**ALL PEACEFUL YET**

Union and Non-Union Men at Work on Tunisian—Men Say They Expect Matter to Be Adjusted—Four Steamers Arrive

Up to the present time, trouble which was anticipated in connection with the unloading of the Allan steamers at West St. John has not materialized, and the feeling today was that nothing would be done by the Longshoremen's Union until the matter had been placed before the minister of labor on his arrival in the city.

There are two Allan steamers now in port, the Tunisian and Pomeranian, both of which arrived last evening, but so far only one has been worked, the Tunisian. The Pomeranian landed her passengers on the West Side, but will discharge her freight at the Intercolonial pier, on this side of the harbor, to which she will move this afternoon.

The cause of dissatisfaction among the laborers was the action of the Allan line in employing some non-union men. One of the officers in the local union said that everything would be done to avoid friction and in the event of dissatisfaction arising between the union and the steamship companies, the matter would be submitted to a board of arbitration.

The longshoremen who were at work on the Tunisian this morning were composed of both union and non-union men. When the men knocked off for the dinner hour, it was said that the union men were taken off before the non-union men were taken off, and that the latter were not allowed to work until the union men were taken off.

The Tunisian is the only boat in port on which non-union men are employed. The local manager of the Allan line said this afternoon that no representations had been made to him on behalf of the union and that he had not heard of any prospects of a strike.

R. M. S. Tunisian, of the Allan Line, arrived in port about 10:30 last evening after a fair voyage and docked at No. 6 berth about 2:30 o'clock this morning. The Tunisian is under the command of Captain G. Hamilton and sailed from Liverpool on November 26. She brought 127 third class passengers; 1842 sacks of mail and 640 parcels post, as well as a large cargo of express and general freight. With the exception of a few days, when head winds and heavy seas were experienced, the steamer had a smooth and uneventful passage.

Manchester Lines

The Manchester Port, Captain Scott, docked early this morning at No. 5 berth, and is now discharging her freight there. She left Manchester on November 15, and experienced stormy weather for the greater part of the voyage. The weather, one of the officers said this morning, was not so bad as that had been experienced during October, west, south and southwest winds and made her way to the steamer reached the Banks. **NORTH SHORE MEN IN CASE**

Hearing in Matter of Moffatt vs. Montgomery

LARGE SUM INVOLVED

Doctor From Verdun Testifies That George Moffatt's Condition is Sad and Led to Recent Attempt on Life

(Canadian Press) Montreal, Dec. 5.—That George Moffatt is insane and that he suffers from the most horrible hallucinations, which recently led him to make an attempt on his life in the Verdun asylum, was testimony given by Doctor Burgess, medical superintendent of the latter institution in the case of Roland Moffatt versus W. S. Montgomery, of Dalhousie, N. B., heard before Judge Lane.

The plaintiff is curator for George Moffatt, and alleges that the latter, on January 5, 1912, entered into an agreement with the Montreal General Contracting Company, Limited, by which he lent them \$80,000 on a promissory note, which was made payable on February 27, 1912, at 6 per cent, and which was secured by a chattel mortgage on certain property and effects, and also by three mortgages on tugs and barges. On March 21, 1912, the note was still unpaid and George Moffatt assigned and transferred his claim under the loan to W. S. Montgomery, for \$1 and other considerations.

Wedger, a chemist, and officers of the state police, found in a closet, where the fire apparently started, two rats which had been burned to death. One still held a piece of burned paper between its teeth. The officials agreed that the rats probably chewed on matches thrown into the closet with sweepings, and thus started the blaze. Injunction Not Effective Until April 1 Next Year

Matter of Alleged Pollution of Nepisquit Salmon Fishing Grounds

In the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, today, Mr. Justice McLeod gave judgment in the case of the Nepisquit Real Estate & Fishing Co., Ltd. vs. the Canada Iron Corporation. His Honor granted an injunction restraining the defendant company from letting the flow of polluted water from its works enter the Nepisquit stream. But as the water of the defendant company is important, and it may be that the injunction will be modified or amended, His Honor said he would allow the defendant company to do so, ordering that the injunction would not become effective until April 1, 1914.

