



This is Distinction Borne By Former New Brunswicker

VERY POOR IN YOUNG DAYS

An Entertaining Sketch of Isaac Stephenson, Born Near Fredericton, Who Now is the Creesus of the United States Senate

(Boston Post.)

With the departure, from the United States Senate, of Simon Guggenheim of Colorado, Isaac Stephenson of Wisconsin, takes his place as the wealthiest man in that body. He is said to derive an income of \$3,700,000 a year from his fortune of \$74,000,000, which will make him one of the heaviest contributors in the country to the new income tax. As he receives more than \$300,000 a month, he will probably have little difficulty in paying the \$148,000 which he will be assessed.

Senator Stephenson, or "Uncle Ike" as he is known to residents of Wisconsin, is one of the unique characters in the senate. Like Lorimer, he recently was tried for wholesale bribery in procuring his election, but unlike the senator from Illinois, he was allowed to retain his seat. Had Senator Stephenson not accumulated millions in the lumber he might have made a considerable fortune on the vaudeville stage. Few people living have such a retentive memory. He can answer correctly nine times out of ten any question that relates to his life since his third birthday, even giving the day of the week and the month in which any event took place. 

"No building shall be erected hereafter in any part of the City of Saint John, without a permit being first obtained from the Inspector of Buildings, and no addition or alteration to any building, subject to the regulations of this Act. shall be made without a permit from the said Inspector."

Any person violating the provisions of the aforesaid section is liable to a penalty of not less than twenty dollars and not more than one hundred dollars.


