must Have Independent Means To Enter This Life

(Times Special Correspondence.)

London, July 20—Those critics who have complained of the difficulties of diplomats abroad and who are agitating for a living wage for ambassadors and others would do well to read the recent disclosure by Sir Arthur Nicolson, permanent under secretary of state for foreign affairs in the British government.

According to Sir Arthur, who is really the directing genius of England's foreign affairs, candidates for positions in the English diplomatic service are first asked to guarantee that they have an independent income of at least \$2,000 a year. This is not done with the idea of limiting the positions to young men of the moneyed class but simply to be sure that the man can live in a foreign

"For the first two years when he goes abroad," Sir Arthur says, "he gets no salary at all, and even for his early years as third and second secretary, his salary is very modest and, especially as an attache, he has to go to some of the bigger capitals, and living there is very expensive, and if one were not sure that he had a certain minimum to live upon, we should have a series of bankrupts, dotted over Europe. 