The Wives of Cabinet Members in Washington

CONGRESS TO BE STORMED

Monster Petition is Being Prepared and Will Likely Have 25,000 Signatures by Next Monday Night—Already 15,000 Have Signed

(Canadian Press) Washington, D. C., Dec. 5.—Eggs are to be banished from the tables in the homes of nearly all the cabinet members whose wives have pledged their support to the egg boycott campaign being waged to reduce the price. One of the first to join the movement was Mrs. William Jennings Bryan, wife of the secretary of state.

Blames Unionists for Failure to Settle Home Rule by Consent

Sir Edward Grey Says Next Move Must Come From the Opposition Leaders

London, Dec. 5.—Sir Edward Grey, secretary of state for foreign affairs, speaking at Bradford last night, blamed the Unionists for the failure of the attempt to reach a home rule settlement by consent. Calling attention to the fact that some rule could not come into operation before 1915, he said that there was no hurry in the settlement of the Ulster problem. The government would exhaust every effort to secure such a settlement in accordance with the principles which the prime minister had laid down, but he declared the next move must come from the opposition leaders.

Father Vaughan Speaks on Education and Character

Critical of Anglican Bishops in Campaign Against Some Stage Features

London, Dec. 5.—In opening a bazaar in aid of the schools of Manchester yesterday, Father Bernard Vaughan, noted Jesuit, talked about education and character and said that the state schools had not the pluck to stand up for God. He scolded the idea of teaching morality at music hall stage morality and Anglican bishops were denouncing stage morality, but they were only attacking the fringe of the garment. Let them go from the music hall to public life, then to the school room, and then to the mother's lap; that's where they would learn morality. It was all very fine for bishops who had abandoned countless church schools to talk about stage morality after they had turned Christ out of the schools.

Fight to Have Cent Out of the Price of Milk

Citizens of Berlin, Ont., Will Begin a Strike Tomorrow

Berlin, Ont., Dec. 5.—Mayor Euler yesterday notified the general public that Saturday morning has been fixed for beginning of the milk strike for the purpose of bringing about a reduction in the price from eight to seven cents a quart. Some of the citizens have already stopped their supply of milk, the mayor being one of the first to be reported to the milkmen.

AGED BISHOP TO RETIRE IN SPRING

(Special to Times) London, Dec. 5.—The Bishop of Bristol, Rev. Dr. Forest Brown, the oldest occupant of the Episcopal throne, says that he intends to retire in the spring. Daily Hints For the Cook

Creamed String Beans. String the green beans and cut up in half-inch pieces (enough to make a quart). Boil in salted water until tender. Drain and put back in the saucepan, add a piece of butter the size of an egg, salt and pepper to taste and 1/2 cup of cream. Let it come to the boiling point and serve. Sponge Cake. Beat the yolks of six eggs very light. Add a quarter of a pound of granulated sugar and beat again. Whip whites of six eggs to a stiff froth, then beat in gradually a quarter of a pound of granulated sugar. Add this to the yolks and beat both until thoroughly mixed. Fold in lightly a quarter of a pound of sifted flour. Finally add one teaspoon of lemon juice. Bake in a moderate oven about 20 minutes or until cakes begin to shrink from the pans. This makes two loaves. Turn upside down on a cloth. When ready to serve break into pieces. Cutting sponge cake makes it tasty.

was revealed by investigation carried on by citizens interested in the crusade to drive from the city the men who prey upon the young and innocent girls. The system has agents who regularly visit the keepers of resorts and urge to procure girls for them for a price. Thousands of girls are sold in this way in Montreal every year; thousands of others—chiefly French-Canadian girls—are sent from this city to various places in the United States under conditions which practically amount to slavery.

New developments in the campaign yesterday included the issuing of several more warrants for men as a result of information received by Judge Choquet in the juvenile court, and a proposal for the holding of a mass meeting of citizens to discuss plans for aiding the movement.

C. P. R. GIVES CONTRACT FOR GREAT TUNNEL IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Probably Largest Ever Let in America — More Than 2,000 Miles of Railway Under Construction

Denver, Colo., Dec. 5.—A railroad contract for \$6,000,000 has been let to the tunnel driving firm of James A. McIlwhee & Sons, of Denver. They have agreed to drive ten miles of tunnel for the C. P. R. in British Columbia. Work will be started on January 1, and must be completed within three years.

A double track bore five miles long will be driven under Rogers Pass, 224 miles west of Calgary. A smaller and parallel tunnel will be driven with cross cuts to the main survey at every 500 feet and there will be established stations from which headings will be run in either direction. In this manner, the tunnel proper will be driven from a dozen directions. The contract is said to be the largest tunnel job ever let in America. Construction camps costing \$20 additional. The staff will number six.

**How Pope Pius X Spends the Day**

**IS UP BEFORE THE DAWN**

**His Living Most Simple—The Friend of the Children—How an Audience With Pontiff Is Conducted**

(London Answers)

Though there are few personages who keep their fingers more tightly upon the pulse of the world and its movements than the Pope, His Holiness dwells in an atmosphere of long ago. No prime minister in Europe is so accessible, and yet only once since 1870 has a Pope driven beyond the gates of the Vatican, what even then he only passed on to what was technically Vatican ground.

Pope Pius X, who reigned at the Vatican for ten years, yet, amid all the pomp and majesty of his position, he limits the cost of his food to something less than five shillings a day, and in the actual routine of his life simplicity plays a leading part. Walking alone in the Vatican gardens, His Holiness will chat paternally with the gardeners or with the Noble Guard in attendance upon him.

**The Children's Friend**

In "The Pope at Home," a shilling book recently published by Messrs. Hurst & Blackett, Ltd., Douglas Sladen has some most interesting chapters concerning the daily day of His Holiness, and tells a little story that proves the Pope's great and tender love for children.

"An English lady and gentleman," writes Mr. Sladen, "were granted the privilege of a private audience. They

look two of their little children with them, but the third had to remain at home, as she was ill in bed with influenza. Before leaving the Pope's presence the mother requested a special blessing for her little one at home. His Holiness immediately asked for full particulars, gave the desired blessing, and then returned for a moment to his study.

"He soon returned with some medals in his hand, and presenting one to the mother, 'Take this home,' he enjoined, 'to your little girl with my blessing, and, as soon as she is better, bring her round to see me.' He gave orders to his chaplain to take note of this promised audience, and left the parents with an earnest 'Don't forget!'

The Pope is one of those who see the day dawn in summer, and dress by candlelight in winter, because they cannot wait for the dawn. He always shaves himself, and dresses without a valet. At six o'clock he celebrates mass, then takes a little black coffee, and at eight o'clock receives his secretaries.

Indeed, it is often eleven o'clock or midnight before His Holiness retires to his bed-room, which is a regular monk's cell, containing nothing but a simple iron camp bedstead. It is there that the Supreme Head of the church spends his few hours of rest.

Describing an audience with the Pope, Mr. Sladen writes:—"Gentlemen are expected to wear evening-dress, but are generally admitted in any kind of black clothes. Ladies must wear black dresses and cover their heads with black lace scarves. At the clapping of hands the audience rises like one figure, and then, as the Pope passes in, attended by a cardinal and high officials, everyone kneels. His Holiness then walks round the room, holding to each his hand, to be taken and kissed on the ring."

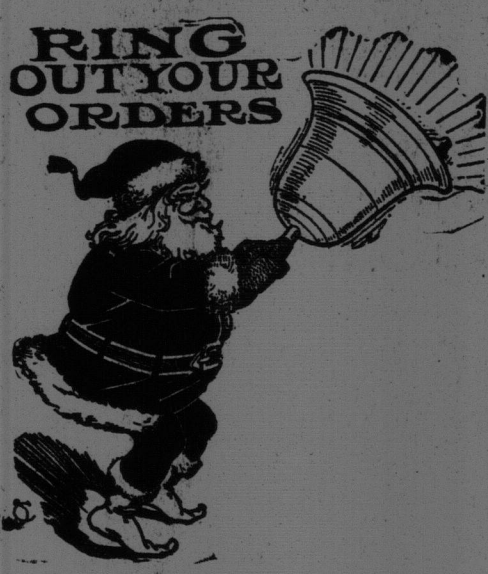

Strongly Advocates Industrial Training and Technical Education

J. W. Robertson Outlines Recommendations of Commission — What New Brunswick Needs — Province's Share of Proposed Dominion Subsidy

of the most important lectures delivered before the St. John Canteen and one destined to have far-reaching effects was that given last evening by Dr. J. W. Robertson, C. M. G., LL. D., entitled "Development for New Brunswick."

Second—Something in the school classes to make boys and girls want to continue at school as long as they can.

Third—Some provision in the way of secondary industrial and technical education for those who can continue at school from 12 to 16.

Fourth—Continuation classes to be attended while young people are following some occupation to earn their living.

Fifth—Evening classes for workmen and workwomen.

Sixth—Middle technical schools to which men and women can come back for periods of from six months to two years after they have been working for some years.

In addition to these the witnesses presented the claims of the rural population and fishing population for schools specially adapted to their needs.

All were agreed upon the necessity for and certain of the benefit from classes and schools for housekeeping occupations. Many witnesses recommended the establishment of correspondence study classes by central institutions in Canada.

The Underlying Principles. The commission is of the opinion that industrial training and technical education in order to be of the greatest benefit to individuals, to industrial development, to localities, to the several provinces, and to the dominion as a whole should be organized and maintained in accordance with the following principles:

1. It should be under provincial control and regulation.

2. It should receive financial support from individuals, from local authorities, from provincial government, and from the dominion.

3. Provision should be made for active participation in its control, management and direction by individuals in the locality who would represent industries, employers and employees, agriculture, women's occupations, particularly house-keeping, business and organized education.

4. It should provide educational opportunities for those who have gone to work and also for those who are able to return and devote their time for some months or years, as the case may be, to a course or courses of instruction and training.

5. It should take provision to ensure, as far as practicable, equality of opportunity, agricultural and housekeeping occupations and for workers in such occupations.

6. It should be carried out in cordial co-operation with existing systems of education, and in such a way as to have the advantage of the use of existing buildings, equipment and teaching staff so far as these may be suitable and available.

7. Provincial Revenues Inadequate. The revenues of the several provinces from subsidies from the dominion, at the present time, to the extent of some \$10,000,000 from subsidies from the dominion. The royal commission recommends that in addition to any other subsidy that may be provided, the sum of \$8,000,000 per annum should go into a dominion development fund to be spent by local and provincial authorities co-operating with the dominion authorities for the purposes indicated. Buy None Until the Price Has Dropped to Thirty-five Cents

New York, Dec. 4.—Women all over the country are joining in the national boycott on eggs, in an effort to bring that commodity to a rate considered reasonable.

That fully 1,000,000 women throughout every section of the country have joined the boycott was contended by Mrs. Julian Heath, president of the National Housewives' League.

In answering the statements made today by cold storage men that "the decrease of shipments, and not they" are responsible for soaring egg prices, Mrs. Heath pointed to the last government figures on egg production for this autumn.

The cold storage people can explain all they want to," said Mrs. Heath, "but they can't get around these government figures. Neither can they satisfactorily explain why the cold storage men held up millions of dozens of eggs for which they paid from 18 to 20 cents a dozen, and forced the housewives of the nation to pay 40 and 50 cents a dozen for the same eggs."

**PAY TRIBUTE TO D. RUSSELL JACK**

Many at His Funeral — Eulogies Pronounced by Clergymen at St. Andrew's Service

The funeral of D. R. Jack was held from St. Andrew's church this afternoon and many attended. The body was brought to the city last evening and taken to St. Andrew's church. Among the flowers which covered the casket were wreaths from societies of which Mr. Jack was a member, and included a beautiful set piece from St. Andrew's Society, and a wreath of violets and chrysanthemums from the council of the St. John Art Club.

The service in St. Andrew's church was at half-past two o'clock this afternoon. The members of St. Andrew's Society met in the vestry before the service and marched into the church in a body. They also marched behind the bier after the service. Charles W. Bell acted as marshal. Rev. J. McCaskill, chaplain of the society, led in the prayers in the church. The session and trustees of St. Andrew's church also attended the funeral in a body.

Rev. Dr. MacVicar, pastor of St. Andrew's church, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Mr. McCaskill and by Rev. Gordon Dickie, who read from the Scriptures. The hymns sung by the choir were, "Unto the Hills Around Us," "Life To Men Longing Eyes," and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." Eulogies were pronounced by Rev. Dr. MacVicar and Archdeacon Raymond. Rev. Dr. MacVicar said:—

"There is but a step between me and death." This statement was originally made under the strong excitement of a strong menace; but that it has its special force in one daily (and, for the most part, unconcerned) facing of the momentary contingency of death, is brought home to us by the sudden departure of D. Russell Jack.

Only a fortnight ago, as I sat at my desk in the church vestry half an hour before the Sunday evening service, the telephone rang, and on lifting the receiver, I at once recognized Mr. Jack's voice. He informed me that, though he had been out at the morning service, he would not be able to attend the evening service, as he had been poorly through the day. At the close of the service I called at his rooms, and he then told me that for several years he had known he was suffering from heart-disease, which, the time of speaking, he had reason to believe, had grown acute, necessitating his absence for some months at despatch Springs, for which medical resort, by doctor's orders, he would leave next day. I was consequently not altogether unprepared for the news, which came by wire, of his so sudden end.

None of us, as a matter of fact, ever knew what the call will reach us; and if it were right to make a choice in a matter in which choice is not legitimately open, I would myself prefer to pass away, as our friend has done, without warning; but I do not share the regret of feeling some people undergo the thought of sudden death, either as regards the nature of the experience to be met, or the shock caused to those who are left. The pain of parting under the suspense of a prolonged illness is, if anything, greater than when all is over in a moment.

Fenryson has voiced a not uncommon and not unusual yearning for a quick and untroubled end, in his wish for "no sadness of farewell" or "moaning of the heart" in putting out to sea. And another poet has pictured the beauty of such a transition from one world to another in these expressive words:

Life! We've been long together  
Through pleasant and through cloudy weather;  
'Tis hard to part when friends are dear,  
Perhaps 'twill cost a sigh, a tear,  
—Then steal away, give little warning,  
Choose thine own time  
Say not Good Night, but in some  
brighter clime  
Bid me Good Morning!

The particulars of Mr. Jack's career as a journalist, as an historian, as a contributor to Canadian magazines, as a prominent member and officer of various societies and organizations, as a business man, and as an influential patriotic citizen of St. John, have been more or less fully dealt upon by the daily papers; and it is fitting that before this service closes the Venerable Archdeacon Raymond should offer a brief appreciation of Mr. Jack's general work in the community.

It remains only for me to say with the deepest sincerity how much he will be missed by the minister, the office-bearers and the people of St. Andrew's church. His religious activities were prominent, unaffected and well sustained. He showed a profound practical interest in the work of this congregation, faithfully attending its Sunday services and the regular and special meetings held during the week. He was particularly concerned to promote the prosperity of the guild, under the auspices of which he not infrequently lectured on his travels, exhibiting the artistic bent which evidenced the artistic bent and taste of the family to which he belonged. Before the Sunday services he was habitually on hand at an early hour to look after important arrangements that made of the comfort of the worshippers; and as an usher the door he had a knack of getting into touch with strangers and making them feel welcome. As a trustee he was conscientious in the performance of his duties.

But the most conspicuous service which he rendered to St. Andrew's church was undoubtedly the preparation of a bulky volume on the history of this congregation, which, in the century and a quarter of its existence has had the honor of being the mother of Presbyterianism in New Brunswick. To the overwork and waiting of this volume, which occupied him during several busy years, Mr. Jack brought the mind and pen of a man of an experienced journalist and spared no pains to gather and put into form for the press the great mass of information embodied in this valuable work which will prove the best and most lasting monument of his connection with this church.

Even under the handicap of an insidious disease he showed a courageous spirit and a manly capacity for hard work, without which he could not have been identified with so many interesting and important projects which he was anxious to see carried to their end. His exertions that made for him a place from which he will not be greatly missed. Interment was in Fernhill.
